Tarrant County Experiences Increase in West Nile Activity

has observed a significant increase in West Control Nile virus (WNV) activity for the 2024 season, which runs from April to November.

In the current 2024 mosquito season, there are 28 human West Nile Disease cases with 24 hospitalized and one death reported. have tested positive for WNV. Comparatively, the 2023 season ended with 12 samples.

Tips For Avoiding Credit Card Skimmers

The Texas Financial Crimes Intelligence Center (FCIC) and the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation (TDLR) have released a new public service announcement with helpful tips for avoiding possible credit card skimmers in gas pumps.

The video on TDLR's YouTube channel discusses how thieves sometimes attach credit card skimmers on gas pumps to steal payment card information from customers when they purchase fuel.

Most skimmers have been placed deep inside the cabinet and it won't be obvious that something's wrong, but there are still some things consumers can check for before using a credit card at a gas station:

- Look at the pump and cabinet does it look damaged, or look like it's been tampered with?
 - Wiggle the card slot is it loose?
- Look at the keypad is it loose or does it look like something has been placed on top of it?

Additional ways consumers can protect themselves:

Always use a credit card, not a debit card, if they're not going to pay cash – this protects the PIN and prevents access to a bank account.

Set card usage or transaction alerts for bank and credit card accounts. Most major banks offer apps that allow real-time monitoring of accounts.

Regularly monitor credit card and bank statements for fraudulent charges or suspicious transactions.

When possible, don't swipe the credit card – use tap to pay or use a trusted payment app on a mobile phone to pay for fuel.

Whether a credit card skimmer is found by a consumer, a service technician or a merchant, the merchant is responsible for immediately notifying law enforcement and disabling all dispensers where skimmers have been located until law enforcement or TDLR investigators can remove the device. Merchants also are required by state law to notify TDLR within 24 hours.

Merchants and consumers should report skimmers via the TDLR website: https://www.tdlr.texas.gov/Skimmers.

The FCIC, which coordinates law enforcement investigations into organized financial fraud, was the first statewide unit of its kind in the United States and operates as a partnership between TDLR and the Smith County District Attorney's Office.

TDLR regulates motor fuel metering and quality and collects consumer complaints and merchant reports related to credit card skimmers. The Smith County DA aggressively investigates and prosecutes criminals engaging in organized financial crimes such as fraud related to gasoline pump skimmers.

About TDLR

TDLR provides regulatory oversight for a broad range of occupations, businesses, facilities, and equipment in Texas. The agency protects the health and safety of Texans by ensuring they are served by qualified, licensed professionals. Inspections of individuals, businesses, and equipment are done on a regular basis to safeguard the public. Currently, the agency regulates 38 business and occupational licensing programs with almost 1,000,000 licensees across the state.

Regional Transportation Council Discusses High-Speed Rail Route that Would Get Project Back on Track

The Regional Transportation Council (RTC) is considering an alternative path for high-speed rail into Dallas that would divert the last mile of the project west of downtown before continuing to the approved Dallas high-speed rail station, past the southern edge of downtown in the Cedars.

RTC members discussed the alternative, offered by North Central Texas Council of Governments staff members, during a work session in July.

The RTC heard further details of the plan during the Aug.8 meeting at the Irving Convention Center, as part of the Infrastructure Summit 2024.

NCTCOG is involved in a National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) review of the proposed Fort Worth-to-Dallas high-speed rail project, which would also include a station in Arlington.

The route could be environmentally cleared as early as March 2025.

While this western concept being discussed avoids an area of downtown Dallas with great potential for economic development, it loses the opportunity to connect passengers of high-speed rail to and from Houston with the Eddie Bernice Johnson Union Station, the new Kay Bailey Hutchison Convention Center and other nearby destinations, as the downtown alignment could have provided.

The new option being discussed would still connect to the approved Dallas high-speed rail station with planned service to Houston, allowing passengers to board the train in Fort Worth or Arlington and reach Houston without having to change trains, in accordance with the RTC's "one-seat ride" policy.



American Inventor and Manufacturing Pioneer, Gail Borden



Success is never a straight line. Gail Borden's story is how an Indiana farmboy with almost no formal schooling went from being a Texas revolutionary and editor to a celebrated inventor and wildly successful New York factory owner. The calm and curious man nurtured not only revolution in Texas but a revolution in the food industry.

Gail Borden II was born in Norwich, a remote farming community in southern New York in 1801. As did many farmers and pioneers of the time, the family set out often in pursuit of greener pastures a number of times. The family settled for a short time in Kentucky before moving to Indiana. He had little formal education, save for a few courses in 1816 and 1817, to learn surveying. Many details of his youth are incomplete, but it is apparent that he was very intelligent and very principled.

He and his brother served in the Indiana Militia for a time. In 1822, he was part of a group that saved a freed slave from being lynched. Afterward, with little formal education, Borden was able to land a job as a school teacher in Mississippi. He later also became county surveyor and a deputy federal surveyor. By 1828, he married and started a family.

By 1829, his brother, Thomas Borden, also a surveyor, had moved to Texas and enticed his brother and his family to try their
