## Sales Tax Holiday This Weekend

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar is reminding shoppers they can save money on clothes and school supplies during the state’s sales tax holiday on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 5-7.

State law exempts sales tax on qualified items, such as clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks, priced below \$100, saving shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend. The dates of the sales tax holiday and list of tax-exempt items are set by the Texas Legislature.

“With inflation driving prices higher on just about everything, this sales tax holiday provides Texas families some small relief managing the costs associated with kids heading back to the classroom. As the father of three school-aged children myself, I know how these expenses can add up,” Hegar said.

Apparel and school supplies that may be purchased tax-free are listed on the Comptroller’s website at [TexasTaxHoliday.org](http://TexasTaxHoliday.org).

During the annual sales tax holiday, qualifying items can be purchased tax free online or by telephone, mail, custom order or any other means (including in-store purchases) when either:

- the item is both delivered to, and paid for by, the customer during the exemption period; or,
- the customer orders and pays for the item, and the seller accepts the order during the exemption period for immediate shipment, even if delivery is made after the exemption period ends.

Texas’ sales tax holiday weekend has been an annual event since 1999.

As the lone regional qualifier in cross country last year on the boy's side, Olson said she will look to the incoming senior to provide leadership.

"The boys' team will lean on Gus quite a bit this year," Olson said. "He is the most experienced runner and the team will need him to lead the way. Our goal is always to win the district title and to advance to the region meet. Along with those, our goal is to place as high as possible and hopefully advance to the state meet in Round Rock."

Weir, 17, said that 2021 provided him with some good experience.

"Last season was a very fun season for me, as it was my first year for being number one on the team and a captain," Weir said.

The Brewer distance runner said he is confident heading into this coming season for both his team's chances and his individual shot at a regional berth and potentially beyond, "I am hoping that I will at least make it to the top 50 on regionals this year," Weir said. "And I hope we can get the whole varsity guys team to regionals as well."

An avowed gear head, Weir said he spends his free time with his other great passion.

"I work on cars and buy sell and trade cars and car parts," Weir said.

Weir said he thinks it will take a lot of hard work for Brewer to qualify for the regional meet and said there are a couple of areas he feels he needs to work on that have been issues in the past.

"One challenge was my shoes, as they were too heavy and were acting like weights on my feet," Weir said. "Another

is my work ethic - I needed it to be better so I could improve as much as I did."

# TAFB Continues Meeting the Need with Off-The-Dock Distribution

Food insecurity continues to be an issue both here in Fort Worth and across the country with rising costs due to inflation. Many families in the Tarrant area are facing food insecurity, some for the first time and, in fact, levels of need in the 13-county communities TAFB serves, have reached numbers that are equal if not greater than what was seen at the height of the pandemic. The added stress of the extreme heat has caused TAFB to look at ways to move mobile events indoors to ease the burden and heat on our volunteers, employees, and clients.

As the start of school for most in North Texas nears, Tarrant Area Food Bank (TAFB) is planning to conduct food distributions for families in need, allowing for even more convenience and accessibility this week. The mobile event that had been taking place in Haltom City, Fridays at W.G. Thomas Coliseum is now moving to a permanent location at the Met Church located at 11301 North Riverside Drive in Fort Worth, every Saturday from 8 to 10 a.m.

TAFB continues its monthly Off the Dock food distribution this Sunday, Aug. 7 at their Distribution Center in Fort Worth from 2 to 4 p.m.

The expansion of days and times at the TAFB West facility's

Mission Market will allow more people to shop by increasing both hours and days. The Mission Market, new to TAFB, is a place where the community can have a dignified grocery shopping experience for nutritious food to feed their families. The expansion includes opening Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursday, and Fridays in Weatherford.

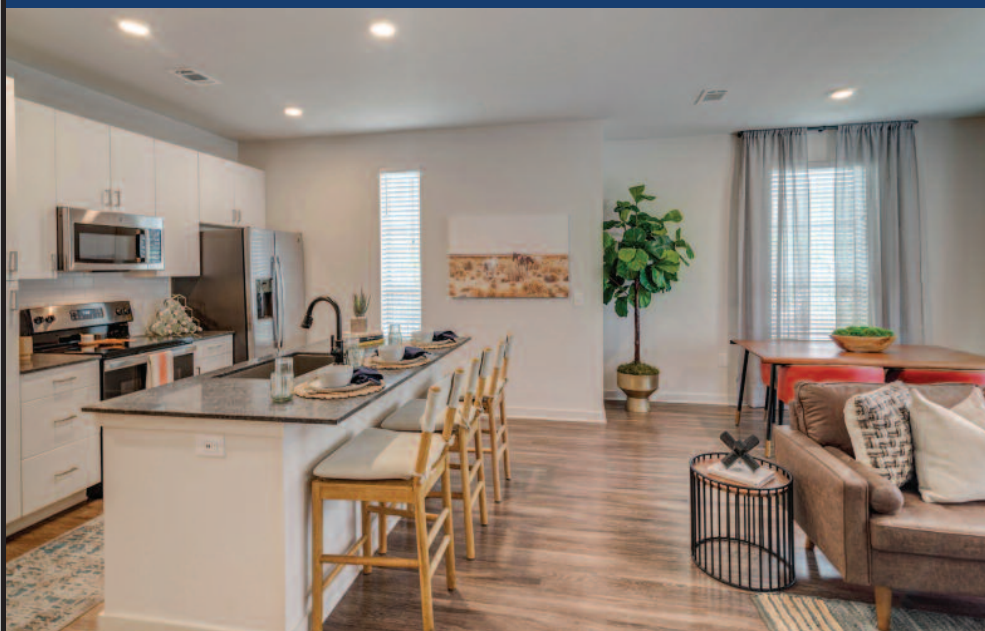
Mobile Markets are designed to serve all residents of the Tarrant area who are in need of food assistance.

# American Politician, John Connally *by Dr. Ken Bridges*

John Connally became a giant in Texas politics in the 1960s. He had a long career that included service in World War II, work as an attorney, years of work with Lyndon Johnson as his right-hand man in many campaigns. He would eventually rise to become governor and Secretary of the Treasury in a storied career. For Connally, it all began as part of a hardworking tenant farming family in South Texas.

John Bowden Connally, Jr., was born into a poor family in Floresville, near San Antonio, in 1917. His father was a sharecropper. Connally was one of seven children. He worked hard in his youth and still faithfully attended school.

He graduated from Floresville High School in 1933 in a time when few Texans graduated high school and even fewer Texas high schools had a twelfth grade. He had many talents and many dreams, and in spite of the Great Depression and his family's own poverty, he pushed forward and enrolled at the University of Texas while still only 16. At UT, he bloomed. He was a popular figure on campus, becoming class president. His grades were excellent, but he had to work his way through college, slowing his progress. He graduated in 1939.

It was in 1939 that he met and began working for then-Congressman Lyndon Johnson. Connally served as a legislative aide. Connally later remarked how he was always grateful for Johnson's friendship and for all that Johnson taught him. But the two were well-known for how stubborn they could be and would clash often throughout the years. After Connally's graduation, he entered the University of Texas Law School. While in law school, he married his college sweetheart, Nellie Brill, in 1940, with whom he would have four children. In 1941, he helped manage Johnson's first campaign for the U. S. Senate, one that Johnson lost narrowly after more than 6,000 votes for his opponent suddenly appeared. Connally learned just how brutal Texas politics could be. He earned his law degree by 1941 and continued to work for Johnson.

He entered the navy in 1941 as the United States entered World War II. He first served as an aide the Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal and was then assigned as a naval liaison to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower as he planned the American invasion of North Africa in 1942. Afterward, he was transferred to service on the aircraft carrier USS Essex in the South Pacific. He served ably amidst the heavy firefights the ship endured. During the Okinawa campaign in April 1945, the Essex suffered withering attacks for two days straight as Japanese kamikaze pilots attempted to destroy the ship. The Essex survived, and Connally was awarded a bronze star for bravery. He was soon transferred to the carrier USS Bennington, where he earned a legion of merit.

Connally returned to Austin in 1946. He began working for a local law firm and continued to spread his wings into other ventures. He pulled together a group of fellow veterans as investors to start a new radio station in Austin, KVET. He also managed Johnson's re-election campaign that year.

In 1948, Connally again worked with Johnson in his bid for the U. S. Senate. Johnson was leading the Democratic primary moving into the runoff against former Gov. Coke Stevenson. On the night of the runoff, Johnson again watched his lead shrink as votes mysteriously appeared for Stevenson. Johnson and Connally had arranged for counties they knew to be favorable to Johnson to withhold their boxes and understate their totals until later in the counting process. In the end, it

came down to the notorious Ballot Box 13 in Jim Wells County, whose 200 votes for Johnson led him to win by 87 votes. Stevenson's forces accused the two of stuffing the ballot boxes, and Connally and Johnson responded with their own charges against Stevenson, but no criminal activity was ever proven against either campaign.

As part of his legal work, in 1951, Connally began working as an attorney for Fort Worth oilman Sid Richardson, one of the wealthiest men in Texas. As a result, he and his family moved to Fort Worth to work more closely with his client.

In 1960, Sen. Johnson decided to run for president. This was still a time in which decisions on nominations could still be made in back-rooms by courting delegates to the national conventions. Primaries were in place in several states, but they were not as important as they would be in coming decades. Johnson entered the race too late to enter any of the campaigns and chose Connally to run his campaign at the Democratic National Convention in Los Angeles. John F. Kennedy, however, had already won enough delegates to put him over the top for the nomination; but Johnson and Connally still tried to convince delegates to change their minds. Eventually, Kennedy reluctantly chose Johnson as his running mate.

After Kennedy won the presidency, Johnson persuaded him to name Connally as secretary of the navy. This put Connally in charge of a branch of the service that employed more than 1.2 million people with more than 270 bases and hundreds of ships at the height of the Cold War. He stepped down from the position after a year to run for governor, his first bid for elected office.

## ***TxDOT Urges Drivers to be Alert As Children Return to School***

As millions of Texas children head back to school, the Texas Department of Transportation is reminding drivers to stay focused and drive safe in and around school zones and bus stops. This includes adhering to a new Texas law that requires drivers to stop and yield to pedestrians in crosswalks.

Everyone has a responsibility to keep children safe on their way to and from school. TxDOT offers these safety tips for drivers, parents and students:

### **Tips for Driving in School Zones**

- Be aware that traffic patterns around schools may have changed since the last school year.
- Stay alert and put your phone away. Using a handheld electronic device while driving in an active school zone is against the law.
- Always obey school zone speed limit signs. Remember, traffic fines increase in school zones.
- Drop off and pick up your children in your school's designated areas, not the middle of the street.
- Keep an eye on children gathered at bus stops.
- Watch for children who might dart across the street or between vehicles.

### **Tips for Drivers Sharing the Road with School Buses**

- Follow at a safe distance, keeping in mind that school buses make frequent stops.
- Always remain alert for children around buses and remember that they may not always look for vehicles before crossing the street.
- Stop for flashing red lights or a stop sign on a school bus, regardless of which direction you're headed. Continue your trip once the bus has moved, the flashing lights stop flashing or the bus driver signals it's okay to pass.
- Violations can lead to a fine of up to \$1,250 for a first offense.

### **Tips for Children Walking or Biking to School**

- Always use sidewalks. If there's not a sidewalk, walk on the left side of the street facing traffic.
- Cross the street at intersections or marked crosswalks. Look left, right and left again before proceeding.
- Always obey crossing guards.
- Make eye contact with drivers before crossing the street. Never assume a driver sees you.
- Look for traffic when stepping off a bus or from behind parked vehicles.
- Always wear a helmet when riding a bicycle.
- Don't be distracted by electronic devices that take your eyes and ears off the road.
- Follow all traffic rules, signs and signals.

"Be Safe. Drive Smart." is a key component of #EndTheStreakTX, a broader social media and word-of-mouth effort that encourages drivers to make safer choices while behind the wheel to help end the streak of daily deaths. Nov. 7, 2000, was the last deathless day on Texas roadways.

# Fort Worth Mary Isham Keith Chapter DAR



Mary Isham Keith Chapter of Fort Worth, chartered on Aug. 5, 1898 as the third DAR chapter in Texas, presented the prestigious NSDAR Women in American History Award to Mary Isham Randolph Keith for whom the chapter was named.

A "Mother of the Revolution," Mary Isham Randolph married Rev. James Keith in 1733, and although she died prior to the Revolutionary War, her sons, three sons-in-law and eight grandsons all gave service to the Revolutionary War effort.

Most notable among her many distinguished descendants was her grandson, Supreme Court Chief Justice John Marshall, who dominated the Court for over three decades, shaping American constitutional law and making the Supreme Court an independent and influential branch of government.

Named in her honor, the Mary Isham Keith Chapter NSDAR in Fort Worth was formed 124 years ago by her descendants: Founding Regent Elizabeth Douglas Keith Bell, Rose Douglas Brabson Bullard, and Minnie Colburn Naylor along with 11 other DAR members.

The chapter's active membership continues to honor God, home and country through programs and projects benefitting the community.

### -- US Air Force Issues Proposed Plan --

The United States Air Force is seeking public comment on the Proposed Plan for contaminated groundwater at Air Force Plant 4 (AFP4) located in Tarrant County, Texas. The Proposed Plan includes Monitored Natural Attenuation (MNA) combined with Institutional Controls; groundwater, surface water and sediment monitoring; as well as a Technical Impracticability Waiver of the Safe Drinking Water Act Maximum Contaminant Levels for a portion of the Landfill No.1 and Landfill No. 3 area in conjunction with removal and off-site disposal of non-aqueous phase liquids. The Proposed Plan also contains alternate remedies if MNA proves to be ineffective.

To ensure that the community's concerns are addressed, a **public comment period runs from 5 August 2022 to 16 September 2022**. During this time, the public is encouraged to submit any comments on the Proposed Plan to the Air Force.

The Air Force will host a **Public Meeting on 8 September 2022 from 6:30 pm – 8:30 pm** in the **Westworth Village Community Room** located at 311 Burton Hill Road, Westworth Village, TX 76114 to present the Proposed Plan and take public comments.

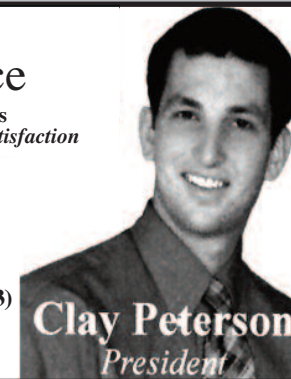
