Nov. 5, 2024 General Election. The filing period for the Nov. 5, 2024 General Election ended on Aug. 23. # NCT9-1-1 Educates About Accidentally Dialing 9-1-1

Accidental 9-1-1 calls happen more often than you might think. Whether it's a toddler playing with your phone, an unintended pocket dial, or a technical glitch, these calls can easily occur.

While it's understandable to feel embarrassed or worried, the best thing you can do is not hang up. Staying on the line and explaining the situation is crucial for ensuring that emergency services can focus on real emergencies.

When you hang up after an accidental call, the 9-1-1 call taker is obligated to call you back to ensure there isn't an emergency.

If they can't reach you, they might dispatch emergency services to your location to make sure everything is okay, which can divert valuable resources from real emergencies and cause unnecessary stress for everyone involved. Staying on the line allows the 9-1-1 call taker to quickly ascertain that there is no emergency and ensures the efficiency of the system.

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Marietta F. Winfrey

Marietta F. Winfrey passed away on Aug. 28, 2024, in Lawrence, Kansas.

Memorial services for Marietta will be held at the Lawrence First Church of the Nazarene (1470 N 1000 Road) on Friday, Oct. 4, 2024, at 2 p.m.



Marietta was born to Louis and Phyllis Fergerson in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, on Dec. 11, 1948. Marietta married John Winfrey in Fort Worth, Texas, on July 19, 1969. Marietta and John had known each other all their lives, having attended kindergarten together in Texas. Marietta was a loving and good wife and mother who supported John in his teaching and many careers, beginning in Kitzingen, Germany, where John served in the U.S. Army as a young officer. It was there Marietta gave birth to her first two children. After Germany, John became a public School teacher in Texas for 8 years. From there, they moved to Ada, Oklahoma, where John worked for Army ROTC at East Central Oklahoma State University. The next move took them to St. Louis, Missouri, where John worked in the U.S. Army Records Center. Then, finally, in the summer of 1987, the family moved to Lawrence, Kansas, where John worked in Army ROTC at the University of Kansas before they put down root for good.

In 1989, Marietta and her good friend Deb Danielson established the Little Lambs Daycare in the Indian Hills Neighborhood of Lawrence. For 18 years Little Lambs provided quality and professional home day care for many Lawrence children. In 2006, Marietta closed her business before spending the next 5 years working for Childcare Aware, a non-profit organization dedicated to helping Kansas families find solutions for their childcare needs, connecting families and expecting mothers with helpful information and community resources, and assisting early learning programs.

Marietta, a woman of deep faith, was a member of Cornerstone Baptist Church for over 20 years and, in 2011, became a member of First Church of the Nazarene (both of Lawrence, KS). Through emotional and spiritual coaching over the years, Marietta has influenced and impacted many people, especially young people. Though shy as a young woman, Marietta became quite vocal about social and personal freedoms, individual rights, and equality, and she was unafraid to speak up about what she believed in when she thought it was right.

Upon her retirement in 2010, Marietta and John hit the road crisscrossing the United States in their RV. Marietta loved the ocean and the Rocky Mountains. She and John stayed frequently at Jamaica Beach and Port Aransas, Texas, and Golden Gate Canyon State Park in Colorado, where she and John stayed 29 different times between 1978 and 2018.

Sadly, over the last few years, Marietta dealt with various illnesses but showed courage and bravery throughout. Above all else, Marietta was deeply devoted to her family. She passed peacefully in her home with her loving husband and children at her side. Just as she wanted. She was a wonderful wife, mother, friend, mentor, and caregiver to so many. She will not be forgotten.

Marietta is survived by her husband of 56 years, John; five children, Jennifer (Carlo Washington) Younger, Bryan (Lori) Winfrey, Shannon (Freddie) Hammonds, Kristen (Drew) Woods, and Jeremy Winfrey; ten grandchildren, Shelby Winfrey, Jaiden Younger, Breckin Younger, Saylor Winfrey, Kalli Winfrey, Bailey Hammonds, Shayne Hammonds, Elijah Chaffin, Rose Naramore-Winfrey, and Sophia Naramore-Winfrey; and her brother, Stephen (Marianela) Furgerson.

Benbrook will host Diamond Hill-Jarvis at 6 p.m. tomorrow night in it's district opener, and Davies said she believes the nondistrict schedule has her team ready for the district season.

"Every year, we intentionally schedule a tough pre-season with a mixture of 5 and 6A teams and back-to-back play to help prepare and get us ready for district," Davies said. "I believe nothing gets you ready faster than trial by fire. Knowing we were in a big rebuild going into district, and not knowing what all the schools are returning, receiving or even a new school added to the district, we like to just prepare for any and everything. I think the girls know the expectations, both by the community and by the program itself, and I feel that they are prepared and ready to do what it takes to maintain the tradition."



### The One and Only, Gene Autry



He was called "America's Favorite Cowboy" and the "Singing Cowboy." Though he was not the first western star of either movies or music, Texas native Gene Autry became a favorite across the nation from the 1930s through the 1950s. He became so popular that a host of communities across North Texas and southern Oklahoma scrambled to proclaim themselves his hometown. Autry's heartwarming songs and movies became a staple for generations of Americans and helped craft the image of how Americans see the Old West.

Orvon Grover Autry was born outside Tioga in Grayson County in 1907. His grandfather was a Methodist preacher, and his parents were ranchers. They would all have a profound impact on his outlook on life. The family moved several times, eventually ending up owning a ranch in southern Oklahoma.

He graduated high school in 1925 and took a job as a telegraph operator. He had an opportunity to play minor league baseball, but he declined and took up music instead. He often practiced guitar and singing while manning his telegraph station late at night, a move that eventually cost him his job. In 1928, he traveled to New York to audition for a record label. He failed. He returned to

Tulsa radio station. By the next year, Columbia Records signed him to a contract.

Autry recorded 640 songs and wrote more than 300. Ultimately, more than 100 million copies of his albums were sold. He appeared in his first movie, "In Old Santa ninety films, usually portraying a lighthearted singing cowboy.

From 1936 to 1942, he was the top western actor in the country. Autry co-wrote "Back in the Saddle Again" with Ray Whitand Autry performed it for the rest of his career. This followed with a popular radio program, Gene Autry's Melody Ranch, which ran from 1940 to 1943 and from 1945 to 1956.

He was nominated for an Academy 1941 melody "Ridin' on a Rainbow" from the film of the same name.

Oklahoma, renamed itself Gene Autry in honor of the star who had spent some of his formative years in nearby communities. Autry performed his radio show for the community at the dedication in appreciation for the honor.

Autry prided himself on his patriotism. In around the world. 1942, during World War II, and at the height of his fame, Autry decided he needed to do his part for his country at war. He enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Force, eventually becoming a C-109 transport pilot. He rose to the rank of tech sergeant and flew many difficult missions through the Himalayas to deliver supplies to allied Chinese troops fighting Japan.

As World War II came to a close, he began recording a string of his most iconic songs, popular decades later. In 1945, he released "Don't Fence Me In" and released "Here Comes Santa Claus" in 1948. One of his most popular songs was his rendition of "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer." Autry initially declined to record it, but his wife convinced him otherwise, believing that children would enjoy it. The song shot up to the top position on the charts for the 1949 Christ-

Oklahoma and picked up a job singing on a mas season. His Christmas songs were so popular that they are inescapable part of the season even decades later.

In 1950, his radio show was adapted to TV as *The Gene Autry Show*, which ran until 1956 on CBS. After the early 1960s, he largely retired from performing to concen-Fe," in 1934. He would appear in more than trate on his business interests. He owned several radio stations and bred horses for rodeos. In 1963, he bought Los Angeles television station KTLA for \$12 million. He sold it for \$245 million in 1982.

In 1961, he became owner of the Los Anley in 1939. It immediately became a hit, geles Angels as Major League Baseball expanded to the West Coast. The team won the division three times but never won the World Series while Autry owned the team. "Win one for the cowboy!" became a popular rallying cry for Angels fans for years.

He released his autobiography, "Back in Award in 1942 for Best Original Song for the the Saddle Again," in 1976. 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
