Student Athlete Spotlight: Lady Bear Brooklynn Morelock



The Brewer volleyball team finished with an overall record of 17-15-1 last season, won two more district games than the previous year and missed the playoffs by just one spot.

A part of the improvement the Bears enjoyed was due to the play of transfer student Brooklynn Morelock, affectionally dubbed “B-Mo” by her coaches and teammates.

Morelock moved in from Crowley last summer and ended up being the starting setter and selected to the all-district team at the end of the season.

“She was crucial to the success we had last season,” coach Jill Barkey said. “In addition to her skill, her personality and kindness, just the type of young woman she is, helped insurmountably with the culture we’re trying to create within our program.”

For Morelock, transferring to Brewer High School before the 2023-24 year turned out to be just the breath of fresh air she needed.

“This season was by far my favorite season, and I’m so happy with the way it turned out,” Morelock said. “The team chemistry was unmatched, and we always had fun.”

The incoming senior approached last year with the right attitude as well.

“My number one goal coming into the season as a newcomer to Brewer was to be a good teammate,” Morelock said. “I know that good teams have good chemistry, and I decided that my goal was to build trust with my teammates. I built a very strong connection with every player, and it led to always having fun on the court.”

And the Brewer senior knows how to have fun as well.

“My favorite memory this season was our ‘Coach Johnson’ practice,” Morelock said. “We all decided secretly to dress like her for practice and it was the funniest thing ever. If you know Tanya Johnson, then you know that she has a very unique style, so everyone putting together their own twists on the Coach Johnson look was hilarious. She had no idea we were doing that, so her face when she walked in and saw herself times 12 was priceless.”

Morelock said she did have one major hurdle to overcome earlier in her volleyball career, which changed the trajectory of her career once overcome.

“Being a freshman on varsity, it was hard for me to play with confidence because I was worried that I wasn’t playing up to the expectations that were held for me,” Morelock said. “Once I felt confident in my role on the team, I started to not only have fun, but my skill improved. I would say it plays a huge part in an athlete’s performance.”

Barkey said she wanted Morelock to be working on a faster tempo for Brewer’s offense during the off-season and said that the Brewer senior’s role for this year has already been determined.

“She’s going to be our go-to quarterback; running the show,” Barkey said. “Our district is tough. She will be critical to our offense.”

Texas History Minute, by Dr. Ken Bridges

19th Governor of Texas, Lawrence Sullivan “Sul” Ross



John Adams, the nation’s second president, once wrote, “I must study war and diplomacy so that my children may study math and science and that their children may study art and philosophy.” Thus is the story of **Lawrence Sullivan “Sul” Ross**, a man who beat the proverbial sword into a plowshare, leaving a lasting legacy on Texas government and education. Ross was a soldier, governor, and educator.

“Sul” Ross was born in the Iowa Territory in 1838. His family moved to Texas in 1839. His father, Shapley P. Ross, was an early settler of both Milam and McLennan counties and a Texas Ranger.

As a child, his father was often in battle against frontier Native American tribes. These experiences, coupled with the kidnapping of an uncle by one tribe, led Ross to develop a great deal of animosity against the tribes. When he came of age, he served with the army in raids on the Comanches, even briefly leaving college to fight. He graduated from Wesleyan College in Alabama in 1859 and joined the Texas Rangers in 1860, engaging in numerous battles against the tribes in the Young County area and northwest toward the Pease River.

He entered the Confederate army when the Civil War began. He became a colonel with the 6th Texas Cavalry and participated in the bloody Confederate losses at Pea

Ridge, Arkansas, and Corinth, Mississippi. In 1864, he was promoted to general, and at age 26, was one of the youngest in the Confederacy.

He returned to Texas in 1865 and rebounded from the war. He expanded his property holdings and was elected sheriff of McLennan County in 1873. As Reconstruction came to an end, he was elected as a delegate to the state constitutional convention that drafted the 1876 constitution the state still uses.

In 1880, he was drafted to run for state senate. The county Democratic convention could not agree between two candidates and chose Ross as a compromise. Ross reluctantly accepted and won in a landslide.

As early as 1884, newspapers began calling for Ross to run for governor. In 1886, he threw his hat into the ring and won the election with a resounding 73 percent of the vote. In 1888, he presided over the dedication of the new State Capitol building, rebuilt after its destruction in an 1881 fire. He pushed the legislature to fund a new state orphanage and a Confederate veterans nursing home. He ran a comfortable budget surplus for Texas.

Republicans did not nominate a candidate in 1888, and Ross was re-elected easily, defeating the Prohibition Party candidate.

As his term was winding down, he was chosen to be the third president of what is

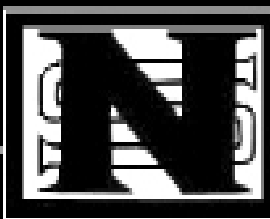
now Texas A&M University. The college had struggled since its founding in 1876. He raised student fees in order to construct a new cafeteria and a new dorm (named Ross Hall). He expanded the curriculum and began allowing women to attend the college (though only the daughters of professors). Enrollment rose dramatically and the school’s money problems soon vanished. The university band was formed and the first football teams were organized. Students also began publishing their own newspaper and yearbook under Ross.

In 1894, he was offered a seat on the Railroad Commission, but he declined in order to continue serving as president of the college. Ross was a popular figure on campus, and students developed a great deal of loyalty toward him. However, he died suddenly at the age of 59 in 1898. University students accompanied Ross’s body to Waco where the funeral was held.

In 1917, the state established Sul Ross State Normal College in Alpine in his memory. Nearly three thousand students attend what is now Sul Ross State University. Ross’s influence continued to be felt at Texas A&M. A street on campus was later named in his honor.

A statue of Ross was placed on the Texas A&M campus in 1918. Students to this day often place pennies at the feet of the statue for good luck on their exams.
