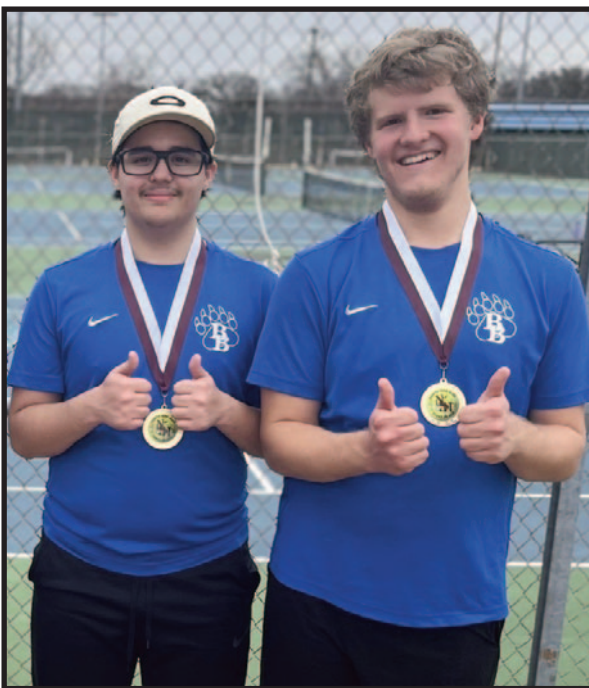

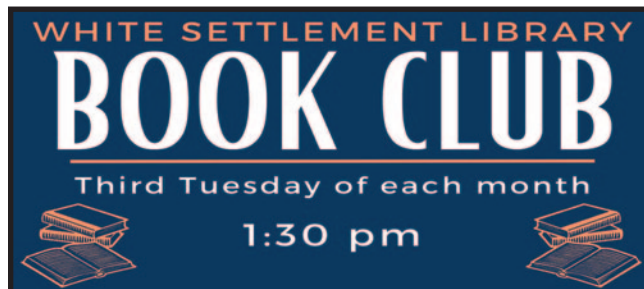

Eight Brewer Wrestlers Qualify for Regional Tournament



The Brewer wrestling team had a strong showing at last week's district meet, qualifying a total of eight wrestlers for the regional tournament.

Coach Sonny Feexico said he was proud of his team's effort and said his wrestlers represented the program well.

“This wrestling squad showed some true grit and competed hard in the district tournament,” Feexico said. “The boys finished sixth as a team and the girls finished seventh as a team. We didn't have a full squad on either side and ended up having eight out of possible 12 entered, and 10 out of 14 weights entered for the boys.

With their efforts we were able place six out of our eight girls in the top six at their respective weights and the boys finished with six top six places out of our 10 boys entered, as well. We knew the competition level was going to be high and the kids were prepared and responded well.”

Brewer had three girls qualify for regionals and one alternate.

“Daniela Estrada was our most consistent wrestler this season on the girl's side and she finished third,” Feexico said. “Lexi Tayfel finished fourth, and our biggest surprise on the girl's side was freshman Isabella Cristan finishing third and qualifying for regionals in her first year of wrestling and wrestling JV all season until this tournament. What made her advancement so special is that she was also a little under the weather this week, but came out and competed the best she could and finished third. Bridgett Rushing finished fifth and will go as an alternate. “

On the boys side, Caleb Cedeno Medoza (126) and Josue Cedeno Mendoza (144) both won district championships, and Jaleel Johnson finished second at 150.

Landon Gentry finished third at 132, and Kaleb Garza finished fourth at 120.

“I am very proud of the way the boys competed in this tournament,” Feexico said. “There were a lot of wrestlers we have not seen or competed against, so it made it a little difficult to understand the opponent's style of wrestling. I thought they responded well, made great adjustments, and wrestled a lot smarter than we have in the past. It will definitely be different at regionals, because there will be many wrestlers in our region we have not seen, so we will have to be more strategic in how we approach matches and learn how to take advantage of what our opponents give us. If we can do that and keep our confidence levels



up, we have a chance to be successful and qualify for state.”

On the court, the Brewer boy's basketball team defeated Azle by a score of 47-40, and coach Jason Porostovsky said two of his players competed especially well.

“Calvin Rweyemamu led us in scoring with 18 and Nash Pena chipped in 13,” Porostovsky said. “We had a standout defensive performance in the second by the whole team.”

The Bears moved to 8-2 in district competition with the victory, and Porostovsky said his team was still in a position to claim a district title following Friday's win.

“We have clinched a playoff spot and we have two games to go,” Porostovsky said. “We win both, we will be district champions. Not an easy task, but definitely possible.”

On the pitch, the Brewer girl's soccer team defeated Saginaw by a score of 4-2 on Friday and coach Nathan Hamilton he was impressed with how his team was able to adapt in the game.

“I thought our game was hard fought,” Hamilton said. “Saginaw is a well-coached team that battled hard. We are dealing with a few injuries and had to move players into positions they do not usually play. I thought our girls dealt with that adversity well and came away with the win. We showed a lot of grit and composure against Saginaw. This was a great overall team win.”

Hamilton said one player in particular had an exceptionally strong game.

“Daniela Estrada had 2 goals for us and drew a penalty that led to our third goal,” Hamilton said. “She has 7 district goals so far. She is a great offensive player and had another great performance.”

First Responders to Teach CPR Skills at Fort Worth Libraries

Thirteen Fort Worth Public Library locations will host hands-only CPR and AED training taught by Fort Worth Fire Department staff in February, which is American Heart Month.

The free classes are designed for teens and adults and are available on a first-come, first-served basis; no registration is required. Instruction is focused on hands-only CPR and AED use and is not a certification course.

“Knowing how to perform hands-only CPR and use life-saving tools like AEDs can make a difference in the critical minutes before first responders arrive,” said Fire Chief Jim Davis. “I’m proud we are offering this type of training to the public at no cost.”

According to the American Heart Association, immediate CPR is proven to double or triple the chances of survival after cardiac arrest. Timely and accurate AED use can also improve survival rates.

Application Deadline Feb. 14

The White Settlement ISD Board of Trustees consists of seven members elected to serve, without compensation, for overlapping terms of three years each. Elections are conducted annually in May. Following the election, the board elects a president, vice president, and secretary to serve for one-year terms.

Place 4 and Place 5 will be available in the May 2025 election.

The date for the 2025 school board election is Saturday, May 4. The application period for a place on the ballot for school trustee is Jan. 15 through Feb. 14.

Applications will be available at the WSISD Administration Building during regular office hours Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m., and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Friday, Feb. 14. The drawing for places on the ballot will be conducted in the Human Resource Office at 10 a.m. on Monday, Feb. 24.

The Election will be held at WSISD Administration Building, 8224 White Settlement Road, White Settlement, TX. 76108. Polling locations, dates, and times will be available on the county election website: [Tarrant County](#).

Comanche Chief Quanah Parker



Quanah Parker became a respected leader of the Comanche Nation at the end of the Plains Indian Wars. He spent much of his life caught between two worlds. He was the son of a white settler and a Comanche chief. And he had to lead his tribe in the difficult transition from their ancient traditions to life on the reservation.

His mother, Cynthia Ann Parker, was captured by Comanches at age nine in an 1836 raid on Fort Parker in Central Texas, just east of modern-day Waco. She became a full-fledged member of the tribe and fully assimilated into the culture. She married Peta Nocona, the chief of the Kwahadi band of Comanches. The community of Nocona was later named for him. Quanah Parker was born probably in 1845 in the Wichita Mountains of southern Oklahoma, though other dates have been offered and even locations as distant as East Texas as the site of his birth.

Parker grew up with Comanche traditions on the Llano Estacado, moving along sites across the Texas Panhandle and into New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Kansas. In 1860, his

mother and sister were captured in a clash with Texas Rangers at the Battle of Pease River in Foard County and died within a few years. Though Comanche tradition encouraged tribe members to change their birth names once they reached adulthood, Parker kept his birth name as a reminder of his mother.

In 1868, the federal government attempted to make peace with the tribes of the southern plains and bring them onto reservations. Many tribes signed, but Parker refused. The army sent cavalry units after the Comanches, but the tribe always managed to stay a step ahead. Parker would even raid cavalry camps, steal army horses, and disappear. By 1872, the army gave up its search. In 1874, the army restarted its search for the Comanches and waged intense battles against them.

At the end of the Red River War in 1875, Parker had to face the terrible reality. The U. S. Army had killed 1,500 of their horses at the Battle of Palo Duro Canyon, and the buffalo that the Comanches and other tribes relied upon had been hunted nearly to extinction. With their maneuverability and military strength greatly reduced and with food becoming scarce, Parker had no choice but to surrender his band of Comanches to the army, becoming the last tribe on the southern plains to surrender. They were taken to the combined Kiowa-Apache-Comanche reservation in the Southwest Indian Territory, or what is now Oklahoma.

Though he was chief of his own band of Kwahadi Comanches, the federal government made him principal chief of all Comanches though the tribe had not selected him for the position. Nevertheless, he spoke out repeatedly to defend Comanche needs, their rights, and their traditions. He tried to make the Comanches self-sufficient on the reservations and encouraged the construction of schools on the reservations that emphasized their cultural heritage. There was tremendous pressures to open reservation lands to white settlers and to lease the lands for grazing rights, but Parker resisted. By the 1880s, after years of discussions and negotiations, he entered into a contract with North

Texas cattle barons Charles Goodnight and Samuel Burk Burnett to allow their cattle to graze on one million acres of their reservation lands for a fee. The contract stayed in place until 1902, and the grazing fees became a steady source of income for the tribes. Parker himself also made the transition to becoming a successful rancher himself, and with investments in railroads became perhaps the wealthiest Native American in the country.

Parker earned a great deal of respect among white settlers in his later years. In 1884, the city of Quanah, the county seat of Hardeman County, was founded and named after Parker. He even appeared at a dedication ceremony, offering a benediction to bless the community, saying, "May the Great Spirit smile upon your little town." He met regularly with many powerful politicians, including President Theodore Roosevelt. In 1902, he was named Deputy Sheriff for Lawton.

At a time when federal and state officials were trying to end tribal religious practices in favor of Christianity, Parker maintained his steadfast support for his ancient traditions. He became a co-founder and leader of what became known as the Native American Church, sometimes called Peyotism, which was a combination of different tribal traditions culmination in the belief that the world was controlled by the creator, or "Great Spirit," and emphasized care for others, forgiveness, and unity. Peyote is commonly used as a medicine and for spiritual visions. In 1907, he defended the use of peyote in religious ceremonies at a committee meeting of the Oklahoma state legislature, declaring, "I do not think this legislature should interfere with a man's religion." One of his sons, however, would become a noted Methodist minister.

Parker continued to give interviews and travel to other reservations.

He died at his home in Cache in 1911. He was buried next to his mother. The reservation government was reorganized after his death, replacing chief with the position of chairman, making Quanah Parker at the time the last chief of the Comanches.
