Western Hills High School and Benbrook Middle-High School Boys and Girls Basketball Wrap Up

The Benbrook boys avenged an earlier season loss to cross-town opponent Western Hills on Friday night to make it an even split in the 2021 version of the Battle of the Big Cats.

“Man, was this game fun,” Benbrook coach Blake Mendez said. “Western Hills beat us up pretty good the first time we played. We did not play well in that game, so we went in to this game feeling good because we hadn’t really shown hills what we are capable of. This go around, our defense was the best I’ve seen it all year. We were able to hold them to just 11 at half. We knew they’d go on a run in the second half, but we were able to hold our composure and hit some big free throws late to win.”

Benbrook defeated Western Hills by a score of 45-40 after losing the first game to the Cougars 70-55. Western Hills coach Justin Bryson said the Bobcats definitely came to play.

“The game against Benbrook was a competitive game that came down to the last few minutes,” Bryson said. “Benbrook played well, with energy from the start. Hats off to them.”

Western Hills and Benbrook are both in the thick of the playoff hunt, but the Bobcats are on the outside -looking-in at the moment, but Mendez said he is optimistic.

“The first round didn’t go as we had hoped, but we were in every single game we played,” Mendez said. “The last three games, we seem to have found something that clicks, and we are playing much better than we were two weeks ago. We’d like to be in a better position, but we still control our destiny, and that’s all you can ask for.”

On the girls side, BMHS continued their winning ways with victo-

ries over YWLA and Western Hills last week, and coach Leta Lofton said things appear to be getting on the right track for the Lady Cats.

“After battling through the pandemic and quarantine, we are finally getting our entire team back together,” Lofton said. “It was refreshing to see our ladies pull together and compete as a team.”

Benbrook plays Eastern Hills tomorrow night, and Lofton said it will be an important game.

“At this time, we are tied at second with Eastern Hills,” Lofton said on Saturday. “Eastern Hills won the first round. This game will determine where we will end up in district play. It will be a competitive game that will get us close to determining how we will line up in the playoffs.”

For the Western Hills girls, 2021 has also presented some serious challenges.

“It has been a crazy year with COVID,” coach Blake Moilan said. “Our numbers have been extremely low, which has forced some of our girls to play varsity basketball this season when they would be normally playing JV. This has its pros and cons. Obviously the biggest pro is the experience our young players are getting. On the con side, it can be frustrating being a young player on varsity. The girls have played hard all season and have made great strides in getting better.”

Western Hills plays Diamond Hill-Jarvis tomorrow night, and Moilan said he is hoping for a similar result to their first encounter.

“We beat Diamond Hill the first time, so we want to come out and play hard and play to win,” Moilan said. “DHJ has a couple of girls that shoot the ball well. We will need to play well to win again.”

Fort Worth ISD, Tarleton Celebrate Pact to Admit Students

Beginning with the 2021-22 school year, Fort Worth ISD seniors who graduate in the top 25 percent of their class will be eligible for guaranteed admission and annual scholarships to Tarleton State

University. The icing on the cake is that Tarleton will also select one FWISD graduating senior each year to receive a \$10,000 annual scholarship, renewable for up to four years. The (continued on page 6)

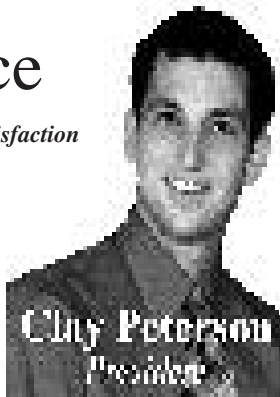

Texas History Minute

Doolittle Raider and Texas Native Robert L. Hite *by Dr. Ken Bridges*

The attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941 horrified the American people. More than 2,000 people were killed in the attack that wrecked much of the navy's Pacific Fleet.

America wanted to strike back hard to tell Japan that America would not be defeated. In spring 1942, America got that chance with Doolittle's Raid, a feat helped in part by a number of Texas natives, including pilot Robert L. Hite.

Doolittle's Raid was named for Lt. Col. Jimmy Doolittle, who devised a plan to strike back at the heart of Japan to avenge their attack on Pearl Harbor. Doolittle commanded a squadron of sixteen B-25 bombers in a surprise raid on Tokyo and other Japanese cities.

Word of the impending raid had quietly spread among pilots who jumped at the chance to strike back at Japan.

Hite had repeated a story for years that men were offering him up to \$500 to take his place. He turned them all down, a patriot determined to do his duty. On April 18, 1942, they lifted off from the crowded deck of the USS Hornet, aiming for targets 800 miles away. The daring raid was later adapted into the famous 1944 film *Thirty Seconds Over Tokyo* starring Spencer Tracy.

While the bombing did little long-term damage to the Japanese war machine, the attack humiliated them. They pulled several fighter squadrons from forward positions to protect Tokyo from further attacks. As the war raged on, this prevented these units from responding to American offensives as Allied forces slowly retook the Pacific region. Americans were thrilled at the success of the raid.

Of the 80 men on sixteen bombers for the mission, thirteen were from Texas, including Robert L. Hite. Other Texans included Thadd H. Blanton of Archer City, a co-pilot, Kenneth E. Reddy of Bowie, also a co-pilot, and John A. Hilger of Sherman, a pilot.

Hite was the son of cotton farmers outside Odell, Texas, in 1920. He briefly attended West Texas State Teachers College before enlisting in the army in 1940. He wanted to serve as a pilot but flunked the first physical. In spite of this setback, he gained his certification as an Army Air Force pilot the next year.

Hite's crew hit a fuel depot and a factory in Nagoya. Of the aircraft, only one landed safely in Allied territory. The remainder were either shot down or crash-landed in Japanese-occupied China. Hite's crew was captured and spent the remainder of the war in a POW camp and tortured for the next three years.

After the war ended, he continued to serve. He married his first wife Portia in 1946, with whom he had a son and a daughter. He briefly left the service but returned during the Korean War era before retiring as a lieutenant colonel. In 1955, Hite moved his family to Arkansas where he took a job as manager of a hotel. Here in 1961, he hosted a convention of Doolittle Raid veterans. He went on to manage a series of hotels before his retirement in 1984.

In the years since the war as the World War II generation faded away, their importance to the freedom of the world and appreciation for what these soldiers accomplished grew. The Doolittle Raiders were presented many honors, and Hite himself was inducted into the Texas Aviation Halls of Fame at the Lone Star Flight Museum in Galveston. By March 2015, Hite was one of just three men left alive from the legendary 1942 raid. A White House ceremony was planned for April to honor him and his comrades with the Congressional Gold Medal.

Days before the ceremony, Hite died at the age of 95. He was buried with full military honors and surrounded by family, friends, and a host of well-wishers.

award will result in an annual commitment of \$40,000 to the school district.

The announcement was made at the Jan. 12, 2021 FWISD Board of Education meeting and follows a Memorandum of Understanding signed by Fort Worth ISD and Tarleton in March of 2020.

"Tarleton State University has really stepped up to the plate with the Distinguished High School Partnership Program," said Superintendent Kent P. Scribner. "Their efforts truly recognize the academic success our graduates bring to any educational setting. This long-term partnership offers promise and opportunity for so many students and their families who thought post-secondary education out of reach."

As part of the Distinguished High School Partnership, created by Tarleton President James Hurley in 2019, the university will waive ACT (American College Test) and SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test) requirements and application fees for qualifying FWISD seniors.

"We are excited to be partners with Tarleton State University in the Distinguished High School Partnership Program," said Board of Education President Jacinto Ramos, Jr. "This effort is designed to celebrate the achievements of our graduates and furthers the mission of both Tarleton and the Fort Worth ISD. This generous program will offer our students many more opportunities as they prepare themselves for career success and community leadership."

Students graduating in the top 10 percent of their class can expect a minimum \$3,000 award as part of the President's Guaranteed Award Program (GAP). Those in the top 25 percent are guaranteed a minimum of \$1,500.

Board member Carin "CJ" Evans, representing District 5 expressed her gratitude to Tarleton when she said, "We are so happy to partner with such a strong public university. Our students and the entire Fort Worth community will benefit from it."

Calling FWISD the backbone of freshman enrollment, Dr. Hurley said the partnership "raises a high tide," enhancing opportunity, access and financial assistance for all students who want a university degree.

And Board member Tobi Jackson, representing District 2 joined her colleagues in voic-

ing the considerable impact this will have on students.

"The enthusiasm of this effort, coupled with the ingenuity of Dr. Hurley, and Tarleton State University is a significant win for our students."

As a bonus, qualifying FWISD seniors enrolled at Tarleton for spring 2021 can expect a bump in their financial aid. Admitted FWISD freshmen must submit a general scholarship application to determine eligibility.

Obituary

James “Jim” Pamplin was born in Bennington, Okla. 88 years ago. At 19 he came to Texas to work at Convair in White Settlement. He retired from Lockheed Martin in Supervision in 1998 after 47 years.



To provide additional income he worked part-time as a Journeyman plumber eventually securing his Masters plumbing license. He continued his plumbing business after retirement working until recently and was known to his many customers as their trusted plumber.

From 1972 to 1978 Jim served as a White Settlement City Councilman and was in the delegation traveling to Washington, D.C. in 1977 securing funds for the Civic Center Complex including the City Hall and Fire Department and saw the completion of the Loop 820 bridge over Lake Worth.

Jim was a tribal member of the Choctaw Nation and was proud of his Native American heritage. His mother was full Choctaw and his ancestors were among the native people relocated from Mississippi to Oklahoma historically known as The Trail of Tears. He grew up in Oklahoma before coming to Texas.

After diligently wearing a protective mask and physical distancing he contracted COVID-19. He was not able to overcome the virus and he passed away in the hospital on Jan. 6 surrounded by his family.

Jim was preceded in death by his parents, Arlo and Minerva; sisters, JoAnn Frank and Phyllis Knight; brothers, Claude Billy, Arnold Bully and Charles Fobb; and his youngest son, Mark.
