City Council Candidate Filing Period Begins July 22

The City of White Settlement General Election is scheduled for Tuesday, Nov. 5, to elect members of the Council for the places of Place 4 and Place 5.

For candidacy filing purposes, the location of the main administrative office for the next General Election is:

The White Settlement Public Library, located at 8215 White Settlement Road, White Settlement, Texas 76108, will serve as an Early Voting and Election Day vote center.

Filing dates for Application for Place on Ballot are July 22, 2024 through Aug. 19, 2024. There is a \$30 filing fee for candidates filing for Places 4 and 5.

A candidate may also file a petition in lieu of a filing fee.

Filing fees may be paid by cash, check or credit card payable to the City of White Settlement.

Candidates must submit Form CTA to the Office of the City Secretary prior paying a filing fee. The filing fee is due at the time the application for place on the ballot is submitted.

The City Secretary Office is not required to be open on weekends for the purpose of candidate filings.

An application filed prior to July 22, 2024 is void. Applications should be sub-

mitted timely to allow for review of requirements. All fields must be completed unless specifically marked optional.

Pursuant to Texas Election Code section 141.001 and Article III, section 3 of the City of White Settlement Charter, to be eligible for public elective office, a candidate for City elective office:

- Be a United States Citizen.
- Be a resident of the City of White Settlement and the State of Texas and shall have been a resident of White Settlement for a period of not less than 12 months immediately preceding the election date.
- Be a qualified voter of the State of Texas and Tarrant County
- Shall be 18 years of age or older on the first day of the term to be filled at the election or on the date of appointment, as applicable.
- Shall not have been determined to be mentally incompetent by a final judgment of a court.
- Shall not have been finally convicted of a felony for which the person has not been pardoned or otherwise released from the resulting disabilities.

Community Cleanup July 20 & 21

The Frontier Waste July Community Clean Up Event will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday, July 20 and from 8 a.m. to noon on Sunday, July 21, as dumpster space allows. Sunday hours are being reduced due to the overwhelming response of resident participation at the clean up events.

This is a great opportunity for residents to dispose of limbs, brush, and bulk items at the corner of Meadow Park Drive and East Melrose.

Items such as appliances and/or hazardous waste will not be accepted.

Remember, this is a Frontier Waste Services collection event and is for residential bulk items only (not for commercial or contractor use).

Residents must bring a driver's license and the latest City of White Settlement residential water bill to use this service.

Each resident is allowed one drop-off per monthly cleanup event.

Anything dropped off outside of the posted operation hours is considered illegal dumping.

Due to the high level of bulk drop-off, the event will close early if the dumpsters reach maximum capacity before the posted hours.

Bus Rider Registration Deadline Aug. 11



Families with students who will ride the bus must complete the Bus Rider Registration Form no later than Aug. 11.

WSISD provides bus transportation to students who live two or more miles from their home campus as required by the state. The two or more miles measured is the shortest distance on public roads between the campus and student residence.

Students who submit a Bus Rider Registration Form after Aug. 11 will not be eligible to ride the bus until Sept. 4.

This will enable our drivers to prepare for the upcoming school year. After completing the Bus Rider Registration Form, the Transportation Department will make contact by phone or email to confirm bus stop and pick up times within three to five days.

Students will be required to ride the bus they're assigned.

From Texas Comptroller's Office

Plan for the Texas Sales Tax Holiday Aug. 9-11



The Comptroller encourages all taxpayers to support Texas businesses while saving money on tax-free purchases of most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks (sold for less than \$100) during the annual Tax-Free weekend.

Qualifying items can be purchased tax free from a Texas store or from an online or catalog seller doing business in Texas. In most cases, you do not need to give the seller an exemption certificate to buy qualifying items tax free.

This year's sales tax holiday begins Friday, Aug. 9, and goes through midnight Sunday, Aug. 11.

The sales tax exemption applies only to qualifying items you buy during the sales tax holiday. Items you buy before or after the sales tax holiday do not qualify for exemption, and there is no tax refund available.

Additional Charges Affect the Sales Price

Delivery, shipping, handling and transportation charges by the seller are part of the item's sales price.

Since clothing, backpacks and school supplies have to be less than \$100 to qualify, you have to look at the item's total sales price to determine if you can buy it tax free.

For example, you buy a pair of jeans for \$95 with a \$10 delivery charge for a total price of \$105. Because the jeans' total price is more than \$100, tax is due on the entire \$105 price.

If a delivery charge is billed per item, and an invoice has both exempt and taxable items, only the qualifying exempt item's delivery charge is exempt.

If the delivery charge is a flat rate per package, and the amount charged is the same regardless of how many items are included in the package, the total charge can be attributed to any one of the items in the package.

Sales Tax Holiday Refund Requests

If you pay sales tax on qualifying items during the sales tax holiday, you can ask the seller for a refund of the tax paid. The seller can either grant the refund or provide their customer with Form 00-985, Assignment to Right to Refund (PDF), which allows the purchaser to file the refund claim directly with the Comptroller's office.

Mosquito Control

Citizens can win the war against mosquitoes and the diseases they carry by finding and eliminating their breeding sites. Citizens are encouraged to control mosquitoes in the following ways:

- Get rid of old tires, tin cans, bottles, buckets, drums and other containers or keep them empty of standing water.
- Empty plastic wading pools weekly and store them indoors when not in use.
- Repair leaky pipes and outside faucets.
- Move water cooler drain hoses frequently.
- Change water in birdbaths and scrub them twice each week.
- Empty pets' watering pans daily.
- Stock ornamental ponds with mosquito-eating fish.
- Clean clogged roof gutters and drain flat roofs.
- Treat standing water that can't be drained with larvicide tablets (or Bti).
- Remember, mosquitoes breed and multiply in any water that lasts more than four days.

Contrary to popular opinion, not all bodies of water serve as abundant mosquito breeding areas. For example, ponds with steep banks that are relatively free of organic matter, and have little or no vegetation extending into the edge of the water will typically produce very few mosquitoes.

Mosquito dunks can be purchased at home improvement stores. The product is appropriate for use by residents living near larger areas of standing water that cannot be drained and are highly vegetated. The product comes in tablets or donut shaped discs and contains a natural killer of mosquito larvae called BTi. For treatment, the tablets or donut shaped discs are placed in the standing water.

Because it is probably impossible to totally eliminate adult mosquitoes, citizens can further protect themselves by preventing mosquito bites in the following ways:

- Stay indoors at dawn, dusk, and in the early evening.
- Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants whenever you are outdoors.
- Spray clothing with repellents containing permethrin or DEET since mosquitoes may bite through thin clothing.
- Apply insect repellent sparingly to exposed skin. An effective repellent will contain 35% DEET. DEET in high concentrations (greater than 35 percent) provides no additional protection.
- Repellents may irritate the eyes and mouth, so avoid applying repellent to the hands of children.
- Whenever you use an insecticide or insect repellent, be sure to read and follow the manufacturer's directions for use as printed on the product.

From North Central Texas Council of Governments

Area Cities, DFW Airport Team with NCTCOG to Reduce Freight Congestion with Technology



The North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) has announced traffic signal technology system partnerships to help trucks move more efficiently through some of the region's key freight corridors. The cities of Arlington, Carrollton, Fort Worth, Garland, Grand Prairie and McKinney, as well as Dallas Fort Worth International Airport, are helping deploy a Freight Signal Optimization Program across more than 500 traffic signals in their jurisdictions.

In North Texas, trucks are involved in the shipment of approximately 77 percent of goods. The freight optimization program will improve traffic flow through signalized intersections by helping freight vehicles stop at fewer red lights. This service, based on cloud-computing technology, is designed to save money, time and fuel while reducing emissions. Passenger vehicles driving alongside the heavy trucks will benefit from the same extended green time.

Funded through a US Department of Transportation grant, participation is at no additional cost to freight operators. The technology being deployed has proved successful in transit and emergency response applications across the United States, including Austin and San Antonio. The technology deployment also includes information announcing to the truck driver the recommended travel speed to arrive at a traffic light on green that is currently red.

The system also requires no new equipment in the freight vehicles or in the roadway. Data will be fully anonymized in program operations, which means participant information will not be collected or used for any other purpose.

Texas History Minute by Dr. Ken Bridges

Texas' Role in Early Aviation

The 20th century opened up a new frontier for innovation and adventure: the skies. With the first successful airplane flight of Orville and Wilbur Wright in 1903, airplanes began making rapid advances that would change transportation forever. Aviation had come to stay, and Texas would play an important early role.

Two pilots in particular, Louis Paulhan of France and American army pilot Ben Foulois, would make Texas an important center in aviation as they completed the first airplane flights in the state.

Paulhan was a jovial French aviator who took the world by storm. He was one of the first 10 licensed pilots in France and one of only a handful around the globe. In a short time, he became one of the best in the world.

In January 1910, he broke his own record by flying at an altitude of more than 4,000 feet at a California air show. Later that year, he would complete the longest flight to that time: more than four hours in the air. Huge crowds came to see him flying an airplane, the new technological wonder, as he brought his air show to Texas. And on Feb. 18, 1910, he completed an important milestone in Texas History: he completed the first successful airplane flight in the state. And he had only learned to fly a plane the year before.

Most of the early advances in Texas aviation would come from the military. The army quickly became interested in airplanes and worked with Orville and Wilbur Wright for pilot training and purchasing airplanes.

Lt. Ben Foulois, a Connecticut native whose first flight was with Wilbur Wright in 1909, was ordered to Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio in 1910 with a Wright Model A Military Flyer for experimental flights. It was the only plane the army even had at the time. Foulois later quipped that for a time he was the entire United States Air Force. Just a month after Paulhan's groundbreaking flight, Foulois completed the first successful military airplane flight in Texas on March 2, 1910. He made four brief flights that day, accidentally crashing the plane on one flight. After repairing the plane, Foulois had a seat belt installed as well, noting the need for pilot safety.

The somewhat centralized position of

Texas in comparison to the rest of the country, the mild climates, and wide-open fields absent of mountains or thick forests across North and Central Texas were seen by aviators as great advantages for early aircraft. Foulois began training new pilots. As the Mexican Revolution swirled across the Texas border, the army was employing pilots for reconnaissance missions along the border as early as 1911.

The 1st Aero Squadron was organized on March 5, 1913, at Fort Sam Houston, the army's first aviation squadron. As the number of pilots grew, by March 1914, the Aviation Section of the Signal Corps was established within the army. Eventually, aviation separated into its own branch. By the end of 1915, the squadron consisted of 300 pilots and support technicians and more than fifty aircraft, mostly scattered Martin T tractor planes, Curtiss R-2 biplanes, and Curtiss JN-3 "Jenny" biplanes.

When raiders under Pancho Villa attacked the small border town of Columbus, New Mexico, in March 1916, the squadron was re-assigned from San Antonio to Columbus in order to assist Gen. John J. Pershing's punitive raid into Mexico. However, the technology was still so primitive and reliability so limited that the planes were shipped to New Mexico by train. The planes were used mostly for reconnaissance purposes and for relaying messages to the different units under Pershing's command. Though the planes faced serious problems because of the thin mountain air, the squadron was successful in their reconnaissance efforts.

World War I created a massive surge in aviation in the state. The air station at Fort Sam Houston expanded rapidly and became Kelly Field. Love Field, then just north of Dallas, was established by the army in 1917 as a training center for army pilots. That same year, Call Field opened in Wichita Falls as an army flight school. The University of Texas offered classes in radio and aviation to cadets. British pilots also came to Texas for training, as Pershing invited the Royal Flying Corps to establish flight schools in the United States. Royal Flying Corps cadets from England and Canada trained at Camp Taliaferro in Fort

Worth starting in 1917 and set up three small airfields across Tarrant County for new pilots: Hicks Field near Saginaw, Barron Field near Everman, and Benbrook Field just north of Benbrook. Through these training centers, Allied air power expanded rapidly, but most closed in the years after the war ended.

Though the federal government experimented with delivery of the mail as early as 1911, regular air mail service did not begin until May 1918. Texas air mail routes would not become available until the mid-1920s. Meanwhile, aviation continued to expand across Texas in spite of post-war military cutbacks. The City of Dallas purchased Love Field from the army in 1927, and other cities began constructing their own air fields while private aviation firms and passenger airlines began operating.

As for Foulois and Paulhan, they remained respected figures in aviation. Both survived World War I as decorated war heroes. Paulhan was a special guest on Air France's inaugural non-stop jet flight from Paris to Los Angeles in 1960. He lived quietly in France until his death in 1963. Foulois eventually became head of the army air corps and retired as a major general in 1935 and lived his later years on the grounds of Andrews Air Force Base before his death in 1967.

Today, aviation continues to a large role in the state's economy, from both military and civilian efforts. Texas today is home to some of the busiest airports in the world, boasts aerospace manufacturing firms, and serves as the headquarters for some of the nation's largest airlines. After a century of flight, aviation had grown to a multi-billion dollar industry in the state, employing more than 135,000 Texans and allowing hundreds of thousands to fly across the globe.

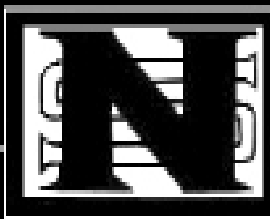
