Glanzer Shines at State as Bobcats Close Memorable Championship Season

Benbrook MHS senior Avery Glanzer took second place at the girls 4A state golf tournament Monday, May 4.

Glanzer finished day one with a score of 74 and shot 73 on day two of the tournament.

The season came to an end for the BMHS Bobcat baseball team last weekend, but not before finishing 2026 as undefeated district champions with a 23-10 record.

The Bobcats lost two closely-contested games to the state No. 3 Brock, and coach Justin Chavez said he is proud of how his team competed in the series.

“In game one, Sebastian Martinez pitched as good as he ever has for us, and finished with 7IP, 2H, 10Ks, 0ER,” Chavez said. “We lost in the eighth inning on a bloop hit and a single down the left line all with two outs in the inning. The first item of the evening was a motion to accept the finance report for the period ending March 31.

For the General Fund, fiscal revenues for the month of March totaled \$1,834,226, while year-to-date revenues totaled \$21,712,505. Expenditures for the month of March totaled \$2,909,336, while year-to-date expenditures totaled \$14,087,982.

For the Economic Development Corporation, fiscal revenues for the month of March 2026 were \$196,448, while year-to-date revenues totaled \$1,302,371. Expenditures for the month of March totaled \$281,441, while year-to-date expenditures totaled \$1,475,244. The finance report was accepted unanimously.

Next was a motion to accept the quarterly investment report for the period ending March 31. Investments for the City of Benbrook totaled \$41,416,531, while investments for the EDC totaled \$7,403,840. The investment report was accepted unanimously.

Next was a motion to approve authorizing an agreement with American Medical Response Ambulance Service, Inc. to provide Emergency Medical Services (EMS) at designated properties and for citywide backup support.

According to the council agenda, in August 2024, and amended in June 2025, the City of Benbrook (City) established an agreement with Acadian Ambulance Service of Texas, LLC (Acadian) to provide 24/7 emergency and non emergency medical services.

These services included responses originating from the following designated facilities: Mirabella Assisted Living and Memory Care (4242 Bryant Irving Road); Renaissance Park Multi Care Center (4252 Bryant Irving Road); Benbrook Nursing and Rehabilitation Center (1000 McKinley Street); Total Care Emergency Room (8501 Benbrook Blvd., Suite 103).

The agreement also included third-out EMS response and mutual aid support throughout the City's service area.

In January 2026, Acadian became unable to meet the terms of

the agreement due to staffing shortages and other operational constraints. Staff recommended that the City Council approve the Emergency Medical Services Agreement with American Medical Response Ambulance Service, Inc. (AMR) to provide additional EMS coverage within the City of Benbrook's service area. The agreement was approved unanimously.

Next was a motion to accept a proposal to participate in the Tarrant County 2026 HOME program. The program is a HUD Community Development Block Grant of which the City of Benbrook has a 25 percent cost share. Tarrant County's maximum funding per home is \$24,000, Tarrant County administers the program and homes have to be valued under \$309,000. To qualify, residents also have to be receiving SSDI, SSI, be 62 years or older or have dependent children living at home under the age of 18. The resolution was approved unanimously.

Time was then allowed for informal citizen comments, but there were none.

Time was then allowed for staff and council member comments, and member Renee Franklin reminded residents of a couple of an E-Waste and Shred Event on Saturday, May 16 behind Dutch Branch Park.

Franklin then thanked all of the recent National Lemonade day event.

Council member Keith Tiner then seconded Franklin's thanks to the participants in the event, and reminded residents of the baseball series Benbrook played against Brock, along with Benbrook and Western Hills' appearance in the softball playoffs.

Tiner also reminded residents that May is bicycle safety month and asked residents wear their helmets when riding and asked drivers to be aware and mindful of bicycle riders.

Member Sean Moore then addressed residents who sustained damage to their homes following recent hail storms and reminded people of the importance of paying one's deductible, saying it is illegal not to do so.

The meeting then went into executive session, and no action was taken once the meeting resumed.

The meeting was then adjourned.

How to Donate Blood

Download the American Red Cross Donor App, visit RedCrossBlood.org, call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767) or enable the Blood Donor Skill on any Alexa Echo device to make an appointment or for more information. All blood types are needed to ensure a reliable supply for patients. A blood donor card or driver's license, or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age in most states (16 with parental consent where allowed by state law), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.

Blood and platelet donors can save time at their next donation by using RapidPass® to complete their pre-donation reading and health history questionnaire online, on the day of their donation, before arriving at the blood drive. To get started, follow the instructions at RedCrossBlood.org/RapidPass or use the Blood Donor App.

Volunteer Opportunities

Another way to support the lifesaving mission of the Red Cross is to become a volunteer blood donor ambassador at Red Cross blood drives. Blood donor ambassadors help greet, check in and thank blood donors to ensure they have a positive donation experience.

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Tarrant County Voters Prepare for May 26 Primary Runoff Election

Voters across Tarrant County will return to the polls May 26 for the Texas Democratic and Republican primary runoff elections, with early voting scheduled for May 18-22. According to Tarrant County Elections, early voting locations will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday during the early voting period.

Several state and local races remain undecided and will appear on runoff ballots for voters who participated in either the Democratic or Republican primary elections earlier this year. Voters who cast a ballot in a primary are required to vote in the same party's runoff, adversely voters who did not vote in a primary may choose to vote in either party's runoff.

Democratic runoff races in Tarrant County include lieutenant governor, attorney general, U.S. representative for District 24, state representative for District 97 and Tarrant County commissioner for Precinct 2. Republican runoff races include U.S. senator, attorney general, railroad commissioner, U.S. representative for District 30 and judge for the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals Place 3.

Election Day is Tuesday, May 26. Polls will be open throughout Tarrant County on Election Day, and voters may cast ballots at participating countywide polling locations.

Election officials remind voters that Texas law requires an approved form of photo identification to vote in person. Residents are encouraged to confirm their voter registration status, polling locations and sample ballots before heading to the polls.

The event is open to Benbrook residents only, and proof of residency will be required.

Accepted electronics include computers, printers, televisions (no CRT units), gaming systems, appliances and other household electronics. Hard drives will be destroyed during recycling.

On-site document shredding will be provided by Sierra Shred. Residents should bring only a reasonable household amount of paper and avoid including plastic items such as credit cards or CDs.

Entries Due June 7 for Texas Wildlife & Nature Photographer of the Year Contest

Time is running out to enter the Texas Wildlife & Nature Photographer of the Year contest. Photographers have until June 7 to submit their best work.

The contest is organized by Wildlife in Focus (WIF), a nonprofit conservation organization dedicated to preserve and protect native wildlife and their habitats in Texas. This is the first year WIF has offered a statewide competition.

“Our mission has always been to use photography as a bridge to conservation,” said Miles Phillips, Photo Contest Director for Wildlife in Focus. “This new Photographer of the Year contest invites every Texan to tell the story of our state’s wildlife, from prairies and pineywoods to deserts and coastlines. When people pause to photograph the natural world, they begin to value it. And when they value it, they help protect it.”

The contest is open to all Texans, from seasoned photographers with professional equipment to backyard birdwatchers and young nature lovers capturing moments on a phone camera. With more than \$3,000 in cash prizes and recognition on a statewide stage, the competition aims to highlight both artistic excellence and ethical wildlife photography.

The submission window closes June 7, 2026. All entries must be photographed in Texas. The competition features both Adult and Youth divisions, with categories including:

- Birds of Texas
- Mammals of Texas
- Animal Behavior
- Texas Wildscapes

Adult category winners will receive \$500 each, with an additional \$500 grand prize awarded to the Overall Texas Wildlife & Nature Photographer of the Year. Youth winners will receive \$100 awards, and Highly Commended entries in both divisions will be recognized.

Youth entries (17 and under) are free to submit, while adult entries are \$10 per image. No preregistration is required.

All images must depict wild, free-ranging wildlife photographed ethically and truthfully in natural conditions. Wildlife in Focus maintains strict ethical guidelines

prohibiting harassment, baiting, or digital manipulation that alters reality.

An awards event will be held later this year at the Witte Museum in San Antonio. Winning images may be featured in Wildlife in Focus publications, exhibitions, and educational programming, helping inspire the next generation of conservationists.
