## Bears & Lady Bears to Take on Bearcats Tomorrow

The Brewer boys basketball team continued their winning ways this past week, claiming the consolation champions in the Fort Worth ISD Tournament.

The Bears went 3-1 in tournament play, losing their opening game in overtime to Eastern Hills by a score of 48-45.

Coach Jason Porostovsky said, "I thought the first-round game was actually the championship game going into the tournament...and that proved to be the case."

Javier Espino was named to the all-tournament team, and Julian Perez led the Bears in scoring over the course of the four-game tourney.

"Warren King and Carron Gibson both provided some scoring punch as well throughout," Porostovsky said.

Brewer will play Aledo tomorrow night, and Porostovsky said his team is ready to resume district competition.

"District play continues now for us as we already played one before the break," Porostovsky said. "Our district teams are very competitive with each team having won some significant games through their portions of the season. Every game in the district will be tough. No easy ones this year."

The Bears improved to 18-3 on the season and were ranked No. 17 in the state among 5A programs according to Max Preps most recent poll on Dec. 29.

Porostovsky said his players and coaches are optimistic about what they can accomplish in 2023.

"The team is excited about the opportunity we have this year," Porostovsky said. "They know how good they can be when they are focused and play our style. They believe in themselves and each other so this should be a fun ride into the new year."

Cheer on the Bears at Aledo Jan. 6 at 8 p.m.

On the girls side, the Lady Bears also had a good weekend, going 4-0 in the Weatherford tournament.

Brewer defeated Richland, Abilene Wylie, Arlington Martin and Pottsboro along the way and improved to 17-3 overall on the season.

The Lady Bears were ranked 13th among 5A teams in the most recent Max Preps poll and will travel to Aledo at 6:15 tomorrow evening for their next district game.

## Bulk Trash Pick-Up Begins Jan. 9

White Settlement residents may begin to set items out for bulk trash pick up on the Friday before the second full week of the month.

Residents should make sure the trash pile follows the guidelines so that it will be picked up:

- Make sure your items are placed clear of low-hanging limbs and wires, mailboxes, parked cars, or other obstructions.
- The total size of pile/area allowed is 10 cubic yards (8 feet long by 6 feet wide by 6 feet tall) or roughly the size of a Volkswagen Beetle.
- No items generated from other locations, hazardous materials, tires, electronics, appliances with coolant or gas.

The pile must be placed at an address with an active water account to be picked up and bulk piles are picked up by a truck utilizing a hydraulic claw.

# Jury Services: Reporting for Jury Duty

Jury service plays a vital role in sustaining the American system of justice.

## Why was my name drawn for jury service?

The Texas Legislature is responsible for all laws pertaining to jury service. Every other year the Secretary of State receives the Tarrant County voters list, the driver's license and identification card lists from the Department of Public Safety. The Secretary of State then combines these lists and sends Tarrant County their jury list for the upcoming two years. The Tarrant County jury list begins in January of the even years and ends the last week of December in the odd years. Currently, there are over one million names on our jury list and we mail over 200,000 summons annually. The reason some people never receive a summons is because we are not able to exhaust the list before the end of the two-year cycle.

However, it is now easier than ever to report for jury service. Gone are the days of reporting to the Central Jury Room and waiting all day to see if the courts would need a jury. Now you have a choice. You can report in person as summoned to the Central Jury Room. Or, you can use our online system, [eResponse](#). As long as you register online at least two business days in advance and confirm your status; we will email your jury service instructions. The date you are summoned to appear will not change. If you receive an online assignment, your time and place will change. By using eResponse, you will be sent an email with instructions regarding your jury service which generally, allows you to bypass the Central Jury Room.

## E-Response Online Services Requirements:

- Must have daily email access
  - Must have telephone number
  - Sign into eResponse using your candidate number and date of birth from the summons.
  - Check your email daily
    - You will receive an email to verify your email address.
    - Add juryroom@tarrantcounty.com as safe sender to avoid emails going to the Junk Folder (especially if you are a gmail or yahoo user.)
    - Generally all email notifications are sent out by 5 p.m.
    - Read all emails, remembering to scroll down to read entire email. Follow instructions in the emails.
  - Complete two questionnaires:
    1. Qualification questionnaire will determine qualifications along with verification for legal excuses. Read each question thoroughly.
    2. Court specific questionnaire - accessed through email when notified of court assignment -- requires some duplicate information.
- If no email is received from Tarrant County Jury Services, then appear at the date and time listed on the summons.

## The Selection Process

When you arrive at the Central Jury Room in the Tim Curry

Justice Center, you will check in and be assigned to a court. The courts are primarily in the downtown area. The courts adhere to a strict appearance policy. Appropriate dress for your court assignment should be whatever you would wear to a job interview: no shorts or inappropriate t-shirts and tank tops.

There are two basic types of cases, criminal and civil (including family cases). A criminal case results when a person is accused of committing a crime. You, as a juror, must decide whether the person charged is guilty or not guilty. The accused person is presumed innocent, and the state, represented by the district attorney, must prove guilt "beyond a reasonable doubt." A civil case results from a disagreement or dispute between two or more parties. In a civil case, you, as a juror, must answer questions of disputed facts based upon the testimony and evidence admitted by the judge. The answers to these questions are called the verdict.

Cases will usually be heard by juries of six or 12 jurors (six in county courts and 12 in district courts). A larger group, called a panel, will be sent to the trial courtroom. When you arrive at your court, the bailiff there will instruct you.

Jurors will be questioned by each of the lawyers under the supervision of the judge. This interview process is called voir dire. The voir dire is a way for the parties to select an impartial jury. You may be questioned individually or as a group to determine selection of the jury. For example, the lawyer may ask you questions to see if you are connected to the trial or if you have any prejudice or bias toward anyone in the trial.

The questions of the attorneys and judge are not intended to embarrass you, but rather to help the lawyers in the jury selection process. You may ask the judge to allow you to answer some questions away from the other jurors. A juror may be excused from the panel if it is shown that the juror cannot act impartially concerning the case to be heard. In addition, each side is allowed to remove a given number of jurors from the panel without having to show any reason.

The trial jury will be the first six or 12 of the remaining jurors on the panel. After the voir dire, the selection of jurors will be announced and the remainder of the panel will be returned to the central jury room. If you have a special need or an emergency after you have been selected as a juror on a trial panel, tell the bailiff in the courtroom.

Should the parties to a suit unexpectedly reach a settlement or agree to a plea, the bailiff will announce this to the panel and instruct you to return to the jury room for further instructions. A settlement or plea does not mean a juror's time has been unproductive.

**NOTE:** You may be asked to complete a questionnaire either in the central jury room or after you arrive in the court. The information on these forms is used by the attorneys for both sides during the voir dire process to expedite the jury selection. The oath has been administered to you, therefore you are still under oath when you answer these questions.



# Here's to a New Year - 2023 *by Dr. Ken Bridges*

Once Christmas has passed, the world looks to a new year. Many wonder what the new year will bring. It will be a year marked with war in some nations and peace in others. There will be triumph, and there will be heartbreak. But in the meantime, the world pauses to celebrate the end of one year and the hopes for the next.

In New York City, the famous dropping of the Times Square Ball marks the new year. It is a tradition dating back to New Year's Eve 1904 when Adolph Ochs, then owner of *The New York Times*, devised it as a way of celebrating the new year by having the glass ball lowered on the roof of his newspaper building. The modern ball, its fifth incarnation, is glass, six feet in diameter, and weighs more than 1,200 pounds. It was manufactured by Waterford Crystal and has more than 9,500 LED lights illuminating it. It is the most popular new year's observance in the United States.

Observances of the new year date back thousands of years as ancient peoples recognized the regular shifting patterns of stars at night and the sun in the day and their connection to particular seasons. The earliest observances of Jan. 1 for the beginning of the year began with the Romans around 713 BC. The Romans named the first month of their lunar calendar year January after the Roman god Janus, who supposedly was the god of time and also the god of beginnings and transitions. According to legend, Janus had two faces, one looking into the past and the other looking into the future. It was a day marked with great celebrations.

The tradition of Rosh Hashanah marks the tradition of the Jewish new year, which means "head of the year" in Hebrew, a tradition dating back to the Old Testament. This holiday is not observed in January but sometime in September or October, depending on the lunar calendar. The two-day celebration includes many symbolic foods, including apples dipped in honey to mark a sweet new year. It is a national holiday only in Israel and Ukraine. In 2023, it will begin at sunset on Sep. 15 and run through Sept. 17.

In most countries throughout the world, Jan. 1 is an official holiday to mark the beginning of the new year. Even many non-western countries will observe Jan. 1 as New Year's Day because of the overwhelming influence of European and American business and culture for the past few centuries as they ultimately adopted the modern Gregorian calendar used throughout the West, even in officially atheist nations like China.

The Chinese New Year will not start until Jan. 22. Under the Chinese Zodiac system dating back many centuries, 2023 marks the Year of the Rabbit. In China, the rabbit is associated with luck, so the Year of the Rabbit is usually considered a lucky year. In China, fireworks are set off to mark the new year and to also scare

off demons and forces of darkness.

Similarly, Jan. 22 will mark the traditional Vietnamese New Year, known as Tet. The Vietnamese lunar calendar is very similar to the Chinese calendar. The Vietnamese Zodiac, however, makes the cat a symbol of 2023 instead of the rabbit but similarly considered to be lucky. By tradition, a great feast is prepared, family reunions are held, and many celebrations are held in cities across the country. Many in Vietnam see Tet as the beginning of spring as well. Cleaning the home is also part of the traditional observances to symbolically clean out the bad spirits from the previous year.

Different types of food are also associated with the New Year's celebrations. In India, rice is eaten for prosperity in the new year. Buttered bread is supposed to be good luck in Ireland. In Spain, people traditionally eat 12 grapes at midnight, one at each chime, to bring luck for the year. In the American South, black-eyed peas are eaten for good luck for the new year. Leafy green vegetables like collard greens are supposed to symbolize prosperity.

In some cultures, it is also customary to exchange gifts on New Year's Day. In Ancient Persia, eggs were given as symbols of fertility in the new year. When observances of Christmas and religion were outlawed in the Soviet Union, Russians responded by shifting gift-giving from Christmas to New Year's Day.

In Scotland, gifts of silverware or pastries are traditionally given for luck. In the Philippines, Christmas and New Year's Day celebrations are often combined.

There are many other superstitions for luck surrounding celebrations. In France, the weather on New Year's Day is supposed to be an omen for the year's weather. Brazilians wear white for good luck while households in Puerto Rico sprinkle sugar outside their homes to invite good fortune inside. In Scotland, the first person to enter the home in the new year is also supposed to symbolize a person's luck for the year.

To this day, New Year's Day is still a time to reflect on the past and look forward to the days ahead. What 2023 and the years beyond hold is as yet a mystery. But as Winston Churchill once said, "The further in the past we look, the farther ahead we can see."
