## Residents May Vote at Any Tarrant County Polling Place for General Election *by John English*

The Benbrook city council meeting on July 21 was conducted as scheduled. Mayor Jason Ward called the meeting to order. An invocation was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Ward allowed an opportunity for citizen comments on any agenda item, but there were none. Minutes for the meeting held on July 7 were then unanimously approved.

The first item of the evening was a proposal to adopt a resolution and election order for a general election to be held on Nov. 8 and authorizing a joint election between Tarrant County Elections and the City of Benbrook. The proposal would allow Benbrook citizens to vote at any Tarrant County polling place during early voting and on election day. The motion carried unanimously.

Next up was a presentation by the Benbrook Economic Development Corporation Board of Directors to ratify the Benbrook Economic Development Corporation Budget for FY 2022/2023. The EDC 2022-23 budget totals \$1,536,581. Projects include the Storefront Improvement Program Grant, NW Winscott property maintenance, the Westpark Corner funding for maintenance and potential demolition, the Russell Feed Incentive, the Benbrook Boulevard infrastructure and beautification project and the 3500 Williams Road Shopping Center project. The EDC budget for fiscal year 2022-23 was approved unanimously.

Next up was a motion to approve the finance report for the period ending on June 30. For the gen- (continued on page 6)

## Player Feature: BMHS Baseball's Ian Salazar



The Benbrook baseball team has had another player sign to play at the next level.

**Ian Salazar**, a first-team all-district selection in 2022 who helped the Bobcats to 47 wins during his two-year tenure on the varsity squad at Benbrook, is headed to Redlands Community College in Oklahoma.

Coach Justin Chavez said Salazar's impact cannot be overstated in the Bobcats' success.

"His leadership is what we will miss the most and his clutch hitting," Chavez said. "Ian was an outstanding leader and has definitely left the program in a better place than when he first started."

Chavez said he is confident that Salazar made the right choice in colleges and expects the Benbrook first sacker to flourish at the collegiate level.

"Ian is only going to get better as a player, and will continue to grow in the game," Chavez said. "At the college level he will learn so much more, and I think playing this summer against college players has really fueled him to get better. He has great potential with his work ethic and has the ability to play after Redlands."

Candidate packets, information and calendars for the Nov. 8 election are available from the City Secretary's Office and by download at [this website](#). Applications for a place on the ballot will be accepted through Aug. 22 at 5 p.m.

To file for candidacy, you must meet the following qualifications:

- shall be a citizen of the United States;
- shall be 18 years of age or older on the first day of the term to be filled at the election;
- shall not have been determined mentally incompetent by a final judgment of a court;
- shall not have been finally convicted of a felony from which you have not been pardoned or had your civil rights restored by other official action;
- have resided continuously in the State for of Texas for 12 months and in the City for 12 months immediately preceding the date of the election;
- be a registered voter of the City of Benbrook, Texas.

Benbrook for helping him to realize his full potential as a player.

“Going into my senior season in playing first base for Benbrook, I was extremely ecstatic,” Salazar said. “My confidence level was high and ready to play my heart out. I was ready to lead my team hoping to go further than the previous year, although I was disappointed on how our season ended. But as a team, we fought and play our hearts out.”

Benbrook was defeated in the bi-district round in 2022.

Salazar said he is a bit nervous about college ball, but said he was fortunate to have an opportunity to get a preview of the competition this summer.

“I was a little scared at first, not knowing what to expect at a collegiate level,” Salazar said. “Although I had an opportunity to play and be a part of this summer with current collegiate athletes, which makes me feel more confident that I am better prepared for this next chapter in my life.”

Salazar said he would like to be remembered as a player who modeled ambition by his younger teammates.

“I hope the legacy I have left behind is to inspire any athletes to do bigger and better things than what was ever expected of you,” Salazar said.

Chavez said one of his fondest memories of Salazar came in his junior season in the area round of the playoffs.

“He helped us get to round three in game three of our series against Iowa Park,” Chavez said. “If he doesn’t hit, we probably do not win that series. He will be missed on and off the field.”

And Chavez said there are many things he will miss about having Salazar on his team.

“Seeing Ian smile every day is the thing I’ll miss,” Chavez said. “I don’t think he ever came to practice without a smile. He made practices fun. He truly loves the game of baseball, not only for himself, but for his teammates as well. He always encouraged his teammates no matter the situation. He was always upbeat, full of energy, and would only get down on himself, never his teammates. His leadership skills and his glove at first base will be missed.

“Defensively, I have never seen a better first baseman, and Redlands will see how special he is when he gets on campus. Ian will contribute early to their program due to his work ethic, great attitude, determination, and discipline he has for the game.”

**Texas Sales Tax Holiday Aug. 5-7**

Eulan (Bill) Wilson Abbott, Sr. 83, went home to be with the Lord on Monday, July 18, 2022.

Funeral services were held on Friday, July 22, 2022, at The Word at Lakeside Church of God.

Bill was born Sept. 29, 1938, in Eustace, Texas to Fred Ervin and Lucille (Kirkpatrick) Abbott.

He graduated from C.F. Brewer High School in 1958.

Bill worked for Motheral Printing Company from 1958 to 2005. He was very involved in all five of his children's activities in school through PTA, athletics booster and band boosters for the White Settlement ISD.

He was a member of the Lakeside Church of God for 65 years where he was Sunday School Superintendent for 48 years, Pastor's Council member, greeter and Prayer Warriors leader.

Bill was preceded in death by his parents; wife, Myra Jo (Hanson) Abbott; daughter, Cheryl Lynn (Abbott) Little; and two brothers, Varrel Abbott and Ivan Abbott.

Survivors include his brother, Royce Dean Abbott and wife, Gloria; sons, Eulan Wilson Abbott, Jr., and wife, Darla and Dennis Keith Abbott; daughters, Jo Elaine James and husband, Mark, Sr., and Carol Gwen Hatfield and husband, Robert (Bob); 17 grandchildren; 10 great-grandchildren and one on the way; and numerous nieces and nephews.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar is reminding shoppers they can save money on clothes and school supplies during the state's sales tax holiday on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 5-7.

State law exempts sales tax on qualified items, such as clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks, priced below \$100, saving shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend. The dates of the sales tax holiday and list of tax-exempt items are set by the Texas Legislature.

"Most Texans won't hear the back-to-school bell for another month, but it's never too early to take advantage of the opportunity to save money on everything from book bags to ballpoint pens," Hegar said. "With inflation driving prices higher on just about everything, this sales tax holiday provides Texas families some small relief managing the costs associated with kids heading back to the classroom. As the father of three school-aged children myself, I know how these expenses can add up."

The Comptroller's office estimates that shoppers will save \$112 million in state and local sales tax during this sales tax holiday. Apparel and school supplies that may be purchased tax-free are listed on the Comptroller's website at TexasTaxHoliday.org. During the annual sales tax holiday, qualifying items can be purchased tax free online or by telephone, mail, custom order or any other means (including in-store purchases) when either:

- the item is both delivered to, and paid for by, the customer during the exemption period; or,
- the customer orders and pays for the item, and the seller accepts the order during the exemption period for immediate shipment, even if delivery is made after the exemption period ends.

Texas' sales tax holiday weekend has been an annual event since 1999.

# 19th Century American Pioneer, Trader and Soldier, Jim Bowie

More than 180 years after his death, the mention of **Jim Bowie** still stirs the imagination of admirers around the world. But Bowie was more than just the knife or the battle at the Alamo. Overall, it was a remarkable and colorful life of adventure.

James Bowie was born in 1796 in rural southwestern Kentucky, one of ten children. When he was four, the family moved to Missouri before moving to Louisiana two years later. Along the way, all the Bowie children worked hard to build and run the family farms. As little formal education was available, they were taught at home. Bowie was very adept at languages and learned to read and write in Spanish and French.

He volunteered for service late in the War of 1812 but saw no combat. After the war, he and his brother Rezin Bowie bought several farms and plantations in both Louisiana and Arkansas Territory, hoping to turn healthy profits from real estate. He also sold slaves through work with pirate Jean Lafitte and often borrowed money from Lafitte to pay for his land speculation.

He had several run-ins with the law. Bowie participated in the Long Expedition of 1819 in which James Long led a group into Texas in an attempt to wrest it away from Spanish authorities and into American hands.

In the late 1820s, Arkansas authorities charged him and his brother with fraud, claiming the Spanish land titles they had sold were forgeries. However, all the alleged evidence disappeared from the courts. Bowie's duel with Rapides Parish Sheriff Norris Wright became legendary. After a series of fights and arguments, the two fought in a duel in 1827 later known as the Sandbar Fight. Bowie, shot and stabbed himself, killed Wright with the famous knife given to him by his brother. Rezin Bowie claimed to have made the first Bowie Knife in the 1820s, giving it to his brother for protection.

Bowie moved to Texas in 1830. His first years in Texas were happy and successful. In 1831, he married the 19-year-old daughter of the provincial vice-governor, and the two quickly had two children. Tragically, his wife, children, and in-laws all died in a cholera epidemic in 1833. In his grief, he began drinking heavily. His health declined, and his anger at actions of the faltering Mexican government increased.

In 1835, Bowie participated in a number of battles with Mexican troops. When word arrived in January 1836 that thousands of troops under Gen. Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna were



approaching San Antonio, Bowie headed to the city with 40 volunteers to the stronghold of the Alamo, an old mission in the city. Gen. Sam Houston had ordered that the Alamo be abandoned, believing that the mission could not be defended and that the troops could be better used elsewhere. Instead, the 188 defenders under Bowie and William Travis chose to stay and fight. Bowie was in command when Santa Anna arrived and the siege began Feb. 24. However, Bowie collapsed with an unidentified illness and was confined to bed during the fighting. After days of intense battles, the Alamo fell on March 6.

Several different versions have circulated about the final hours of Bowie. Some suggested he was killed by Mexican troops on his cot in his quarters after the fall of the Alamo. One story suggested that he died of natural causes as the battle raged. Another version insisted that Bowie had been propped up on his cot, with his pistols in his hand, when his body was discovered. Regardless of the final circumstances of his death, Bowie, in spite of his critical illness, decided to stay with his men in the defense of the Alamo to the very end.

After his death, Bowie became a larger-than-life icon of Texas and the American frontier. The Bowie Knife became an indispensable part of American folklore. His story has been recounted numerous times in movies and television shows. Several communities named schools after him.

Bowie County in the northeast corner of the state was named for him in 1840, and the small city of Bowie in Montague County was named for him in 1881.

eral fund, revenues for the month of June were \$852,587 and expenditures totaled \$1,491,102, while year to date, revenues totaled \$19,905,407 and expenditures were \$14,543,120. The finance report was accepted unanimously.

Next was the quarterly investment report for the period ending on June 30. Investments were \$48,992,670 for the City of Benbrook and \$5,996,645 for the EDC. The quarterly investment report was accepted unanimously.

The next item was a motion to approve the assignment, consent and amendment of the public rights-of-way encroachment license agreement. In March of 2021, the Benbrook city council authorized staff to enter into a rights-of-way encroachment agreement with Sam Shipley as part of a development agreement with the EDC. According to the agenda, the encroachment agreement grants Shipley private use of an unused 0.397-acre section of public rights-of-way located at the corner of Winscott Road and Old Benbrook Road. Per the terms of the agreement, Shipley was approved to install a concrete parking lot, a drive aisle and curbing, a one monument-style sign, and landscaping, all of which have been completed except the monument sign. The encroachment agreement carries a renewable 20-year term provided the licensee (Shipley) maintain the said improvement. The city may terminate the agreement for any reason following a 30-day written notice. The proposal was accepted unanimously.

Time was then allowed for informal citizen comments, and resident Tony Miller introduced the idea of passing a resolution sometime in the future to decriminalize entheogenic plants.

“Essentially, the idea is that there are a lot of natural plants that people use for spiritual, conscious-expansion and mental health things, including cannabis, psilocybin mushrooms... but I truly believe that this is something the City of Benbrook can not only lead the state of Texas, but lead the nation on,” Miller said. “I believe it is


