Community Invited to Cisd Camp Carter Athletic Complex Dedication Ceremony March 28



The Castleberry Independent School District invites the community to the dedication ceremony for the newly renovated Cisd/Camp Carter Athletic Complex on Tuesday, March 28 at 6:30 p.m. The facility is located at 5800 Meandering Way in River Oaks. Varsity softball and baseball games will follow the ceremony.

The original complex was built in 1997 to meet the needs of the Castleberry High School baseball and softball teams. The original complex had a seating capacity of approximately 420 (baseball) and 290 (softball). With the recent renovations, seating capacities have increased to 508 (baseball) and 491 (softball).

The renovation includes new field turf, dugouts, outfield and perimeter fencing, covered batting cages, bullpens, bleachers, press boxes, and sound systems. The district also renovated the main building (ticket booth, conces-

Castleberry Soccer Teams Qualify for Bi-District Playoffs Friday

Both Castleberry High School Varsity soccer teams have qualified to participate in the UIL Bi-District Soccer Playoffs against Benbrook on Friday, March 24 at FWISD's Farrington Field located at 1501 University Drive, Fort Worth, TX 76107.

Varsity Girls will play at 6 p.m. and Varsity Boys will play at 8 p.m. One ticket allows spectators to watch both games and can only be purchased online. Cash will not be accepted at the gate.

FWISD has a clear bag policy that all spectators should be aware of. Approved items include: 12"x6"x12" clear totes, one-gallon plastic storage bags, 16"x13" clear and mesh drawstring bags, 4.5"x6.5" small clutch bags or crossbody. Not Approved items include: oversized tote bags, solid tote bags, backpacks (solid or clear), diaper bags or purses, solid drawstring bags, cooler bags, hydration pack, waist belt bags (solid or clear).

Spectators are encouraged to park in the Billingsley parking lot and enter and sit on the visitor's side.

construction firm is Paragon Sports Contrac-

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Disposal Opportunity for Discarded Tires

Discarded tires laying around in the yard is an opportunity for mosquitos to breed. Put those old, discarded tires out at the street curb each week on Wednesday and the city will pick them up and get rid of them for no charge to you.

This offer is good until April 30, so take advantage of the special free collection service while it lasts.

Please limit the number of tires to be discarded at any one time to no more than four used/discarded tires. Where there are more than four tires, contact the Public Works Department to schedule a special pickup at 817-626-5421, ext. 332.

Otherwise, Citizens can call for pickup or else public works will pick up tires when placed on curb.

This service is for residential customers only. The City will not collect tires disposed of from businesses since commercial collection is under contract with a commercial waste hauler.

American Railroad Magnate - Jay Gould *by Dr. Ken Bridges*

The late 1800s was the age of the railroad. Trains steamed across the hills, valleys, and plains of a growing United States, steadily bringing distant communities closer together. Thousands of miles of track were laid down by thousands of men to build a rail network that brought people and goods from one end of the country to the other. One of the most important figures in Texas railroad development was business titan Jay Gould.



Born **Jason Gould** in Roxbury, New York, into a farming family in 1836, he grew to hate farming. As a result, his father, John Burr Gould, reportedly left him at a boarding school with 50 cents and a few changes of clothes. Gould, however, was a quick study with an aptitude for math. As a young man, he found work as an accountant and as a surveyor.

By 1859, he started investing heavily in railroads. After the Civil War, he concentrated on New York-area railways, earning impressive profits and steadily gaining more influence in the railroad industry. The Civil War had delayed railroad construction in the South, and Gould became determined to expand his holdings in the region, ultimately building lines from Missouri to Texas and west to Colorado. He formed the Texas and Pacific Railroad by an agreement with the state legislature in 1871. By 1873, he gained control of the powerful Erie Railway and the Union Pacific Railroad, taking advantage of financial crises and scandals surrounding both companies. In 1879, he took control of the Missouri Pacific Railroad, giving him effective control of one-sixth of the nation's rails.

As Gould looked west of the Mississippi River, he quickly

moved to crush his rivals. Gould merged his many company interests and built hundreds of miles competing tracks across the region. The St. Louis Iron Mountain and Southern Railroad, in which Gould had heavily invested, had completed a line from St. Louis to the Texas border by this time. As the Texas and Pacific reached the Arkansas state line in 1873, he parceled out the land connected his railway with the Iron Mountain route and formed the city of Texarkana at the junction of the railroads and the state boundaries.

Gould would buy the St. Louis Iron Mountain and Southern Railroad in 1881 to more fully incorporate his Missouri Pacific network. Fort Worth would become an important terminus for his railroad as he pushed his railroad empire steadily westward. The Missouri Pacific would become a powerful force in locomotive passenger and freight traffic across the Southwest. In fact, "MoPac," an acronym for the railroad, is a heavily-traveled road in Austin and was named for the railway. By the 1890s, Gould's companies promised passengers train travel from Chicago, Illinois, to California, through Texas, in just three days.

He would be responsible for the names of several cities across the nation as his railroads rolled through. Gouldsboro, Pennsylvania, was renamed for him. Gould, Ohio, was named after one of his railroad depots in 1881. Paragould, in the northeast corner of Arkansas, was named for Gould and Texas and St. Louis Railroad owner and rival J. W. Paramore when the town was founded at the intersections of their two routes in 1882.

Gould was both admired and hated in his day. He had become incredibly successful in the railroad industry, but his labor policies sparked some of the largest labor strikes in Texas History.

For all of his accomplishments in building railroads, he did not live a long life to enjoy it. Gould died of tuberculosis in New York City in 1892. Though railroads have declined in relative importance since his day, the railroad magnate put Texas and America on the path to the 20th century.
