Western Hills Defeats Polytechnic, Bobcats Routed by Rams

The Western Hills football team defeated Polytechnic by a score of 39-0 on Friday night, and coach Blake Moilan said it was a strong effort from his team.

“Overall we were happy with the win,” Moilan said. “We need to keep working on certain aspects of the game, but we have seen big advances over the last three weeks. Poly had some good athletes that we were able to contain, but our offense continued to roll. We need to make sure we play fast.”

Moilan said was especially impressed

with the defensive effort.

“We got the shut out,” Moilan said. “That was big for our defense. Defensive lineman **Rod Gray** (pictured left) had a big game with three tackles, a sack, a tackle for a loss, and a fumble recovery.”

Offensively, Tyreke Lewis carried the ball 19 times for 151 yards and two touchdowns, Keyon Butler threw the ball for 141 yards and ran for another 122 yards on nine carries with two touchdowns.

Kicker Emmanuel Nshimiyimana also kicked a 32 yard field goal for the Cougars.

Moilan said he believes the non-district schedule did a good job of preparing his team for district competition.

“I think we have played some physical teams and played some good football,” Moilan said. “We got out of non-district with a winning record. Our district as a whole is better this season, so we will need to continue to improve.”

Western Hills is in it's bye week this week, and Moilan said there are a couple of goals.

“The number one objective is to get some rest and heal up a bit,” Moilan said. “That's the most important aspect of the bye week. We will work in a few wrinkles that we have (continued on page 2)

been saving for district play and put in a few new things.”

Over at Benbrook, the Bobcats lost to Mineral Wells by a score of 28-14 last week, but coach Cody Slater said he was pleased with how his team played.

“I was really proud of how our team competed on Friday Night,” Slater said. “This week we challenged our kids that we had to get tougher, be more physical and get better at the fundamentals and we did that. Looking back, if we didn’t fumble going in to score in the first quarter and if we didn’t have a touchdown called back in the second quarter, the outcome might have been different.”

Collin Thompson was 16 of 25 passing for 219 yards and 2 touchdowns, and had 16 carries for 77 yards rushing.

Kyler Hayes had 3 catches for 54 yards and 2 touchdowns, and Lucas Jackson had 7 catches for 83 yards

Defensively, Sawyer Clemmons had 16 tackles, while Evan Long had 10 tackles and Kade Cross finished the game with 10 tackles for Benbrook.

The Bobcats will play Bridgeport tonight at AT&T Stadium, in Arlington at 7:30 p.m., and Slater said his team will have their hands full.

“Bridgeport is a really good football team,” Slater said. “They are coming in with a 2-1 record on the year. Their offense is really explosive. They are averaging 53 points per game. As a staff, we are looking forward to seeing our kids compete and continue to improve as we move closer to district play.”

On the court, the Benbrook volleyball team came up short against Kennedale on Friday, losing 19-25, 25-18, 25-19, 22-25, 11-15, and coach Frances Davies said the two teams have a history.

“This was a tough loss for us,” Davies said. “We’ve seen Kennedale three times before and handled our business each time.

However, with still being pretty worn out from our Florida trip, a couple girls sick, and KHS coming out strong, we just couldn’t finish the way we wanted. It was a great battle, and a good learning moment on the importance of making teams earn points versus us giving them away.”

Benbrook played Dunbar on Tuesday night after the paper had gone to press and will square off with Eastern Hills at 6 p.m. tomorrow night at EHHS.

“I always love playing against (Sonia) VanGilder and her girls,” Davies said. “It’s always a super fun match up. I’m honestly not sure what to expect this year. Most of the teams, myself included, are in rebuild mode. I know she’s got one or two new ones, so we’ll be focusing on what we can control. Our energy, our tempo, and limiting our mistakes.”

tributions to the state’s public education system.

Kuhl, a longtime Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) member, joined his local parent organization when his daughter started pre-kindergarten with the Fort Worth ISD.

As a parent volunteer, he has helped organize the annual school carnival at his daughter’s elementary school, mentored a special education student, participated in door-to-door outreach to register students for school, and educated parent groups on how to advocate for their child, the whole class, and their school at the campus, district, and state levels.

At the outset of the COVID pandemic, Kuhl secured a national Parent Teacher Association (PTA) grant to build outdoor classrooms. He also organized districtwide mask distribution and vaccine registration events and hosted virtual town halls with FWISD administrators that informed and answered parent questions about virtual learning and return-to-school options.

Kuhl galvanized parent support behind the \$1.211 billion 2021 FWISD capital improvement bond project that will fund the construction, renovation, and upgrade of District middle schools, new elementary schools, and four early childhood centers embedded in schools around FWISD.

In his time as a parent volunteer, Kuhl has brought together state and local elected officials for a districtwide PTA luncheon highlighting the association’s mission and equitable public education.

“No matter how small or big the task is, he does what is necessary to help families and students,” wrote Alma Pohler, volunteer specialist for the Family and Community Outreach and Marketing, in an essay nominating Kuhl for the Heroes for Children Award. “His outstanding performance in the Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) of his daughter’s school and the Fort Worth ISD Council of PTAs has earned him the esteem of parents, the admiration of teachers, the respect of principals, and the appreciation of the Fort Worth ISD leadership.”

FEMA Funeral Assistance

Remains Available for COVID-19 Related Deaths

The COVID-19 pandemic has taken a toll on everyone, especially those who suffered loss due to the virus. Nothing can replace loved ones, but FEMA may be able to help ease the financial burden that comes with that loss.

Those who had funeral COVID-19 related funeral expenses can apply for FEMA Funeral Assistance by calling 844-684-6333. Phone lines are open 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. CDT, Monday through Friday with multilingual services available.

Applicants requiring relay services, such as videophone, Innocaption or CapTel must provide FEMA a specific number assigned to that service. It is important that FEMA is able to contact applicants. There is currently no deadline to apply for aid.

The criteria to qualify for assistance includes:

- The person died of COVID-19.
- The death occurred in the U.S.
- The applicant paid for funeral, burial or cremation costs after Jan. 20, 2020.
- The applicant is a U.S. citizen, U.S. national, lawful permanent resident or qualified refugee. The deceased does not need to meet these qualifications.

When applicants call for assistance, they need to provide the following information:

- Social security number
- Date of birth
- Current mailing address and phone number
- The deceased date of birth
- Location of deceased death
- Information about any funeral or burial insurance policies
- Information about other funeral assistance received, such as donations or CARES Act grants

Eligibility determinations are based on the submission of all required documents. Additional information and answers to frequently asked questions about the application process can be found on FEMA’s [Funeral Assistance FAQ page](#).

Is Your Wallet Recession-Proof?



As inflation continues to put a strain on budgets, talk of an upcoming recession has Americans worried about their finances. Prices on everyday items continue to rise and consumers are trying to find ways to make their dollar stretch further while safeguarding their money against the potential challenges a recession may bring. Being proactive is key to weathering financial storms, yet less than half of consumers have prepared for a recession when it comes to their finances and credit. Those who have are finding different ways to do so: 49 percent have cut non-essential expenses like entertainment and vacations, 45 percent have created a budget and 40 percent have paid down debt.

While these are effective actions, there are other steps consumers can take to understand their credit history and safeguard their credit.

Consumers should check their credit report and credit score regularly to know exactly where they stand in the event that they need to apply for credit, or simply to be better informed as they prepare to pay down their debt ahead of an economic decline. They can get a free credit report and credit score from Experian (Spanish-language credit reports are also available) as well as access to free financial tools, an auto insurance shopping service and credit card marketplace.

Those who need help increasing their credit score can sign up for Experian Boost. This free feature enables consumers to add their monthly payments for cell phone bills, utility bills, rent and video streaming services to their credit history to potentially increase their FICO Score instantly. "Inflation and recession fears are putting pressure on consumer's finances, but proactively planning for the worst can help consumers make it through potential challenges. Many consumers are already taking great steps to prepare, like creating a budget and paying down their debt, and we encourage them to utilize other available resources and tools to help," says Rod Griffin, senior director of Public Education and Advocacy at Experian.

Insurance Pioneer, Tom Braniff *by Dr. Ken Bridges*

It started with an insurance salesman and one small airplane. From there, it became an aviation empire and one of the most noted names in Texas aviation. From Braniff Airline's humble beginnings, Tom Braniff's story became one of many colorful tales of Texas pilots and businessmen and the quest to conquer the skies.

Thomas Elmer Braniff was born in Salina, Kansas, in December 1883 into a farming family. His father, John Braniff, soon moved into the insurance business and moved the family to Kansas City in the 1890s. The younger Braniff worked a series of jobs while he completed school, including working in a meat-packing plant and working for the Kansas City Star. In 1900, the family moved to Oklahoma City where John Braniff began working for a new insurance agency.

The younger Braniff soon wanted to branch out and soon started his own insurance agency west of Oklahoma City at the age of 17. However, his firm went bankrupt when a tornado wiped out a nearby community where Braniff had sold tornado insurance and was unable to pay the claims. He soon returned to Oklahoma City and started a new firm with a partner. The new firm struggled in its early years, but by 1917, he was able to buy out his partner. He expanded into Braniff Investments shortly afterward and soon had one of the most successful insurance agencies in the region.

By the 1920s, Braniff was looking to the future. In 1923, he built the T.E. Braniff Building in Oklahoma City, a 10-story building that was the first skyscraper in Oklahoma. He also became fascinated with aviation, and his younger brother Paul already had a license and his own airplane. In 1927, Braniff and a group of investors bought a used airplane and began the Oklahoma Aero Club, beginning a flight school, air taxi service, and selling aircraft parts. In 1928, he bought out his partners and started an airline, with his brother Paul as president and the main pilot and himself as vice-president, calling it Paul R. Braniff, Inc. It served a single route between Tulsa and Oklahoma City.

The next year, the first Braniff Airlines was sold, but in 1930, the two started again with Braniff Airways serving routes from Oklahoma City to either Tulsa or Wichita Falls. In 1935, he expanded deeper into Texas by buying Long and Harmon Airlines, a small airline based in Dallas that also had routes to Amarillo, Brownsville, and Galveston. More importantly, this smaller airline also had a lucrative air mail contract, guaranteeing paid service to these different cities. In 1936, Braniff bought



Bowen Airlines, a small company operating out of Fort Worth.

In spite of his growing success, he met with tragedy. In 1938, his son died in an airplane crash. He continued to move forward nevertheless. By the late 1930s, the airline was now based in Dallas, offering up to eight flights per day out of Dallas Love Field, contributing to the airport's growing success. Most maintenance operations were also conducted in Dallas by this point.

When World War II started, the Braniff brothers stepped up. Paul Braniff, now in his forties, would serve as a pilot during World War II, while his brother, too old for the military at this point, controlled the airline and his other business interests at home. Tom Braniff donated all of the airline's DC-2 aircraft to the military, which were older but still reliable aircraft, as the airline switched to the DC-3. Braniff also arranged to share their Love Field facilities with the military for maintenance and training of pilots and mechanics.

After World War II, Braniff began routes throughout Central America and the Caribbean. They also expanded steadily across the Midwest. In 1952, he bought Mid-Continent Airlines. By this point, the airline dream that had started with one used plane now had a fleet of 75 aircraft, 400 pilots, and 4,000 employees. By the mid-1950s, it was the tenth largest airline in the country. However, Thomas Braniff died tragically in a private plane crash near Shreveport in 1954 at the age of 70. His brother Paul died a few months later from cancer.

The airline he founded continued for several more years and was a staple in Dallas aviation. By 1955, the company's payroll reached \$22 million (more than \$240 million in modern dollars), and the airline built a new terminal at Love Field in 1958. The number of passengers and the miles flown by passengers increased steadily into the mid-1960s. The company went through a series of buyouts in the 1960s but remained profitable well into the 1970s. In 1978, when the federal government deregulated airline routes, Braniff executives attempted to take advantage of it by buying a series of new aircraft and starting new routes. However, the new routes were not as profitable, and the company started losing money rapidly.

Braniff Airlines ultimately went bankrupt by 1982, a victim of increased competition, fuel prices, and a botched expansion attempt that left it deep in debt. New buyers attempted to resurrect the airline in 1984, mostly with staff from the old Braniff, but this effort failed by 1989. A second attempt to revive the airline started in 1991 but failed the next year.

Braniff Airways Foundation, a charity started by the airline, still works to promote the history of aviation.

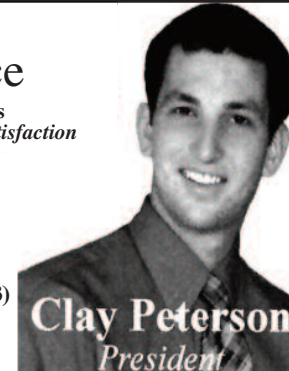
