Benbrook Council Action by John English

City Council Approves Key Purchases, Street Projects in Unanimous Votes

The Benbrook City Council meeting was held on March 19 as scheduled. Mayor Jason Ward called the meeting to order. An invocation was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Time was then allowed for citizen comments on any agenda item, but there were none. The minutes of the meeting held on March 5 were then approved unanimously.

The first item of the evening was a motion to consider approval of the finance report for the period ending on Feb. 28. For the General Fund, revenues for the month of February totaled \$4,238,258, while year-to-date revenues totaled \$19,878,646. Expenditures for the General Fund for the month of February totaled \$2,492,404, while year-to-date expenditures totaled \$11,178,646.

For the Economic Development Corporation, revenues for the month of February totaled \$189,786 and year-to-date revenues totaled \$1,105,923. Expenditures for the month of February totaled \$294,737 while year-to-date expenditures totaled \$1,193,804. Investments for the City of Benbrook totaled \$41,048,158, while investments for the EDC totaled \$7,502,401. *(more on page 5)*

Klaerner's Hat Trick Powers Benbrook Girls Soccer to Playoff Rout



The Benbrook girl's soccer team looked pretty salty in it's playoff opener on Friday, March 20 with a 6-0 victory over Eagle Mountain.

Grace Klaerner led with way offensively with three goals, and coach Kristen Martinez said her team took awhile to get going in game where the weather was also a factor.

"The team started out a little slow," Martinez said. "We struggled to get into a rhythm and only had a 1-0 lead at halftime. The second half was much better, and we settled into passing more and letting the ball do the work. The heat was definitely a factor in a 4 p.m. game with no shade. We had Gatorade and cooling towels on the sideline, but several girls still felt the effects of the heat."

Sydney Chavez had 2 goals in the game, and Lily Chavez added a goal of her own.

Over at Western Hills, the Lady Cougars came up just short in the bi-district round against Lake Worth by a score of 3-2 last Thursday.

On the boy's side, the Benbrook Bobcats lost in the bi-district round by a score of 1-0 to Eagle Mountain.

On the diamond, the Western Hills softball team had an impressive win against Southwest last week to improve to 5-1 in district competition, and coach Tyler Sutton it may have been his team's best effort so far in 2026.

"The girls played very well Tuesday morning against Southwest," Sutton said. "They jumped on us 3-0 after the top of the first, then our ladies came out strong and never looked back. After Southwest had their 3-0 start, we made it 4-3 after the end of the 1st, then 16-3 after two innings. Our girls kept their stride to an 18-8 finish in what was in my opinion the best all-around performance of the season. Continuing to be solid in all three phases of the game will be pivotal in the second round of district play."

Sutton said, "pitcher Addison Dudley found her stride on the

mound, only allowing 4 earned runs and striking out 10 against an explosive Southwest offense."

Other strong efforts include Celeste Mendoza, who went 2-3, including a walk and three RBI, Isabela Gonzales, who went 3-4 including a double and three RBI and Sophia Castellanos, who made it safely on base four times and tallied six stolen bases, scoring 4 runs.

In baseball, Benbrook improved to 4-0 in district competition with a two-game sweep against Southwest and coach Justin Chavez said his team is competing at a high level.

"We were able to do exactly what we wanted throughout the week," Chavez said. "Our pitching was great, and we hit the ball well. We need to clean it up on defense a little, but overall we had a good week."

Chavez said Sebastian Martinez and Brennan Barton hit well for the Bobcats and Daniel Stiefvater and Tanner Madara had good outings on the mound for, both of them picking up wins this week.

"I feel like we are well prepared for our district due to our non district schedule," Chavez said. "We have #4 Iowa Park on Saturday at their place so that will be a good test for us. The next five non district games are all on the road against really really good competition. We have to continue to stay focused in district, do what we need to do, and then get ready for a good competitive Saturday game. This team started out slow but we are moving in the right direction."

The finance report was accepted unanimously.

Next was a motion to accept the Annual Comprehensive Finance Report (ACFR) for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 2025. The report is audited by the City's independent auditor, which is BrooksWatson & Co. and the city received a clean audit. The report is available on the city web site for residents to review. The report was accepted unanimously.

Next was a proposal to accept an Interlocal Agreement with Tarrant County for the Fiscal Year 2025-26 Street Maintenance Program. Tarrant County will provide the equipment and labor for the overlay operation at no cost to the city and the city will pay for the asphalt and milling operation via separate agreements. The proposal was accepted unanimously.

Next up was a motion to purchase pickup trucks from Five Star Ford. Both the Public Works and Parks Departments use picks ups for daily operations. Thirty-three percent of the the Public Works department trucks are 20 years or older along with 44 percent of trucks used by the Parks Department. The year 2016 was the last time either department received new pick ups. The four trucks they are replacing would go to auction. The purchase of two F350's and two F250s in the amount of \$239,966.74 through Five Star Ford was approved unanimously.

Next up was a motion to consider approving the purchase of asphalt from Austin Asphalt for the Fiscal Year 2025-26. Tarrant County Road and Bridge crews will use the asphalt from Austin Asphalt, the cost of which includes transporting the asphalt plant to the project site. The purchase of asphalt at a price of \$338,437.50 was approved unanimously.

Then came a motion to consider approval of a Milling contract to TexOp Construction, LP for the fiscal year 2025-26 Street Maintenance Program. Milling removes the deteriorated asphalt in the first step in overlaying an asphalt street and the old asphalt will be transported to an asphalt plant to be recycled into new asphalt. The contact in the amount of \$85,036.80 was approved unanimously. Time was then allowed for informal citizen comments.

John Higdon, a representative of Frontier Waste Solutions, approached the podium and reminded council members that his company was interested in potentially partnering with the City of Benbrook for its waste management needs and listed some of the company's recent accomplishments.

Time was then allowed for council member and staff comments, and council member Renee Franklin reminded residents that the next artisan market is on March 29 this year, as well as the third annual Bunny Trail from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Benbrook YMCA.

Member Sean Moore then recognized a friend, Waymon Patterson, who recently passed away, and also announced the birth of his third son. The meeting was then adjourned.

The next Benbrook City Council meeting will be held on Thursday, April 2 at 7 p.m. at the Benbrook Municipal Complex, located at 911 Winscott Rd. in Benbrook.

Oveta Culp Hobby



Oveta Culp Hobby was a woman of drive and determination. From newspaper editor to presidential cabinet secretary and more, Hobby lived a life of service and breaking barriers for women.

She was born Oveta Culp in 1905 in Killeen to lawyer Ike Culp and his wife, Elizabeth. She was one of seven children and was very studious as a child.

When her father was elected to the state legislature in 1918, she accompanied him to the Capitol on many occasions to witness the legislature in action.

After graduating from Temple High School, she took classes at the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor and the University of Texas. Along the way, she briefly served as a teacher and as a reporter for the Austin Statesman.

In 1925, she was hired as the first woman parliamentarian for the Texas House of Representatives. Through this position, she made rulings on procedural questions and debates occurring in the legislature. She served for six years until her already adventurous life took yet another turn.

In 1931, she married William P. Hobby, who had served as Texas governor from 1917 to 1921 and publisher of the *Houston Post*. The two would eventually have two children together. Their son, William P. Hobby, Jr., would serve as lieutenant governor from 1973 to 1991.

Completely devoted to her husband, Oveta Hobby served as a research editor for the *Post* before becoming executive vice-president in

1938. She also served on a variety of local cultural boards in Houston as well as president of the Texas League of Women Voters.

In 1943, she was asked by Gen. George Marshall to organize and lead the Women's Army Corps (WAC). This was the first American military organization designed specifically for women.

The WAC trained women to fill vital service roles from drivers to telephone operators to clerks but would not serve in combat. Hobby led tens of thousands of women volunteers, eventually earning the rank of colonel and becoming the first woman to earn the Distinguished Service Cross for her service.

After she stepped down from her duties as WAC Director in 1945, she resumed her work with Houston civic organizations and the newspaper.

In 1949, she became the first woman to serve as president of the Southern Newspaper Publishers Association.

In 1953, Hobby was named by President Dwight D. Eisenhower to be the first Secretary of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. She was only the second woman in American History to serve as a presidential cabinet secretary, following Frances Perkins, who served as Secretary of Labor under President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The new department oversaw federal pensions, Social Security, hospitals, medical research, and aid to universities. During her tenure as secretary, she approved the new polio vaccine developed by Dr. Jonas Salk for use, a vaccine that effectively ended the polio epidemic in the United States.

As her husband's health began to falter, she resigned her position in 1955 and returned to Houston where she became president and editor of the *Post*. The Department of Health, Education, and Welfare was separated into the Department of Education and the Department of Health and Human Services in 1979.

Oveta Hobby earned many honors in her later years, including having the Central Texas College Library in Killeen named after her as well as an elementary school in Killeen.

In 1984, she was inducted into the Texas Woman's Hall of Fame. In April 1995, the *Houston Post* ceased publication after years of falling profits and increased competition from the *Houston Chronicle*.

Hobby died four months later in Houston at the age of 90.

First Monday Quilt Club Threads Care and Connection

At Bethany Christian Church, the first Monday morning of each month brings more than just sewing supplies, it brings a sense of purpose.

From 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., members of the First Monday Quilt Club gather to stitch together handmade quilts and blankets destined for people in need across the community. The next meeting is scheduled for April 6, when participants are invited to bring brunch or snack items to share in place of the group's usual potluck.

The club operates as part of Project Linus, a national nonprofit dedicated to providing comfort to children facing serious illness, trauma or other hardships. Locally, volunteers form the Tarrant County chapter, creating blankets that are distributed to children throughout the region.

In addition to serving young recipients, the group extends its outreach to veterans, nursing home residents and individuals experiencing homelessness, reflecting a growing demand for handmade items that offer warmth and reassurance.

Organizers say volunteers of all skill levels are welcome, with a particular need for those who can bring portable sewing machines to help assemble quilts.

"There is a place for everyone," organizers said, noting that volunteers can contribute by sewing, crocheting, tying knots, organizing materials or simply offering a willingness to help.

The gatherings often provide more than service opportunities. Participants frequently build friendships while working side by side on projects that benefit others.

High school students may also earn community service hours through participation. All materials, including fabric, batting, thread and yarn, are provided, though donations of supplies or funds are accepted.
