Oct. 5 Meeting

The Benbrook city council meeting held on Oct. 5 was conducted as scheduled.

Mayor Jason Ward called the meeting to order. An invocation was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Time was then allowed for citizen comments on any agenda item, and resident Terry Roach approached the podium.

Roach commended Commander (Craig) Ross on answering some questions he had regarding the purchasing of police vehicles earlier in the evening, and then challenged the council members to have a civil dialogue with him and to listen to the concerns he has.

Minutes from the previous meeting held on Sept. 21 were then approved unanimously among all members present.

The first item of the evening was to award a contract for employee health insurance to Cigna Healthcare. The current contract is with United Healthcare. United is proposing a 10 percent increase, and Cigna's proposed rate would only require a once percent increase from current costs.

The projected cost would be \$2,064,058, and was approved unanimously for one year.

Next up was a proposal for the purchase of police package patrol vehicles. It was proposed by Ross that Benbrook purchase four police interceptor utility vehicles at a total price of \$194,840 from Texas Buy Board, the low bidder for the vehicles.


The motion was approved unanimously. Next up was informal citizen comments, but there were none.

The City of Benbrook is hosting a free Electronic Waste/Document Shredding event at the Dutch Branch Park parking lot on Saturday, Oct. 14, from 8 a.m. to noon.

Innovative Electronics will be on-site to collect E-Waste. There will be attendants available to help unload items.

As a rule of thumb, if it can be plugged in, it can be recycled.

The following is a list of common items that citizens can bring for recycling:

- Televisions (any size)/Radios/Telephones (No CRT)
- Computers/monitors/printers (Innovative Electronics destroys the hard drive)
 - Fax Machines/Copiers
- Microwave ovens/Dishwashers/ Washers/Dryers/Refrigerators
- Gaming systems (Xbox, PlayStations, etc.)
 - Vacuum Cleaners
 - VCR's
 - Smoke detectors



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Fort Worth Native, Actor Larry Hagman by Dr. Ken Bridges



Texas has produced many colorful characters and gifted actors and artists in its long history. Among those is actor Larry Hagman. He played one of the most notorious villains on TV but was the opposite offscreen, known instead for his wit and his devotion to friends.

Hagman was born in September 1931 in Fort Worth. His father, Benjamin Jackson Hagman, was an attorney and an accountant in nearby Weatherford, who later worked as a prosecuting attorney and was a decorated artillery officer during World War II.

His home life was difficult. In 1936, his mother, Mary Martin, was anxious to resume her career as a singer and stage actress and filed for divorce. For the next several years, Larry Hagman alternated between his mother and his grandmother while living in California. His mother sent him to a series of boarding schools before he went to live with her again in New York City after World War II. In 1946, he returned to Weatherford to live with his father and his new wife and half-brother.

He attended Weatherford High School and took several jobs. One summer, he worked for oilman Jess Hall, Jr., the owner of Antelope Tool Company. Hagman said he would later base his character of J.R. Ewing on memories of Hall. He graduated high school in 1949. His father encouraged him to become a lawyer, but Hagman instead pursued acting. He attended Bard College in New York City majoring in drama and dance but quit after one year.
