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

New Health Care Center Coming to Las Vegas Trail Neighborhood

Cook Children's Health Care System and JPS Health Network are joining forces to bring critical health care services to children and families in the Las Vegas Trail neighborhood. Leaders from both organizations recently announced construction plans for the Las Vegas Trail Neighborhood Health Center on 3.7 donated acres at the corner of Calmont Avenue and Cherry Lane in west Fort Worth. The center will provide pediatric and adult medical services, behavioral health services, and social services support such as food insecurity in the form of a food pantry, community education, and onsite job training for health care industry positions. With support from the City of Fort Worth, a Fort Worth Police Storefront will also be housed in the building to help foster police relations within the community.

The facility will break ground later this year and an expected opening slated for late 2025.

In the LVT area, there are more than 20,000 children aged 0-14 with a 7% growth in this population expected by 2025. Currently, Cook Children's Emergency Department and Urgent Care Clinics account for more than 4,000 annual visits from children in the 76116 and 76108 zip codes. Additionally, more than 7,000 members of Cook Children's Health Plan live in these zip codes. Las Vegas Trail Neighborhood Health Center will allow Cook Children's patients and Health Plan members to have a medical home for their health care needs that's close to their own home.

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Factors to Consider When Determining How Much Home You Can Afford



Figuring out how much home you can afford is one of the most important questions you'll need to answer before you begin house hunting. But as home prices and interest rates have increased in the past few years, you may be wondering how your buying power has changed.

To get a rough estimate of what you can afford, most lenders suggest you spend no more than 28% of your monthly income, before taxes are taken out, on your mortgage payment, which includes principal, interest, taxes and insurance. In addition to having a firm grip on your income and expenses, it's important to understand the role the following factors play in how much home you can afford:

Your Credit

Lenders look closely at your credit score when determining whether you qualify for a loan. Generally, the higher your credit score the more options will be available to you, including better loan terms and a lower interest rate. Because of the large role credit plays in the homebuying process, make sure you understand how your credit score is compiled, how to get a copy of your credit report and how to build strong credit.

Current Mortgage Rates

It's important to watch mortgage rates carefully, because when rates are lower you may be able to afford a larger mortgage. Although 26 million mortgage-ready potential homebuyers had the capacity to afford a \$400,000 mortgage at a 3 percent interest rate, the total falls by 3 to 4 million with each percentage point gain, according to Freddie Mac research. In short, a small increase in rates can make a home that was once affordable, unaffordable.

Bear in mind that similar borrowers may receive notably dif-

ferent rates based on the lender, so you may want to shop around to increase your buying power. In fact, you can potentially save \$600-\$1,200 annually by applying for mortgages from multiple lenders, according to Freddie Mac.

Your Down Payment

Typically, homebuyers need to make a down payment of at least 3 percent, and generally between 5 percent and 20 percent, of their home's purchase price to qualify for a mortgage. That means as home prices go up, so do down payment requirements. Talk to your lender about all the down payment options available and explore assistance programs.


Each year, many state, county and city governments provide financial assistance for people in their communities who are well-qualified and ready for homeownership. Requirements vary, but if you are eligible you could receive down payment assistance ranging from a few thousand dollars to larger amounts, depending on your needs, your qualifications and where the home is located. Additionally, many programs specifically benefit veterans, Native communities and workers employed in education, health care, law enforcement and firefighting. Your lender or housing counselor should be able to point you in the right direction of these programs.

Fees and Other Closing Costs

Don't forget that when you get a mortgage, you'll need to pay closing costs, which likely include an appraisal fee, credit report fee, tax services fee and more. These costs will generally run between 2 percent and 5 percent of your purchase price.

To crunch the numbers, start by using Freddie Mac's Homebuying Budget Calculator, then learn more about the homebuying process with Freddie Mac's CreditSmart. Visit creditsmart.freddiemac.com to get started.

If you think you're ready for homeownership, you'll want to work closely with your lender to determine what you can comfortably afford. It's their job to cover all bases so that your final number is within your means and aligns with your financial goals.

Balloons vs. Nature

Mylar balloons are composed of synthetic nylon with metallic coating. They are not biodegradable and can cause power outages or fires when they get twisted with electrical lines. Balloons, usually bright with color, attract wildlife and marine life and get easily mistaken for foliage or food. Devouring balloons can cause them their life, not to mention being tangled up in the balloon string can cause suffocation. Helium which fills the balloons is a finite source and we cannot manufacture it. Helium is used for fiber optics, infant breathing ventilators, and MRI's.

The next time you want to use this party staple remember the fatal consequences for wildlife and marine life. If you have to have balloons, weigh them down, pop them and properly dispose of them.

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


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Journalist, Teacher and Political Activist - Jovita Idar by Dr. Ken Bridges

Sometimes one person in a community can have an impact that continues to be felt for years afterward. **Jovita Idar**, a woman armed only with a pen and passion for helping those in need, would have an impact felt across Texas in her lifetime. She would run several newspapers, found a school, and volunteer as a nurse in time of disaster.

Jovita Idar was born in Laredo in September 1885, one of eight children. Her parents were active members of the community, and the importance



By the time she turned 18 in 1903, she had earned a teaching certificate and began teaching at the segregated Hispanic schools in the Laredo area. She and her fellow teachers struggled with inadequate supplies such as paper and pencils and how there were never enough desks or chairs for them.

Her father, Nicasio Idar, began a Spanish-language newspaper in Laredo, *La Cronica* (The Chronicle), shortly after the eruption of the Mexican Revolution in 1910. She joined her father and two of her brothers in writing articles and editing the small paper. She became an outspoken proponent of the poor immigrant families living along the border. She called for equal rights for Hispanics and better educational opportunities. The paper also highlighted poetry and literature emerging in the Spanish-language community and the economic concerns of Hispanics across Texas and the Southwest. She also wrote a number of editorials calling for giving women the right to vote.

In part because of the efforts of the Idar Family, Hispanics in Laredo organized to improve their community. In 1911, the League of Mexican Women was formed and named Idar its first president and worked to provide free education for all the Hispanic children of Laredo, whose families were mostly from Mexico. The League also called for civil rights, labor rights, and an end to the lynchings of Mexican immigrants. They also collected food and clothing for the victims of the war. Idar would later be active in the "Primer Congreso Mexicanista" (First Mexican Congress), which worked with Hispanic groups in many communities to promote civil rights.

As the Mexican Revolution wore on and the bloodshed increased, more refugees streamed across the border from Mexico into Texas. Eventually, more than one million people would die

in the decade-long civil war.

In 1913, a fierce battle erupted in Nuevo Laredo, just across the border. Many civilians were killed and injured, with many more fleeing for safety in the United States. Idar and others went into Mexico to help with the wounded. Though she had no formal medical training, she volunteered as a nurse through the Mexican White Cross, an organization founded in Laredo to help the wounded and the refugees. She would continue to work with the organization periodically throughout the fighting.

In 1914, she began writing for *El Progresso* (The Progress). When President Woodrow Wilson ordered troops to the border and discussed possible intervention in the war, Idar wrote a scathing editorial in the Spanish-language journal opposing the move. When Texas Rangers got word of the editorial, they attempted to shut down the paper. Idar stood in the doorway to prevent their entry. Texas Rangers returned several days later when she was not present and destroyed the printing press, ending the run of *El Progresso*.

She returned to *La Cronica*. After her father died later in 1914, she continued to serve as editor in a time when few women could even get jobs working for newspapers. In 1916, Idar, started a new paper, *Evolution*. Her brother Edouardo, who had also worked with their father on *La Cronica*, helped with writing and editing. Idar continued her strident calls for women's rights and civil rights for Hispanics. In the meantime, she married Batrolo Juarez in 1917. The paper would run for four years until it shut down in 1920.

Shortly afterward, Idar and her husband moved to San Antonio. She served as a translator at the local hospital and founded a free kindergarten for Hispanic children, continuing her passion for education

In 1940, she began editing *El Heraldo Cristiano* (The Christian Herald), a Spanish-language newspaper run by the Methodist Church in South Texas.

Idar's health declined in the 1940s after she contracted tuberculosis. She died at her home in San Antonio in June 1946 at age 60. Since her death, her work has been studied extensively by scholars and has been a part of the National Women's History Museum.

In 2023, she will be included in the U.S. Mint's American Women quarter series, on the reverse side of George Washington. She will join such figures as astronaut Sally Ride, First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt, and fellow Texan and African-American aviation pioneer Bessie Coleman.
