Edward was born Nov. 9, 1953, in Canada, but raised in Oregon City, Ore. After high school, he attended a local community college before transferring to Oregon State University, where he played football.

An Academic All American, he graduated with a Bachelor's degree in entomology. He worked for Pacific Northwest Bell for many years before joining the Oregon State Department of Agriculture, working in the field to track invasive species.

From the age of 17, his main hobby was ham radio. He was a lifetime member of ARRL. As an active member of Hoodview Amateur Radio Club, he participated in their events, serving as vice president during his time there.

In 2010, he met his future wife, Dawne Kite. They moved to Texas in early 2015 and were married in September of that year. They spent their time exploring local areas of interest. He was active with a local radio club until his stroke in 2017.

Ed was preceded in death by his parents, Charles Byron Corey and Natalie Belozer Corey; and his brother, Larry Wayne Corey.

Fort Worth ISD Board Approves Resolution Calling for School Building Capacity Study

The Fort Worth Independent School Dis- to address resource inequities among trict (FWISD) is reaffirming its commitment to equitable education for all students with a groundbreaking resolution approved at the Board's Regular Meeting on Sept. 26.

FWISD, home to nearly 71,000 students and a diverse community, is dedicated to preparing all students for success in college, career, and community leadership. Under the leadership of the Board and superintendent, the District is transforming its schools to better serve its students.

A key part of this effort is a comprehensive study of school building capacity. Despite a decline in enrollment, the District has not proportionally reduced the number of schools it operates. This has led to underutilized facilities and smaller student populations in some schools, resulting in higher $Benbrook\ Trash$ operational costs and fewer academic offerings.

To address this issue, the Board has directed the Superintendent and District staff for Oct. 21 to conduct a study of excess capacity in school buildings. Hoar Program Management, LLC has been chosen to aid in the creation of FWISD's District-wide Facility Master Plan. This will include condition assessments, prioritization guidance, and formulating a master plan that will guide the renovation, repurposing, or construction of

The District is committed to involving the community, with preliminary findings shared at regional meetings for feedback. A final report, including rightsizing recommendations, will be presented to the Board after community input.

This resolution highlights FWISD's dedication to providing a supportive and wellresourced learning environment for every student and reinforces its commitment to educational equity.



Democratic Congressman, Hatton W. Sumners by Dr. Ken Bridges



Texas has produced many powerful political figures in its long history. In the 1930s, Texas had one of the most influential congressional delegations in the nation, including Sen. Morris Sheppard, the Senate Minority Whip, House Speaker John Nance Garner, and other congressmen such as future House Speaker Sam Rayburn and Wright Patman.

Among those figures was Congressman Hatton Sumners of Dallas, a 34-year veteran of Congress and chairman of the House Judiciary Committee for 14 years, helping to shape the direction of the federal judiciary.

Hatton Sumners was born in 1875 on a farm in Lincoln County, Tennessee, on the border with Alabama. His father had been a Confederate officer during the Civil War, and his parents also operated a boarding school. When he was 19, the family moved to Texas, settling in Garland, then a tiny community of just over 500 residents a few miles from Dallas.

Sumners wanted to pursue higher education and was interested in a law career. However, money was tight; and there were few alternatives at the time. He went to the Dallas city attorney, Alfred Wonzencraft, and explained his plight.

Impressed by Sumners, Wozencraft hired him to work at his law firm, allowing him to study the law at night and even sleep in the offices. By 1897, Sumners passed the bar exam and began his work as an attorney.

In 1900, he decided to run for Dallas County Attorney. Though only having practiced for three years, Sumners won easily and became county attorney at the age of 25. He made shutting down gambling in the dation. county a priority, a crusade that he claimed was re-elected in 1904 and convinced the aspiring students and grants for researchers. state legislature to push through a bill makony. He declined to run for a third term in 1906 and was named president of the state district attorney's association and spent the next few years running his own law firm.

In 1912, he was elected to Congress. He jumped into his work, quickly passing a bill From the Benbrook Public Library to make Dallas a port of entry, easing the importation of products from abroad. Sumners was an enthusiastic supporter of the Federal Reserve Act to reform the nation's banking system. He was instrumental in bringing the regional Federal Reserve Bank to Dallas. The move solidified the position of Dallas as a major financial center in the state.

His congressional colleagues acknowledged his expertise on constitutional law and had him assigned to the House Judiciary Committee in 1919. He worked on a number of reforms to the federal judiciary, including changes to case loads and retirements. Though he supported a fair and transparent judiciary, he was often hostile to civil rights legislation, as were many southerners at the time.

Sumners became chairman of the House Judiciary Committee in 1932. As part of his committee work, he served as a House manager in the impeachment cases of three federal judges in their trials before the Senate. He also appeared as an attorney before the Supreme Court on several occasions to defend the interests of Congress in several cases. In 1934, as President Franklin D. Roosevelt prepared to grant independence to the Philippines, Sumners wrote a constitution for the islands.

In 1946, he announced his retirement after 17 terms in Congress. He enjoyed a quiet life upon his return to Dallas. He lived on the campus of Southern Methodist University for several years while working as the Director of Research in Law and Government for the Southwestern Legal Foun-
