## First Responders to Teach CPR Skills at Fort Worth Libraries



Thirteen Fort Worth Public Library locations will host hands-only CPR and AED training taught by Fort Worth Fire Department staff in February, which is American Heart Month.

The free classes are designed for teens and adults and are available on a first-come, first-served basis; no registration is required. Instruction is focused on hands-only CPR and AED use and is not a certification course.

“Knowing how to perform hands-only CPR and use life-saving tools like AEDs can make a difference in the critical minutes before first responders arrive,” said Fire Chief Jim Davis. “I’m proud we are offering this type of training to the public at no cost.”

According to the American Heart Association, immediate CPR is proven to double or triple the chances of survival after cardiac ar-

rest. Timely and accurate AED use can also improve survival rates.



Nataliegh Zapata, Nancy Trejo, Landry Wilkinson and Desmond Chambers all captured District championships, while Bri-leigh Satterwhite, Gavin Henderson, Dominic Nunez, and Jacob Carpenter all got second in their respective weight classes.

Wilkinson was named the Most Outstanding Wrestler at the tournament and Kas Stevens picked up her 100th career win.

Cribbs said the regional tournament will be daunting, but said his wrestlers are ready to compete.

“We are in the toughest region in the state for both boys and girls,” Cribbs said. “But we are excited about the opportunity to compete against them. We have three returning state qualifiers that we’re hoping can make it back, and bring a few more along with them to state next week.”

On the court, the Benbrook boy's basketball team defeated Carter-Riverside by a score of 63-28 on Friday night, and coach Blake Mendez said his team was firing on all cylinders.

“I thought we came out with great energy to start the game,” Mendez said. “We had some time off with the bye on Tuesday, so we felt fresh and ready to go. We were flying around on both sides of the ball and created turnovers early that led to points. I was very proud of our performance.”

Mendez said the victory was a true team effort.

The Bobcats have qualified for the playoffs, and Mendez the final games of the regular season will determine a lot.

“We have clinched a playoff spot and now it just comes down to seeding,” Mendez said. “We have three games left to make sure we put ourselves in the best spot possible going into playoffs.”

On the girl's side, Benbrook defeated Carter-Riverside by a score of 47-24 last Friday, and coach Leta Lofton the Lady Cats win also took a team effort.

“Standing behind our School Motto, 'Benbrook Pride..Never Dies,' the Lady Bobcats defeated a much-improved Carter Riverside team with team effort,” Lofton said. “Giving 100 percent team effort offensively and defensively in every game win or lose.”

Captain Grace Klaerner “was automatic from the 3 point line scoring seven 3-pointers.

Julianna Velasquez and Captain McKenzie Brookshier “commanded the defensive and offensive boards for a great rebounding game.”

Lofton said her team was still in the playoff hunt following Friday's win over the Lady Eagles.

“There’s a possibility of us clinching the fourth spot in district after our last game versus Dunbar on Tuesday, Feb. 4,” Lofton said on Saturday. “Afterwards, we will decide big school/ small school playoff spots.”

On the pitch, the Benbrook girl's soccer team defeated Southwest on Friday by a score of 8-0 on Friday, and coach Luz Castillo said she could not have asked for more from her team in the win.

“I'm incredibly proud of how well our team played at our district home opener against Southwest,” Castillo said. “Our defense was outstanding, achieving another shutout. The offense was on fire, with five different players scoring goals. It was a true team effort, moving up the field into the final third, where every player made a significant impact. The level of coordination and synergy displayed by our team was nothing short of exceptional.”

Castillo said she had several standout performances deserving mention.

“Our captain, Sydney Chavez, was phenomenal, scoring two goals and providing an assist,” Castillo said. “Sophomore Lexie Garcia also had an impressive game with two goals. Each player brought their best to the field, and through combined individual efforts and teamwork, we secured an 8-0 win.

Overall, it was an incredible game, and I'm looking forward to seeing how the team builds on this success in the future.”

Over at Western Hills, the Cougars boy's soccer team defeated Eastern Hills on Friday.

“Eastern Hills is very well coached and disciplined,” coach Matt Collins said. “They are always hard to break down. We did not have many chances, but we found a goal when it mattered.”

Collins said that Landon Whittaker stopped a penalty kick and “won the game for us. He is a calm and cool goal keeper. He makes us very good.”

The Cougars had two shut outs in their first two district games, and Collins said he is seeing steady improvement defensively.

“Our defense is a work in progress,” Collins said. “We have two experienced players and a few guys who are new. It’s fun watching them get better.”

## War Leader of the Kwahadi Band - Quanah Parker



Quanah Parker became a respected leader of the Comanche Nation at the end of the Plains Indian Wars. He spent much of his life caught between two worlds. He was the son of a white settler and a Comanche chief. And he had to lead his tribe in the difficult transition from their ancient traditions to life on the reservation.

His mother, Cynthia Ann Parker, was captured by Comanches at age nine in an 1836 raid on Fort Parker in Central Texas, just east of modern-day Waco. She became a full-fledged member of the tribe and fully assimilated into the culture. She married Peta Nocona, the chief of the Kwahadi band of Comanches. The community of Nocona was later named for him. Quanah Parker was born probably in 1845 in the Wichita Mountains of southern Oklahoma, though other dates have been offered and even locations as distant as East Texas as the site of his birth.

Parker grew up with Comanche traditions on the Llano Estacado, moving along sites across the Texas Panhandle and into New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Kansas. In 1860, his

mother and sister were captured in a clash with Texas Rangers at the Battle of Pease River in Foard County and died within a few years. Though Comanche tradition encouraged tribe members to change their birth names once they reached adulthood, Parker kept his birth name as a reminder of his mother.

In 1868, the federal government attempted to make peace with the tribes of the southern plains and bring them onto reservations. Many tribes signed, but Parker refused. The army sent cavalry units after the Comanches, but the tribe always managed to stay a step ahead. Parker would even raid cavalry camps, steal army horses, and disappear. By 1872, the army gave up its search. In 1874, the army restarted its search for the Comanches and waged intense battles against them.

At the end of the Red River War in 1875, Parker had to face the terrible reality. The U. S. Army had killed 1,500 of their horses at the Battle of Palo Duro Canyon, and the buffalo that the Comanches and other tribes relied upon had been hunted nearly to extinction. With their maneuverability and military strength greatly reduced and with food becoming scarce, Parker had no choice but to surrender his band of Comanches to the army, becoming the last tribe on the southern plains to surrender. They were taken to the combined Kiowa-Apache-Comanche reservation in the Southwest Indian Territory, or what is now Oklahoma.

Though he was chief of his own band of Kwahadi Comanches, the federal government made him principal chief of all Comanches though the tribe had not selected him for the position. Nevertheless, he spoke out repeatedly to defend Comanche needs, their rights, and their traditions. He tried to make the Comanches self-sufficient on the reservations and encouraged the construction of schools on the reservations that emphasized their cultural heritage. There was tremendous pressures to open reservation lands to white settlers and to lease the lands for grazing rights, but Parker resisted. By the 1880s, after years of discussions and negotiations, he entered into a contract with North

Texas cattle barons Charles Goodnight and Samuel Burk Burnett to allow their cattle to graze on one million acres of their reservation lands for a fee. The contract stayed in place until 1902, and the grazing fees became a steady source of income for the tribes. Parker himself also made the transition to becoming a successful rancher himself, and with investments in railroads became perhaps the wealthiest Native American in the country.

Parker earned a great deal of respect among white settlers in his later years. In 1884, the city of Quanah, the county seat of Hardeman County, was founded and named after Parker. He even appeared at a dedication ceremony, offering a benediction to bless the community, saying, "May the Great Spirit smile upon your little town." He met regularly with many powerful politicians, including President Theodore Roosevelt. In 1902, he was named Deputy Sheriff for Lawton.

At a time when federal and state officials were trying to end tribal religious practices in favor of Christianity, Parker maintained his steadfast support for his ancient traditions. He became a co-founder and leader of what became known as the Native American Church, sometimes called Peyotism, which was a combination of different tribal traditions culmination in the belief that the world was controlled by the creator, or "Great Spirit," and emphasized care for others, forgiveness, and unity. Peyote is commonly used as a medicine and for spiritual visions. In 1907, he defended the use of peyote in religious ceremonies at a committee meeting of the Oklahoma state legislature, declaring, "I do not think this legislature should interfere with a man's religion." One of his sons, however, would become a noted Methodist minister.

Parker continued to give interviews and travel to other reservations.

He died at his home in Cache in 1911. He was buried next to his mother. The reservation government was reorganized after his death, replacing chief with the position of chairman, making Quanah Parker at the time the last chief of the Comanches.
