Nov. 16 Meeting Review

The Benbrook City Council meeting held on Nov. 16 was conducted as scheduled. Mayor Jason Ward called the meeting to order.

An invocation was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Time was then allowed for citizen comments on any agenda item, but there were none.

approved unanimously.

The first item of the evening was a proposal to adopt a resolution to canvass the election results from Nov. 7.

Mayor Ward, council member Larry Marshall, council member Gary Addison and council member Keith Tiner were all re-elected to their places. The resolution to accept the results of the election was adopted unanimously by all members present. The Oath of Office was then administrated to the newly re-elected members of the city council.

Next up was the selection of Mayor Pro-Tem, and members Laura Mackey and Marshall were both nominated, but neither carried a majority of votes, and the item was tabled until the next meeting.

The next agenda item was a proposal to accept the finance report for the period ending Oct. 31. For the General Fund, revenues for the month of October were \$1,130,188 and expenditures totaled \$1,290,348, while the Economic Development Corporation revenues for October were \$330,122 and expenditures totaled \$303,162. Investments for the City of Benbrook totaled \$39,477,766 and investments for the EDC were \$7,862,319. The finance report was accepted unanimously by all members present.

The next agenda item was a motion to approve a Hotel/Motel Occupancy Tax Distribution for fis-(continued on page 6)

BMHS Bobcat Boys Defeat Brownwood, WHHS Boys to Host Springtown

The Benbrook boy's basketball team defeated Brownwood 72-Minutes from the previous meeting held on Nov. 2 were then 62 last week and coach Blake Mendez said his players had to gut it out to earn the victory.

> "The Brownwood game was a bit of a roller coaster for us," Mendez said. "We started out really strong and took a double digit lead into half, but we knew they were going to come out aggressive in the second half and that's exactly what happened. They punched us in the mouth in the third and actually took the lead. In the fourth, we had guys that refused to let us lose the game, and we came out with the 10 point win."

Mendez said he had a stand out performance in the game.

"I couldn't be more proud of sophomore Jayden Bradshaw," Mendez said. "Before last season started, he had a pretty severe knee injury that cost him his freshmen year. He's come back stronger than ever and put up 20 points and 13 rebounds."

Benbrook plays at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday at Alvarado and Mendez said he expects a good game.

"Alvarado was a playoff team last year in a really tough district, so we know they have winners over there," Mendez said. "They beat us by 11 or 12 points last year so we know we can play with them. We just have to limit turnovers and I think we will have a chance to win it late."

Over at Western Hills, the Cougars lost a close one to R.L. Turner last week, and coach Blake Dunson said it was not for a lack of effort.

"I was very pleased with our effort versus a good R.L. Turner team last night," Dunson said on Saturday. "We were down a starter due to injury, but our bench stepped up and a few players answered the call. It was a tight game throughout and we fell just short at the end by a final score of 56-53."

Junior Jaylen James had a career high with 19 points, and junior Lyndon Ellis tossed in 10 points. Junior Brandon Hawkins made several great passes.

The Texas Department of Transportation Fort Worth District is proposing to reconstruct and widen RM 2871 from I-30 to US 377 in Tarrant County, Texas. This notice advises the public that TxDOT will be conducting an online virtual public hearing on the proposed project with an in-person option. The virtual hearing will consist of a prerecorded video presentation and will include both audio and visual components. The presentation will be posted online on Thursday, December 7, 2023, at 8 a.m. To log onto the virtual public hearing, visit www.txdot.gov, keyword search "RM 2871 Tarrant County" after the date and time indicated above. If you do not have internet access, you may call Ram Dhakal at (817) 370-3519 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, to ask questions and access project materials during the project development process.

Additionally, TxDOT is providing an in-person option for individuals who would like to participate in person. In-person attendees will be able to view the same pre-recorded presentation delivered in the online public hearing which will be playing on a screen, review hard copies of project materials, ask questions of TxDOT staff and/or consultants, and leave written comments. The in-person option will be held on Thursday, December 7, 2023, from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. at High Ridge Church located at 10100 Rolling Hills Drive, Fort Worth, TX 76126.

For both the virtual public hearing and in-person option, members of the public may call (817) 841-9241 to provide verbal testimony immediately following the conclusion of the virtual public hearing presentation at 7 p.m. on December 7, 2023, through 11:59 pm on December 22, 2023. Formal written comments may also be provided by mail or email as explained below. All verbally provided testimony and timely written comments will be considered by TxDOT and included as part of the official record. Responses to verbally provided testimony and comments will be prepared by TxDOT, included as part of the hearing and project record, and made available online at www.txdot.gov.

The proposed improvements to RM 2871 include reconstructing and widening the existing roadway to a four-lane divided urban roadway with a six-foot to 18-foot wide curbed median from US 377 in the City of Benbrook north to I-30 in the City of Fort Worth for approximately 5.08 miles along RM 2871. Additional proposed improvements include an overpass bridge on RM 2871 over the Union Pacific Railroad (UPRR) and Aledo Road; realignment of Veale Road Parkway and Chaparral Pass; left and right turn bays and intersection improvements throughout the corridor; and bicycle and pedestrian accommodations on both sides of RM 2871. The proposed project would enhance safety and mobility. The project would require approximately 10.27 acres of additional right of way.

The proposed project would, subject to final design considerations, require additional right of way and potentially displace one non-residential structure; no residential displacements are anticipated. Relo-

cation assistance is available for displaced persons and businesses. Information about the TxDOT Relocation Assistance Program and services and benefits for those displaced and other affected property owners, as well as information about the tentative schedule for right-of-way acquisition and construction, can be obtained from the TxDOT district of-fice by calling (817) 370-6744.

The proposed project would involve construction in wetlands.

The proposed project would involve an action in a floodplain.

Any environmental documentation or studies, any maps and drawings showing the project location and design, tentative construction schedules, and other information regarding the proposed project are on file and available for inspection by appointment Monday through Friday between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. at the Fort Worth District Office, 2501 SW Loop 820, Fort Worth, TX 76133. Project materials are also available online at www.txdot.gov. These materials will also be available in hard copy form for review at the in-person public hearing.

The in-person public hearing option will be conducted in English. If you need an interpreter because English is not your primary language or you have difficulty communicating effectively in English, one will be provided to you. If you have a disability and need assistance, special arrangements can be made to accommodate most needs. If you need interpretation or translation services or you are a person with a disability who requires an accommodation to attend and participate in the in-person public hearing option, please call (817) 370-3519 no later than 4 p.m. CT on December 4, 2023. Please be aware that advance notice is required as some services and accommodations may require time for the Texas Department of Transportation to arrange.

Thanksgiving Proclamation

New York, 3 October 1789

By the President of the United States of America, a Proclamation.

Whereas it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore his protection and favor - and whereas both Houses of Congress have by their joint Committee requested me "to recommend to the People of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness."

Now therefore I do recommend and assign Thursday the 26th day of November next to be devoted by the People of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be - That we may then all unite in rendering unto him our sincere and humble thanks - for his kind care and protection of the People of this Country previous to their becoming a Nation - for the signal and manifold mercies, and the favorable interpositions of his Providence which we experienced in the course and conclusion of the late war - for the great degree of tranquility, union, and plenty, which we have since enjoyed - for the peaceable and rational manner, in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national One now lately instituted - for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed; and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and in general for all the great and various favors which he hath been pleased to confer upon us.

And also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations and beseech him to pardon our national and other transgressions - to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually - to render our national government a blessing to all the people, by constantly being a Government of wise, just, and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed - to protect and guide all Sovereigns and Nations (especially such as have shewn kindness unto us) and to bless them with good government, peace, and concord - To promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the encrease of science among them and us - and generally to grant unto all Mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as he alone knows to be best.

Given under my hand at the City of New York the third day of October in the year of our Lord 1789.
