July 6 Meeting Review by John English

The Benbrook city council meeting held on July 6 was conducted as scheduled. Mayor Jason Ward called the meeting to order. An invocation was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Time was then allowed for citizen comments on any agenda item, and resident Terry Roach approached the podium to ask what was the benefit of burying the city's powerlines other than aesthetics, a topic that would be addressed later in the meeting.

Minutes from the previous meeting held on June 15 were then approved unanimously among all members present.

The first item of the evening was to consider accepting the finance report ending on May 31.

Revenues for the General Fund for the month of May totaled \$897,107, while year to date revenues were \$21,707,875. Expenditures for May were \$4,679,604, while year-to-date expenditures totaled \$14,582,424.

For the Economic Development Corporation, revenues for the month of May were \$177,839 and totaled \$1,552,472 year-todate, while expenditures were \$31,124 for the month of May and totaled \$604,242 year-to-date. (continued on page 3) From the American Red Cross

For investments, the City of Benbrook had \$53,101,156 invested, while the EDC had \$7,073,495. The council accepted the finance report unanimously by all members present.

Next up was a report to consider approving an interlocal agreement with the City of Fort Worth to reclaim Lakeside Drive. Ac- Legion Post 297 to celebrate July 4 at the facility. cording to the agenda, the City of Fort Worth is set to reclaim a portion of Lakeside Drive located between Winscott Road and Pecan Valley Drive.

Per the Interlocal Agreement, the City of Benbrook will pay for all costs to reclaim approximately 210 linear feet of Lakeside Drive that is located inside the City of Benbrook's municipal limits. City staff recommended that the council approve the Interlocal Agreement with the City of Fort Worth to reclaim Lakeside Drive for \$35,626. The motion was approved unanimously by all members present.

Next was a proposal to revise the scope of work for the Benbrook Municipal construction project.

According to the agenda, this revised scope of work to the Benbrook Municipal Complex project includes all items necessary to bury the existing utility lines (Oncor, Charter and AT&T) beginning at the Southeast corner of Winscott Road and Mercedes Street and then running south along Winscott Road to the Southwest corner of the city's property where the lines will again become overhead. The total cost to bury the lines is \$167,426.49. The motion was approved unanimously by all members present.

Time was then allowed for informal citizen comments.

Resident Morgan Register approached the podium and asked the council members what the City of Benbrook is known for, and then offered an idea of his own.

"It should be known for its great parks and future state park at that," Register said. "Traffic is already a concern on our congested 377, and having a state park in place of another development would ease congestion, while still encouraging recreation and economic activity in our city."

Register then pointed out that Tarrant County is the only major county in the state that does not have a state park, and proposed that Benbrook hold a public hearing for the creation of a state park in Benbrook.

Next, resident Lydia Hudson approached the podium and expressed concerns about the \$167,426.49 being used for the revised scope of the Benbrook Municipal construction project.

Hudson suggested the funds might be better used for another code compliance officer, police officer or the local Animal Shelter.

Roach then approached the podium again and expressed his affection for the City of Benbrook, along with disappointment about the response he has received from certain government officials regarding his complaints about a prior incident in which he was detained by the Benbrook Police Department.

Time was then allowed for council member and staff comments, but there were none.

The meeting was then adjourned.

NCTCOG Hosts Online Input Opportunity

The North Central Texas Council of Governments is hosting an online public input opportunity now through Aug. 8 to allow residents to learn more about transportation initiatives and participate in the regional planning process. To submit comments and questions to NCTCOG, email nctcogJuly23@publicinput.com or visit www.publicinput.com/nctcogJuly23, where you can also watch the presentations.

Each year, NCTCOG works to approve and update the Regional 10-Year Plan. This plan identifies major projects to be implemented in the region. The public input opportunity will provide a project list from Fiscal Year 2024 to Fiscal Year 2033 for review and comment. Air quality improvement is an important focus for NCTCOG, with the region classified as nonattainment for ozone. Working closely with regional partners, NCTCOG develops and implements strategies, policies and programs to enhance air quality. In addition, there are periodic opportunities for public and private entities to compete for funding to reduce fleet emissions. Highlights of Dallas-Fort Worth fleet projects implemented using grant funds will be provided, as well as a list of current funding opportunities available to fleets.

An overview of the recently completed DFW Discovery Trail branding and wayfinding project will also be provided, including final branding recommendations.

NCTCOG's Community Gardens Program Guide provides information, resources and tools for cities and others to develop and implement community garden programs in their areas. An overview of this new initiative will be available.

Information will also be provided about the following initiatives and programs: Certification of Emerging and Reliable Transportation Technology (CERTT) Program: Round 2 results, Walk to School Day promotion 2023, Engine Off North Texas and Mobility 2045: 2022 Update administrative revisions.

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American Composer, Pianist, Arranger and Conductor - Scott Bradley by Dr. Ken Bridges

Texas musician
Scott Bradley was
never widely known
outside of the studio,
but his music was
the heart of some of
the most iconic
American cultural
icons of the 20th
century, most notably, the famed cartoon duo of Tom and
Jerry.

Bradley was born in Russellville, Arkansas, in 1891. He developed a love of



music early and taught himself. By the 1910s, he headed to Houston to put his musical talents to work. He found work as a conductor for orchestras and theaters throughout Southeast Texas as well as radio stations. At the same time, he continued to write his own music. Though he was a successful musician, Bradley still took lessons from more experienced musicians to fine-tune his own craft.

By the early 1920s, California was rapidly becoming the heart of the entertainment world. Bradley left Texas in 1926 to become a conductor for a Los Angeles radio station. In 1929, he was hired by The Walt Disney Studio as a staff musician. However, Walt Disney had a falling out with some of his staff in 1930. One of Disney's chief animators went to form his own cartoon studio for which Bradley worked for several years.

By the 1930s, the cartoon short feature had become a staple part of the moviegoing experience. Seeing the success of Disney and others with the growing popularity of animation, Metro-Goldwyn-Meyer Studios decided to form its own cartoon studio in 1937 to compete. Bradley was quickly hired to help provide the music.

In 1940, MGM animators William Hanna and Joseph Barbera created the Tom and Jerry cartoon, though they were originally named Jasper and Jinx. Bradley went on to write and conduct the large orchestras for the music in the 114 original cartoons made between 1940 and 1957.

Since Tom and Jerry almost never spoke, most of the stories relied on Bradley's music to set up and underline the different jokes, playful tensions, and transitions from one scene to the next. The physical humor and lack of dialogue helped make the cartoons immensely popular around the world as Bradley's music needed no translations.

One 1947 cartoon in particular, "The Cat Concerto," placed

music at the center of the episode as Tom played a concert pianist whose piano happened to be Jerry's home. Jerry got his revenge against Tom by making it difficult for the desperate cat to finish. Thanks to Bradley's music direction, the cartoon won the 1948 Academy Award for Best Animated Short Film, the fourth consecutive Academy Award for Tom and Jerry.

Bradley also composed the musical score for the 28 Barney Bear cartoons made by MGM between 1939 and 1954. Bradley would also go on to provide the music for the 24 Droopy cartoons produced between 1943 and 1957 and the Screwy Squirrel cartoons made in the late 1940s.

In 1957, MGM closed its cartoon studio as part of a corporate restructuring effort. Though MGM would continue to produce cartoons, the large budgets were gone and an entirely new group of directors, animators, and musicians were hired. Bradley's contract was cancelled; and at the age of 65, he decided to retire.

In those nearly two decades of the first batch of Tom and Jerry cartoons, Bradley was part of a team that earned eleven Academy Award nominations and won eight Academy Awards for the cartoons. Overall, he composed 250 cartoon music scores.

Bradley died at his home in California in 1977 at the age of 85 as a new generation of youngsters discovered in television reruns the cartoons he helped bring to life. A compilation album of his musical scores from some of these cartoons was released in 2006.

Today, these cartoons continue to be seen on television and on video daily in homes around the world.

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
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Three Day Weekend Forecast
