Benbrook Council Action

June 1 Council Meeting Review

The Benbrook city council meeting held on June 1 was conducted as scheduled.

Mayor Jason Ward called the meeting to order. An invocation was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Time was then allowed for citizen comments on any agenda item, but there were none.

Minutes from the previous meeting held on May 18 were then approved unanimously.

The first item of the evening was a proposal to consider approving a mutual aid agreement with the Naval Air Station-Fort Worth Joint Reserve Base for Fire and Emergency Services. According to the agenda, the parties enter into this agreement to provide for mutual response to emergencies when requested and within the scope of services provided by each Party's fire and emergency services department.

The motion was approved unanimously.

Next up was a proposal to approve a contract with Freese and Nichole to complete a drainage plan for Dutch Branch Park.

Benbrook Director of Public Services Bennet Howell spoke to the necessity of the contract.

"This is a long time coming," Howell said.

Student Athlete Spotlight: Lady Bobcat Sharon M’Pinda

Sharon M’Pinda was the best defender on a Benbrook girls basketball team this past season that finished third place in district 9-4A and advanced to the playoffs.

Coach Leta Lofton said that M’Pinda played an integral role in the Lady Cats’ success.

“We could not have accomplished what we did without Sharon’s athleticism,” Lofton said. “Along with her athleticism she is very coachable. She’s a team player through and through and unselfishly looks for opportunities to be successful.”

Lofton said besides her athleticism, M’Pinda contributes in other ways.

“Sharon brings energy and hustle to our team with her rebounding, defending our toughest opponent, and being a team leader,” Lofton said. “But she has yet to tap into her potential as a basketball player.”

M’Pinda, 17, a transfer in student athlete said 2023 was a great year for her and said she believes next season could be even better.

“I was really proud and surprised,” M’Pinda said. “I didn’t know Benbrook like that, or how the program was. Walking into our first practice, I already knew it was going to be different, and I longed for something different.

“Honestly, I was pretty bummed out that our season ended earlier than it should have. But I kept telling myself after going home from our last game, 'This is just the beginning.' And I currently strive to avenge for the seniors who worked hard since their freshman year.”

M’Pinda, who also competes in volleyball and track and field, said what she will remember the most from the 2023 season is the way the team came together and bonded

as a unit.

“Getting to know the coaches, meeting new friends and receiving a new view on basketball is what I admired the most this past season,” M’Pinda said. “Seeing how much the team connected with each other and made sure everyone, including those that came up from JV, knew that we are all one. This includes me who came from a completely different school.

“They made sure that I knew how Coach was and what she can and can’t put up with. Being told that I was a very coachable athlete and was able to fit in multiple different categories was great, whether it’s posting up down low, shooting and passing when needed, or even bringing down the ball. Those memories live in my head forever and will never forgotten.”

For 2024, M’Pinda said she would like to improve in a couple of areas.

“My main objectives are to build off the new knowledge I received just this year, improving in every domain, whether it’s skills, court vision, strength or mindset,” M’Pinda said. “And then, of course, winning the championship.”

Lofton said she has a couple of goals for M’Pinda next season.

“I would like Sharon to be a little bit more selfish on the offensive end of the court,” Lofton said. “She is our number one defender and one of our top rebounders. I would like for her to build on those qualities and focus on offense as another vital part of her game.”

"Every time it rains heavy, there's always a potential for flooding at Dutch Branch Park."

The contract would evaluate the existing drainage in Dutch Branch Park to identify practical improvements to reduce recurring disturbances to park infrastructure.

The project was approved by the City Council in the 2023 Five-Year Capital Improvement Program.

The contract was approved with Freese and Nichols, Inc. for the Dutch Branch Park Drainage Plan for \$102,500 unanimously.

Time was then allowed for informal citizen comments.

Resident Georgia Clark approached the podium and recounted an incident from May 28 where she reported an injured cat to the Benbrook Police Department.

Clark said that a few days later she called the animal shelter the cat was taken to and was informed that it had to be put down due to severe bleeding from its ears and head.

Clark then stated she later learned the injury resulted from an officer who had taken the cat to the shelter, but forgot to turn off the alarm, and lost control of the cat when the alarm went off.

The cat fell on it's head, severely injuring itself.

Clark began to speak about a protocol that was practiced by the Humane Society of North Texas, but was not able to finish due to the three-minute time constraint for citizen comments.

Ward thanked Clark for her time and said the city council would read the rest of her presentation, as she provided it in written form for the council members.

Time was then allowed for council member and staff comments, and Renee Franklin congratulated the graduating classes for 2023 at Western Hills and Benbrook Middle-High School.

The meeting was then adjourned.

Teacher, Prohibition Advocate and Politician - Helen J. Stoddard

Change often came slowly to the South, but it often arrived with a whirlwind of effort pushing it along.

Helen Stoddard, a force of nature unto herself, became a leader in the state with her efforts to defeat alcohol and promote women's equality.

Stoddard became an early professor and pursued a host of causes across Texas, including child welfare, women's education, food safety, prohibition of alcohol, and women's suffrage. Her stubborn mindset, coupled with a sharp intellect and fiery sermons galvanized legislators and public

opinion at the turn of the century. Along the way, Helen Stoddard became one of the co-founders of what is now Texas Woman's University and one of the first women to run for Congress.

Helen M. Gerrels was born in Sheboygan, Wisconsin, off Lake Michigan, in 1850. Church was an important part of her early life. She was a bright and exceptional child and attended Ripon College, a church-based college preparatory institution as a young woman.

She enrolled at Genesee Wesleyan Seminary in New York and excelled at her studies. She graduated from the seminary as head of her class in 1873. It was there that she met her future husband, S. B. Stoddard, and the two married shortly after graduation and moved to Nebraska. They soon had two sons, but their happiness soon dissipated. One son died in infancy, and her husband's health collapsed. The family moved to Florida, believing the warm climate would save his failing health. However, his condition deteriorated, and he died in 1878.

Her parents had moved to Hamilton County, Texas, in 1877, and with a young son to raise, Stoddard moved to Texas to join them. She began teaching school and soon set up a Sunday School in Indian Gap. In 1885, Stoddard began teaching at the now-defunct Fort Worth University, a college associated with the Methodist Episcopal Church.

She soon became interested in the prohibition movement, convinced of the serious harm that alcohol did to families and marriages through health issues, financial ruin, and violence in the home.

She was elected president of the Texas Women's Christian Temperance Union in 1891 and took on the cause of combating alcohol full-time. She went across the state recruiting members and speaking to different organizations. She successfully lobbied legislators to pass a slew of laws aimed at protecting children and public health in the 1890s, including laws mandating that public school students be taught the dangers of alcohol, banning over-the-counter sales of cocaine, restricting mail delivery of alcohol to dry counties, banning child labor in factories, raising the age of consent for girls from 12 to 15, and banning the sale of cigarettes to children under 16.

Stoddard also lobbied for the opening of a state women's college.

In 1901, the legislature agreed to create the Girls' Industrial College though there had been great opposition to college education for women. Stoddard was named to the board of regents, the first woman in Texas to serve on the governing body of any Texas state college. The board selected Denton as the site of the new college, which opened in 1903. Stoddard continued to serve as the college changed its name to the College of Industrial Arts (it became Texas Women's University in 1957). At the college's dedication, Stoddard noted, "Economic independence will allow them to build their lives upon intelligent choice."

She also became an advocate for giving women the right to vote, believing it would help the cause of women's education and the fight against alcohol. The strain of her schedule overwhelmed her, causing a series of health problems. She stepped down from her roles with the WCTU and the college board in 1907. She moved to California to be near her son and his wife.

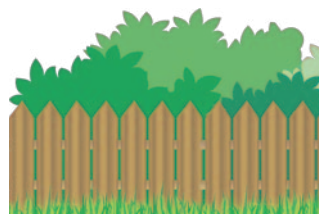
