Understanding the American Flag and the Significance of Flag Day

The American flag, often referred to as the “Stars and Stripes,” is a powerful symbol of the nation’s history, values, and unity. It consists of 13 stripes representing the original 13 colonies and 50 stars representing the current U.S. states. Over time, the flag has become a symbol of freedom, democracy, and the sacrifices made by generations of Americans.

Flag Day is observed each year on June 14 to commemorate the adoption of the United States flag. On that day in 1777, the Second Continental Congress officially approved the design of the American flag. The resolution stated: “*That the flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field.*”

Although it is not a federal holiday, Flag Day is an important national observance. It was officially established by President Woodrow Wilson in 1916, and later, in 1949, President Harry S. Truman signed it into law.

Flag Day serves as a time for Americans to honor the flag’s meaning and reflect on the country’s ideals. Many communities celebrate with ceremonies, parades, and educational events to promote patriotism and civic pride.

North Central Texas Council of Governments

Region's Population Tops 8.7 million



Population in North Central Texas grew to over 8.7 million in 2024, for a Jan. 1, 2025 total population of 8,718,500.

The region grew by more than 230,000 people in the past year, and by over 900,000 people in the five years since the 2020 Census.

Fort Worth (32,191) added more residents than any other city, followed by Dallas (29,510), Celina (15,980), McKinney (11,310), and Princeton (9,838).

For the third straight year, Collin County led the region in population growth, adding almost 76,000 new residents, followed by Tarrant County with over 35,000 and Denton County with over 31,000.

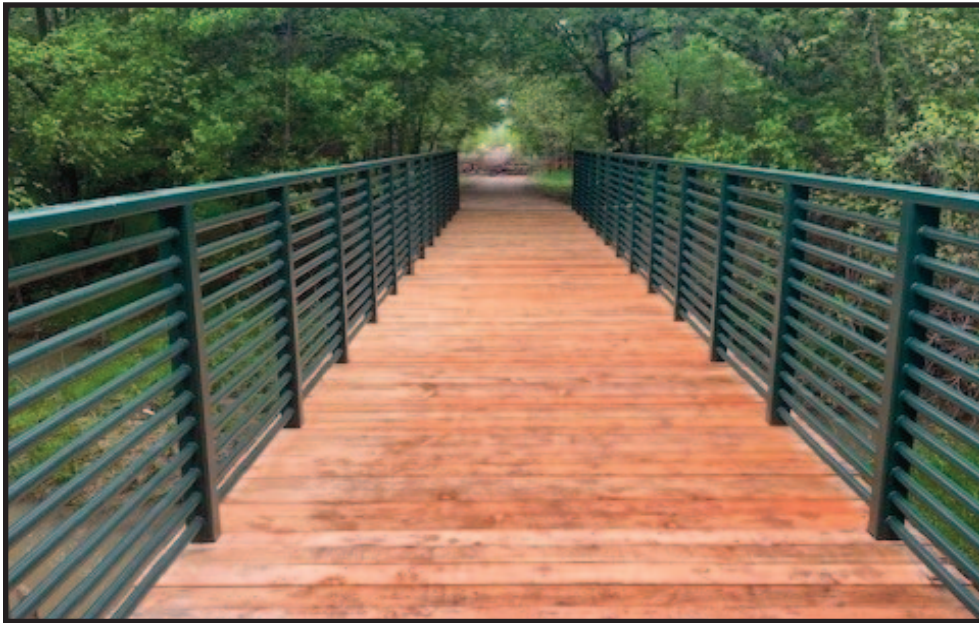

Trailway Reconnected: Bridge Restoration Reopens Full Length of Lake Mineral Wells State Park Trailway



After a lengthy closure, the full 20-mile stretch of Lake Mineral Wells State Park Trailway is officially open to the public thanks to the completion of a major bridge repair between FM 1195 and the National Vietnam War Museum.

The repair, constructed using a repurposed railroad car, restores safe, continuous access to one of the region's most beloved recreational assets.

"The Lake Mineral Wells State Trailway opened on June 6, 1998, on National Trails Day. It is exciting that we are able to complete this restoration project and reopen the trail again," stated Nikki Elms, Park Complex Superintendent. "Rails to Trails projects help restore economic prosperity to neighborhoods and underserved populations and preserve our railway heritage while promoting personal and environmental health for our visitors. This aligns with the local community being recognized in 2024 as the Wellness Capital of Texas."

This project is a prime example of the investment Texas State Parks has been able to make into existing parks thanks to the dedication of Sporting Goods Sales Tax funding in 2019.

This key section of the trailway was shut down due to a significant bridge failure caused by compromised support beams and shifting abutments. The innovative new structure not only improves water flow and sustainability but also pays tribute to the trailway's origins as a historic railroad corridor linking Weatherford and Mineral Wells.

"Bringing this portion of the trailway back to life has been a true community effort," said Rose Jordan, Director of Tourism for Mineral Wells. "We're grateful for the heart and help of folks like Rhett Warren and Glenn Rogers. The timing couldn't be better—just in time for National Trails Day, when we celebrate the power of trails to connect people, places and stories."

The restoration effort, which took two years from concept to completion, was made possible by the Friends of Lake Mineral

Wells State Park & Trailway, former State Representative Glenn Rogers, local attorney Rhett Warren, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's (TPWD) Infrastructure Division, and the dedicated staff of Lake Mineral Wells State Park and Trailway.

During the project, the entire trail also underwent maintenance that included hazard tree removal, brush clearing, culvert repair and new surfacing. Texas State Parks restored restrooms at trailheads and added a brand-new facility at Cold Springs in 2024.

"Our Friends Group is excited about the bridge replacement and all of the other work that has been done to the trail in the past few months," said Rhett Warren, president of the Friends of Lake Mineral Wells State Park and Trailway. "The trail is in its best shape in years. We send a big thanks out to TPWD and the park staff for all their hard work. I encourage everyone to get out and hike it, bike it, run it, or ride it on horseback and take advantage of this wonderful asset."

The Lake Mineral Wells Trailway offers a scenic, accessible route for hikers, cyclists and equestrians of all skill levels. With gentle grades and open vistas, the reclaimed railbed now serves as a safe and serene pathway through the Western Cross Timbers region, rich in both natural beauty and historical significance.

"In November of 2022, I visited the Trailway Bridge site to assess the issue and advocate for funding," said former State Representative Glenn Rogers. "We brought those concerns to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials in Austin, and I'm pleased the repairs were fully funded. The Trailway is one of many scenic treasures in the Mineral Wells area, and full access means more people can experience the beauty of this landscape."

The bridge reopening marks not just a physical reconnection of the trail but a symbolic reminder of what can be achieved when local passion and statewide partnership come together to preserve outdoor spaces for future generations.

Texas History Minute by Dr. Ken Bridges

Pioneering Geneticist Hermann Muller: The Texas Scientist Who Unlocked the Dangers of Radiation and Transformed Genetics



The gene is the fundamental building block of life. Genes determine how cells function and what traits are passed from one generation to the next. Little was understood about them when they were discovered in the late 1800s. However, the research of one Texas scientist and Nobel Prize winner, Dr. Hermann Muller, led to major breakthroughs in understanding the nature of genes.

Hermann Joseph Muller was born in New York City in 1890. His father was a metalworker, and his mother was a British immigrant. He became fascinated with biology at a young age. He graduated from high school at the age of 16 and entered what is now Columbia University. He ultimately completed his bachelors degree in biology in 1910 from Columbia and earned a doctorate by 1916.

In 1915, Muller was offered a position at Rice University in Houston as a biology professor and researcher. Rice had only been founded three years before, and its leaders were anxious to establish its reputation as a center for scientific research. He continued to focus his research on the genetics of flies and increasingly looked at genetic mutations. However, the lack of available lab assistants during World War I greatly limited his abilities to continue his

research. He left Rice and teamed up with his former mentor at Columbia University. As part of the continuation of their work, Muller was able to determine by 1920 that the size of wings of flies was determined genetically, a major breakthrough in understanding genetics.

He returned to Texas as a professor and researcher at the University of Texas in the fall of 1920. While at UT, he conducted some of his most important work regarding genetics. In 1923, he began using x-ray radiation in his genetic studies. Muller was becoming increasingly renowned among scientists, and he was invited to serve as a special professor in physiology at the University of Chicago in 1925 before resuming his work in Austin.

By 1926, Muller was able to conclusively demonstrate that x-rays caused lethal mutations in flies. The discovery cemented his reputation in the scientific community.

By 1928, he was also able to show that high levels of radiation also caused fatal damage in other types of insects and in plants such as corn and strongly suggested that radiation also posed a danger to human beings. He came to write dozens of scientific articles outlining his many findings.

Up to that time, very little was understood about the effects of radiation on animal tissues and cells.

Scientists experimenting with radiation had reported strange burns and increased cancer rates for years. While the words “radiation” and “mutations” became embedded in the imaginations of many science fiction novelists, comic book creators, and the general public in the years to come, Muller’s experiments conclusively showed the destructive effects of high levels of x-rays on cells. The x-ray was quickly becoming an indispensable tool in medical diagnostics in the 1920s, but Muller’s discovery demonstrated the need to limit the power of x-ray scans and exposure.

Muller left the University of Texas in 1932 and spent the next several years work-

ing in labs and teaching at various universities in the United States and Europe. In 1942 and 1943, he worked once again at the University of Chicago where he briefly worked on aspects of the Manhattan Project, America’s top-secret effort to produce an atomic bomb during World War II.

In 1945, Muller accepted a position as professor of zoology at Indiana University. In 1946, he was given the Nobel Prize in Medicine for his work in genetics, the most respected award in science. In his acceptance speech, Muller warned of the dangers of radiation, suggesting that there may not be a safe level of x-rays or other types of high-energy radiation. He spent the last years of his life warning about the dangers of nuclear war and radiation poisoning, calling for an end to the nuclear arms race of the 1950s and 1960s and calling for an end to nuclear testing.

Scientists not only impact the world with their own discoveries but also with the students they teach. Muller had a tremendous influence on his students, helping to train a number of important scientists. Dr. Wilson Stone, a longtime professor at the University of Texas, studied under Muller and continued his work on radiation and demonstrated how ultraviolet radiation affected bacteria and was later a consultant for the Atomic Energy Commission. Muller also helped train Dr. George Snell, who shared the 1980 Nobel Prize in Medicine for his work that showed the link between genes and successful organ transplants. Famed astronomer Carl Sagan also studied under Muller, working in one of his labs while still an undergraduate. Muller died at his home in Indianapolis in 1967 at the age of 76.

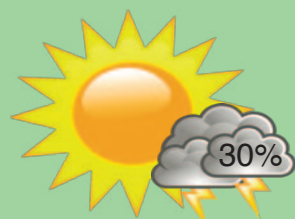
