BMHS Boys to Fall to Castleberry; WHHS Boys Climbing Rankings; Lady Bobcats Dominate over YWLA; Lady Cougars to Host Carter-Riverside

The Benbrook boys basketball team lost to Castleberry by a score of 55-53 on the Friday before the Christmas break, and coach Blake Mendez said his team made a few too many mistakes.

“Castleberry is playing really well this year,” Mendez said. “They’ve got some legit scorers on their team that can go off at any moment. We did a solid job containing them, but we doubled them in turnovers, which led to more opportunities for them offensively, and you can’t give a team like that extra chances to beat you. We lost by two to a really good team.”

Mendez said he had a number of strong performances in the game.

“Kemondric Brown and Hatcher Mason did a great job scoring the ball for us,” Mendez said. “They were both in double digits. And Roderick Hodge was making plays all night. He led us with 12 assists.”

Benbrook followed the loss up with a victory over Northside, but then lost its district opener to Western Hills.

Over at Western Hills, the Cougars defeated Denton by a score of 78-57 on the last Friday before the week of Christmas, and coach Justin Bryson said it was a good win.

“Denton had some big and strong players,” Bryson said. “The game was a good test before we start district play.”

Ma’Javion Washington scored 26 points, while Jordan Jones added 19 points

for the Cougars.

Quinton Marshall scored 13 points in the game and Da’Marea Jones- Evans had 9 points.

Western Hills has steadily climbed in the state 4A rankings, and was No. 34 in the state among 4A programs as of the Dec. 20 poll by MaxPreps.

Bryson said the atmosphere on his team is improving. “The boys have been doing a good job,” Bryson said. “We have to stay focused and continue playing the right way. We had a great non-district, now we have to use the experiences from the non-district and apply them in district.”

On the girls side, Benbrook opened up district competition with a victory over the Young Women’s Leadership Academy, and coach Leta Lofton said it was a good win for her team.

“We had a competitive game versus YWLA,” Lofton said. “We were able to hang on for the win. Got into foul trouble early... But the team gave great effort as we pulled out the victory.”

Taryn Longley scored 23 points for the Lady Cats and Zoey Smothermon finished with 18 in the game. Benbrook will play at Dunbar at 1:30 p.m. on Jan. 4.

The Western Hills girls will host Carter-Riverside at 7:30 p.m. on Jan. 4.

The Benbrook city council meeting on Dec. 16 was conducted in person.

Mayor Jason Ward called the meeting to order. An invocation was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. An opportunity was allowed for citizen comments with comments being limited to agenda items only.

The minutes from the council meeting held on Dec. 2 were then approved.

The first item of the evening was to receive the Planning Excellence Award from the Texas Chapter of the American Planning Association.

The award recognizes cities that demonstrate professional planning standards, increase awareness of professional planning and aid in economic development and community image.

Next up was to receive the DFW Clean Cities Coalition Bronze Fleet Recognition.

The award recognizes public-sector fleets each year for their efforts to reduce fuel consumption and improve air quality.

Benbrook’s recognition was based on reduced fuel consumption, idle (vehicle) reduction policies and fuel economy improvements.

The next item of the evening was to accept the financial (continued on page 6)

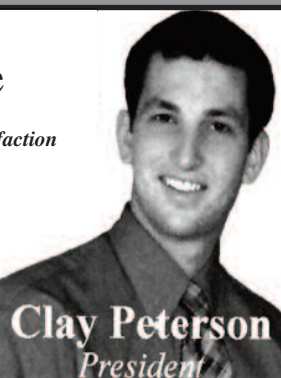

Oil Company Billionaire, Nelson Bunker Hunt *by Dr. Ken Bridges*



In the late 1970s and through the 1980s, millions of people would tune in weekly to watch *Dallas*, a night-time soap opera about the tawdry scandals and business dealings of a Texas oil family. At the same time, a family of Texas oil barons transplanted from Arkansas was involved in schemes even more bizarre than those created for television. And among them was Nelson Bunker Hunt.

The patriarch of the Hunt Family was the legendary H.L. Hunt, born in Illinois in 1889. The elder Hunt had settled in the Chicot County area by 1910 and began a cotton plantation. By the 1920s, facing ruin from a series of floods, Hunt gambled his last dollars and ended up winning a fortune in a series of poker games that included a stake in the booming oil fields of El Dorado.

In El Dorado, the Hunt fortune would begin as millions of dollars of oil flowed across Union County. He had seven children with wife Lyda Bunker of Lake Village, but carried on affairs with at least two other women, having eight children with them.

Nelson Bunker Hunt was born in El Dorado in 1926 at the height of the South Arkansas Oil Boom. The family soon moved to East Texas as H. L. Hunt bought

the rights to the massive oil fields discovered there in the early 1930s, making them one of the richest families in the world. Afterward, they permanently settled in Dallas where the elder Hunt became a prominent member of First Baptist Church.

The younger Hunt became known for strange ideas and behavior as well as his own business success. In 1938, on a family trip to London, Bunker Hunt walked all through the city on his own late into the night. In the 1940s, he dropped out of the University of Texas, reportedly angry over one professor's lecture.

He traveled coach class on airplanes but spent lavishly on horses and farms around the world. After a falling-out with his father, he went into business for himself in the 1950s. By the 1960s, Bunker Hunt had struck oil in Libya, making tens of millions of dollars. However, in 1973, a jealous Moammar Gaddafi, who had seized power a few years before, seized control of the oil in Libya, permanently cutting Hunt off.

By the 1970s, he and younger brother William Hunt came upon a scheme to corner the silver market, steadily buying up more and more. They bought silver at \$1.50 per ounce in the 1970s, which grew to \$50 per ounce by January 1980. This meant \$4.5 billion for the Hunts. Regulators quickly jumped in to limit the purchases, sending prices lower. Margin calls and price drops devastated the two, costing \$2.7 billion in one week in March 1981, while silver dropped to \$10.80 per ounce on March 27.

"I was trying to make money," Bunker Hunt glumly explained. However, others close to him noted that Hunt believed the world economy was about to collapse and money would become worthless.

Numerous lawsuits would be filed against the two, and numerous federal investigations followed. As a result of the silver ploy, he was forced to declare bankruptcy in 1988, the largest personal bank-

ruptcy in history up to that time.

Bunker Hunt would slowly recover from bankruptcy, but he spent his later years concentrating on horse racing and breeding.

His health steadily declined, and the one-time oil giant died quietly in a Dallas nursing home at age 88 in 2014, having lived a life where truth was, certainly and frequently, stranger than fiction.

report ending on Nov. 30, 2021. Revenues for the month of November totaled \$1,434,884 and year to date revenues totaled \$2,280,854. November expenditures totaled \$1,576,141, with year to date expenditures totaling \$2,280,854. Revenues for the Economic Development Corporation for the month of November were \$141,897 with a year to date total of \$310,816. Expenditures for the EDC for the month of November were \$32,195, with year to date expenditures of \$64,137. Investments for the City of Benbrook totaled \$45,752,769 and totaled \$5,398,165 for the EDC. The council accepted the finance report unanimously.

Next up was an item to make appointments to Boards and Commissions. The odd number positions on the cities boards and commissions will expire on Dec. 30, and there is also a 1-year unexpired term for Alternate D on the Zoning Board of Adjustment Appeals Commission, which will expire on Dec. 30, 2022. City council members conducted interviews on Dec. 6 & 7 for the appointments. Staff recommended that the city council make appointments to the expiring terms for the boards and commissions for a term to begin Dec. 31, 2021 and expire Dec. 30, 2023 and that city council also determine if the vacancy on Alternate D on the Zoning Board of Adjustment Appeals Commission will be filled.

The following appointments were made:

For the Planning and Zoning Commission, place 1, David Ramsey, place 3, Alfredo Valverde, place 5 Matthew Wallis, place 7, Beth Bodine-Jones, and place 9 Damon Farrar.

For the Zoning Board of Adjustments Appeals Commission, place 1, Wes Myers, place 3, Joshua Hayes, place 5, Liz Sowell, Alternate A, Josh Harville, Alternate C, Kristina West and Alternate D, the 1-year unexpired term, will remain vacant.

For the Park and Recreations Board, place 1, Chad Skinner, place 3, Tammy Fulcher, place 5, Donna Smith, and place 7, John Adelman.

For the Economic Development Corporation, place 1, Gary Lindsay, place 3, Michael Howard, place 5, Kent Williams, and place 7, Omar Aguilar.

For the Tax Increment Finance Zone Committee, place 1, Dr. Larry Marshall, and place 3, Jim Hinderaker,

The motion for these appointments was approved unanimously.

Next up was a motion to adopt a resolution authorizing participation with the state of Texas in the Global Opioid Settlement and approving the Texas Term Sheet. The state of Texas and other political subdivisions have engaged in litigation to hold entities in the supply chain of the epidemic caused by opioid abuse and distribution accountable. Benbrook Management Analyst Jared DeVries said that on May 13, 2020, the State of Texas, through the Office of the Attorney General and a negotiation group for Texas political subdivisions, entered into an agreement entitled Texas Opioid Abatement Fund Council and Settlement Allocation Term Sheet, approving the allocation of settlement funds within the

State of Texas. The City is expected to receive approximately \$44,000 and the settlement amount will be used by the Benbrook Police Department to mitigate the harms caused by the opioid crisis. Staff recommended the city council approve a resolution authorizing participation in the settlement. The motion passed unanimously.

The next item was to adopt an ordinance readopting the tax abatement guidelines and criteria. Assistant City Manager Jim Hinderaker said Chapter 312 of the Texas Tax Code enables the City of Benbrook to enter into a tax abatement agreement with an owner of taxable property located in a reinvestment zone if the City has adopted guidelines and criteria. In addition, the city must readopt these guidelines and criteria every two years. The proposed ordinance will continue to provide the option to negotiate tax abatements for new or expanded manufacturing facilities with more than \$3 million in new investment, or ten or more new employees. The guidelines also allow for tax abatements for new hotels with more than 50 rooms. Staff recommended that the City Council readopt the guidelines and criteria for tax abatement agreements, which passed unanimously.

Next up was a motion to approve the Tarrant County Emergency Services District #1 Fire/EMS Services Contract. The City of Benbrook last renewed the annual fire and EMS services agreement with Tarrant County in October of 2020. Chief Tommy Davis said the contract continuation is beneficial to Benbrook for the following reasons: The 2021/22 rate of compensation (\$134,000) compensates the City for services rendered; the provision of the County provided tanker and brush truck precludes the purchase of this apparatus by Benbrook citizens; the 2021/22 rate of compensation from points is estimated to be \$260,000; the 2021/22 contract includes a grant from the district of \$25,000 for the purchase and replacement of firefighting equipment; the total cash reimbursement from Tarrant County to the City would be approximately \$419,000; through a separate contract, Tarrant County ESD is also funding the purchase of a new ambulance (\$550,000). The motion passed unanimously.

A second part of that item was to approve the Tarrant County contract for replacement of ambulance and associated equipment. Davis said the agreement will enable the City of Benbrook to purchase a new ambulance (replacing the City's 2014 model year ambulance), as well as a cardiac monitor, Lucas compression device, patient stretcher, and all necessary supplies and equipment fitted in every ambulance utilizing Tarrant County ESD ARPA funds for an amount not to exceed \$550,000. The agreement is the first of four agreements programmed with the ESD for the replacement of four ambulances in the Benbrook Fire Department's fleet. Funding within the agreements is scheduled to increase by six percent each year to cover manufacturer cost increases. The motion passed unanimously.

The meeting was then adjourned.
