Benbrook Council Action

Oct. 5 Meeting

The Benbrook city council meeting held on Oct. 5 was conducted as scheduled.

Mayor Jason Ward called the meeting to order. An invocation was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Time was then allowed for citizen comments on any agenda item, and resident Terry Roach approached the podium.

Roach commended Commander (Craig) Ross on answering some questions he had regarding the purchasing of police vehicles earlier in the evening, and then challenged the council members to have a civil dialogue with him and to listen to the concerns he has.

Minutes from the previous meeting held on Sept. 21 were then approved unanimously among all members present.

The first item of the evening was to award a contract for employee health insurance to Cigna Healthcare. The current contract is with United Healthcare. United is proposing a 10 percent increase, and Cigna's proposed rate would only require a once percent increase from current costs.

The projected cost would be \$2,064,058, and was approved unanimously for one year.

Next up was a proposal for the purchase of police package patrol vehicles. It was proposed by Ross that Benbrook purchase four police interceptor utility vehicles at a total price of \$194,840 from Texas Buy Board, the low bidder for the vehicles.

The motion was approved unanimously.

Next up was informal citizen comments, but there were none.

The meeting was then adjourned

The City of Benbrook is hosting a free Electronic Waste/Document Shredding event at the Dutch Branch Park parking lot on Saturday, Oct. 14, from 8 a.m. to noon.

Innovative Electronics will be on-site to collect E-Waste. There will be attendants available to help unload items.

As a rule of thumb, if it can be plugged in, it can be recycled.

The following is a list of common items that citizens can bring for recycling:

- Televisions (any size)/Radios/Telephones (No CRT)
- Computers/monitors/printers (Innovative Electronics destroys the hard drive)
- Fax Machines/Copiers
- Microwave ovens/Dishwashers/Washers/Dryers/Refrigerators
- Gaming systems (Xbox, PlayStations, etc.)
- Vacuum Cleaners
- VCR's
- Smoke detectors

Eye Health Essentials for the Solar Eclipse Saturday

Ahead of the annular solar eclipse this Saturday, Oct. 14, the Texas Optometric Association (TOA) is sharing tips and information to help Texans prepare for this extremely rare event.

During an annular eclipse, the moon will pass over the sun creating a “ring of fire” visual for those within the eclipse’s path. The eclipse will pass over Texas between 11:30 a.m. and noon, with the “ring of fire” beginning at 11:41 a.m. The eclipse will last for a few seconds to up to five minutes depending on where it is viewed.

“Texans run the risk of temporary or permanent eye damage, also known as ‘eclipse blindness’ from viewing the solar eclipse unsafely, and many times people don’t know that damage has happened until much later,” said Kumar Patel, OD., President-Elect of TOA.

Here are ways to safely watch a solar eclipse, per Prevent Blindness:

- Solar Eclipse Glasses: Use expert-approved solar eclipse glasses to view a solar eclipse safely and without damaging your eyes. Make sure they meet safety requirements and are manufactured with the ISO 12312-2 standard. Look for ISO standard labeling when looking for solar eclipse glasses and purchase them from a trusted source.
 - Pinhole projection: This is the safest and most inexpensive way to watch a solar eclipse. This helps you avoid looking directly at the eclipse by using a projected image. This DIY project includes making a pinhole in cardboard paper with the sun on one side and a piece of paper three feet away without obstruction to project the image on the other side. Keep in mind not to look through the pinhole at the sun.
 - Welder’s glass: Number 14 welder’s glass provides effective protection and can be found at a local welder’s supply store. This glass will reduce the harmful rays that are emitted during the eclipse. Do not use if there are any scratches or damage to the glass.
 - Mylar filters: Aluminized mylar plastic sheets are available as eclipse vision glasses or can be cut and made into a viewing box. Do not use if there are any scratches or damage to the sheet.
- See below for what to avoid when viewing a solar eclipse:
- Do not use your smartphone: Watching a solar eclipse on your smartphone camera can put you at risk of accidentally looking at the sun when trying to line up your camera. It could possibly also damage your smartphone camera.
 - Do not use your camera viewfinder: Never look at a solar eclipse through the optical viewfinder of a camera. It can damage your eyes in the same way as looking directly at it.
 - Do NOT use unsafe filters: Unless specifically designed for viewing a solar eclipse, no filter is safe to use with any optical device (telescopes, binoculars, etc.).
- All color film, black-and-white film that contains no silver, photographic negatives with images on them (x-rays and snapshots), smoked glass, sunglasses (single or multiple pairs), photographic neutral density filters and polarizing filters are unsafe filters to watch a solar eclipse. Solar filters designed for eyepieces that come with inexpensive telescopes are also unsafe.

High School Football: Cougars Defeat Highlanders; Eagles Best Bobcats

The Western Hills football Cougars clawed out an 18-16 victory over Eastern Hills to improve to 2-1 in district competition.

The Highlanders took an 8-0 lead early, but Western Hills answered with a touchdown run from Jaqualen Daniel and the score was 8-6 at the half.

The Cougars took the lead in the second half on a touchdown run from EJ Jones, and extended it's lead in the fourth quarter, when Daniel added a second touchdown run to give Western Hills an 18-8 lead.

Eastern Hills scored late, but the Cougars were able to hold on for the win.

"This was a huge win for this team," coach Blake Moilan said. "I think that we are still trying to figure out who we are as a team after losing so many pieces last year and that explains a little bit of Jekyll and Hyde kind of play. We have to really settle down and play good solid football going into this weeks game."

Western Hills will play at Castleberry at 7 p.m. tomorrow evening.

Over at Benbrook, the Bobcats came up a bit short in its district opener on Friday night, losing to Hillsboro by a score of 22-15.

Coach Cody Slater said he was pleased with the way his team played on one side of the ball.

"We played really good defense in the second half of the game and shut them out in the second half offensively," Slater said.

Kade Cross led the way offensively with four receptions for 97 yards.

Defensively, Cross has 12 tackles and two tackles-for-loss and Jacob Carpenter had nine tackles, two tackles-for-loss and a fumble caused. Corner back T.J. Johnson added an interception for the Bobcats.

Benbrook will play at 7 p.m. tomorrow evening at Venus and Slater said his team will need to come prepared.

"Venus is much improved from last year," Slater said. "They

operate out of a Slot T Offense and they run a 4-4 Defense. We will have to clean up our mistakes to give us the best chance to be successful this week."

On the court, the Benbrook volleyball team defeated Dunbar 3-1 on Friday night to remain unbeaten in district competition, and coach Frances Davies said the Wildcats held their own against her team.

"The game was in fact a battle," Davies said. "Dunbar came to play and challenged us the entire time and even managed to steal a set off of us which shook us a little, but the girls rallied back and finished the night strong. We are definitely going to be reviewing the film and focusing on the problem areas and cleaning it up this week during practice."

Davies said she did have a couple of stand out efforts in the game.

"Luci (Rotman) is one of my captains and her performance showed why she was chosen," Davies said. "She played smart and aggressive, never quit, and constantly worked to keep her team motivated. She also had a great night stats wise. Ravyn Dash came out with double digits in kills and digs, and helped push us through with her aggressive serving."

Benbrook will play Western Hills tomorrow evening, and Davies said it should be a good game.

"I always expect an exciting game against Hills," Davies said. "With them being our crosstown rival we always know it's going to be a fun one. I know just like us, they're studying film and preparing. We just have to stay focused and play our game at our speed."

tice for the new \$75 million Community Noise Mitigation Program. Comments must be submitted by 7 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 13.



Fort Worth Native, Actor Larry Hagman by Dr. Ken Bridges



Texas has produced many colorful characters and gifted actors and artists in its long history. Among those is actor **Larry Hagman**. He played one of the most notorious villains on TV but was the opposite off-screen, known instead for his wit and his devotion to friends.

Hagman was born in September 1931 in Fort Worth. His father, Benjamin Jackson Hagman, was an attorney and an accountant in nearby Weatherford, who later worked as a prosecuting attorney and was a decorated artillery officer during World War II.

His home life was difficult. In 1936, his mother, Mary Martin, was anxious to resume her career as a singer and stage actress and filed for divorce. For the next several years, Larry Hagman alternated between his mother and his grandmother while living in California. His mother sent him to a series of boarding schools before he went to live with her again in New York City after World War II. In 1946, he returned to Weatherford to live with his father and his new wife and half-brother.

He attended Weatherford High School and took several jobs. One summer, he worked for oilman Jess Hall, Jr., the owner of Antelope Tool Company. Hagman said he would later base his character of J.R. Ewing on memories of Hall. He graduated high school in 1949. His father encouraged him to become a lawyer, but Hagman instead pursued acting. He attended Bard College in New York City majoring in drama and dance but quit after one year.

Hagman acted in small stage productions

before he was drafted in 1952. He married Maj Axelsson in 1954, with whom he had two children. After four years in the air force, he returned to New York City and acted in a series of plays. His first TV appearance was a guest shot on the 1957 series *Decoy*. In 1958, he made three guest appearances on *Sea Hunt* with Lloyd Bridges.

He kept making small appearances on stage and screen, and his career steadily grew. From 1961 to 1963, he had a recurring role on the CBS soap opera *The Edge of Night*. His first film role was in 1964 in *Ensign Pulver*. Later that year, he appeared in the thriller *Failsafe*.

In 1965, he made a huge breakthrough with his career when he landed the lead in *I Dream of Jeannie*. Hagman played Maj. Tony Nelson, an astronaut who found a genie in a bottle on a deserted island. His character was often bewildered and overwhelmed by the antics of the genie played by Barbara Eden, who would become a lifelong friend. The popular series ran until 1970. After the end of the series, he appeared in two short-lived sitcoms, *The Good Life* (1971-1972) and *Here We Go Again* (1973).

He was looking for a new role in early 1978 when his wife suggested he read the script of a proposed new drama about a Texas oil family. Hagman immediately felt drawn to the scheming character of J.R. Ewing and got the role. When *Dallas* premiered in April 1978, it was an instant hit. "J.R." became a cultural icon, and millions tuned in every week to see his latest scheme and whether his co-star, Patrick Duffy, who played the younger brother Bobby Ewing, could thwart his plans. Many scenes were shot in and around the Dallas area, to the delight of Metroplex residents. In spite of his TV character, Hagman developed close relationships with all his fellow cast members.

The tensions in the Ewing family and the web of his backstabbing plans led to the famous "Who Shot J.R.?" cliffhanger in 1980, leaving millions wondering if he would survive the shooting and who was responsible. The question was the subject of interviews,

articles, and magazine covers across the globe. In November 1980, in one of the most-watched episodes in television history, 83 million Americans tuned in to learn that he had survived and was shot by his sister-in-law and mistress.

The series lasted for 14 seasons. He was nominated for two Emmy Awards and four Golden Globe Awards. Hagman was the only actor to appear in all 357 episodes before the cancellation of *Dallas* in May 1991. He and other co-stars would appear in six TV movies in the years afterward. Hagman once said about his character, "It's fun to play the villain."

He would make brief film appearances, and directed a number of episodes of *In the Heat of the Night*, which starred his close friend Carroll O'Connor. But he faced a major health crisis in 1995. Hagman had been a heavy drinker for many years and had to undergo a liver transplant. The operation was a success, and he quit drinking. He wrote an autobiography, "*Hello Darlin*", in 2001. When his wife developed Alzheimer's Disease, he stayed by her side until her death in 2011.

In 2011, he was approached about a revival of *Dallas*. His first question was, "Are all my friends going to be there?" The revival premiered in 2012 with most of the surviving series originals and fared well in the ratings. However, Hagman was diagnosed with throat cancer. He received treatment while he worked on the series, and it initially seemed successful. However, a new cancer diagnosis was revealed in 2012.

Hagman died at a Dallas hospital in November 2012 at age 81.

How to Navigate Your Medicare Options During the Annual Enrollment Period

The average Medicare beneficiary in 2023 has access to 43 Medicare Advantage plans, the largest number of options ever, according to KFF. With so many plans to choose from, the Medicare and Prescription Drug Plan Annual Enrollment Period (AEP), taking place from Oct. 15 to Dec. 7, may be overwhelming and confusing.

“The Medicare Annual Enrollment Period is when you can shop for a new plan, if you want to,” says Kate Long, consumer financial wellness advocate at Assurance IQ.


