White Settlement Mayor Curby Mirike called a meeting to organize a Volunteer Fire Department with assistance from Grand Prairie Fire Chief J.C. Swadley, Jr. on May 5, 1949.

In 2016, the WSFD transitioned from volunteer to part-time personnel. The following year, two full-time Captains and a part-time Fire Chief were hired.

Brewer Athletes Medal at State Track and Field Meet





Brewer brought home some hardware from the state track and field meet this past weekend, as distance runner Ki Rendon (above) took the bronze medal in the 1,600meter race.

Rendon finished with a time of 4:53.47 in the half-mile run and coach Kathi Olson said she was proud of her senior's effort.

"She did exactly what we talked about and executed to perfection," Olson said. "Those two girls (Leachman and Frankenburg, the first and second place runners) are two of the top distance runners in the United States, and Ki did such an amazing job running with them. We thought Leachman would go out and set a fast pace from the start. We also thought Frankenburg would react to the pace by running fast splits behind her. Ki and I talked about staying with them



and focusing on the third lap to keep herself in medal contention."

Rendon ran a new PR by three seconds from her previous best at the Texas Relays where she ran a 4:56.84.

Olson said that Rendon has meant a lot to the Brewer cross-country and track and field programs and will leave some big shoes to fill when she graduates.

"Ki is the fastest and highest-placing runner in school history in two sports, crosscountry and track and field," Olson said. "She has not only set the standard on the course and track, but she has also been doing the same thing in every practice; she works hard every practice, every day to be a better runner. She leads the team, by example, in athletics and academics."

Rendon is still deciding where to run in college and wants to visit the schools interested in her.

"And after running a 4:53, she will hopefully get some more schools interested in her

Reflecting on the season as a whole, Olson said she is pleased with how things unfolded for Brewer.

"I'm extremely satisfied," Olson said. "Ki's senior season has been nothing but amazing. Every week she is learning more and more about herself, training, and how to execute races. It has been an honor to get to be a part of her journey. And we aren't done yet, she will compete in the Meet of Cham-

pions in San Marcos in two weeks. Then she qualified for the Nike Outdoor National Championships in Oregon in June."

On the boys' side, Brandon Clark, Jr. (pictured left) brought home a bronze medal as well in the triple jump event with a mark of 46-2.75, while teammate Desmond Watkins finished fifth with a mark of 45-6.50

On the diamond, the season came to an end for the Brewer softball team who lost in a hard-fought series against Colleyville Heritage in the area round over the weekend.

Coach Joshua Richards said it was a tough couple of games for his players, but added that they never backed down.

"Overall, we knew it was going to be a very tough series," Richards said. "That's a great team. We faced them last year, and we knew how much talent they were bringing back. We were so impressed with our girls for fighting through a tough game one, and then coming right back and going to extra innings and going toe-to-toe and just pushing them to the limit. We took a lead in the late innings to potentially win it. It was just huge for our kids and it shows how much heart and fight my group has."

Richards said he is extremely grateful to his assistant coaches Calie Burres and Tanya Johnson for the amount of time and commitment they "poured into the players," and said earning a playoff spot and winning a postseason series were great accomplishments for his team this season.

"You're just proud of your kids," Richards said. "We started the year battling injoining their programs next year," Olson juries. Blair Shipman was out the majority of our season, and she's an anchor for us in the circle. One of our freshmen, Khloe Winn stepped in and had some ups and downs, but ultimately succeeded and did well. It was the same thing with Karlie Landrum being leaned upon to throw more innings. It's just a big deal for the kids to grow during the season versus taking steps backward...every time we took a step back, we'd take three or four steps forward."





Texas History Minute by Dr. Ken Bridges

Folklorist, Writer and Newspaper Columnist, J. Frank Dobie



Great storytelling is an honored tradition across the South and the Southwest. Texas, with its long history of engaging characters and adventures, has produced many tales to tell. Perhaps one of the most respected storytellers was writer and professor J. Frank Dobie.

Born James Frank Dobie on Sept. 26, 1888, a love of literature and the open prairie was instilled in him from birth. The family lived on a modest ranch in Live Oak County in South Texas. Dobie was the oldest of six children, and he worked the ranch with his family from a young age. In the evenings, after the day's chores had been completed, his father read to him and the other children from the family Bible while his mother read classic works of literature to them.

In order to finish high school, Dobie moved in with his grandparents in nearby Alice in 1904. After his 1906 graduation, he enrolled at Southwestern University in Georgetown. Armed with an education, life moved quickly for Dobie. After earning his bachelors degree, he began writing for a number of newspapers for a year before accepting a teaching position in 1911. Two years later, he left for Columbia University in New York City to pursue a masters degree in English. He returned to Texas in 1914 and began teaching at the University of Texas.

Dobie enlisted in the army as the United States entered World War I in 1917. After serving in the artillery for two years, he returned to the university in 1919. After his military experiences, he began expressing himself more with the written word and began publishing stories and studies of aspects of folklore in 1919. He joined the Texas
